

> Few would minimize the need of the improvements. But, let's go on from there and see just how this could be financed. And it CAN be financed without undue inconvenience, as attempt will be made to show in this explanation. The commission plainly is faced with the alternative of (1) raising property valuations, or (2) raising the rate.

This editor and the city commission believes a small tax-rate increase reasonable and justified, and we go on record as favoring this method of securing a sensible operating and building budget for Friona.
