This notation is being passed on for what it is worth to anyone else who may have had similar experiences:

Though making no false claims, the letter evidently left much unsaid, for on its heels comes this notice from the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce: "The Federal Land Corporation of Houston, Texas, is presently engaged in a real estate development known as the Bel-Aire Addition, outside the city limits of Amarillo.

They are notifying people throughout the Panhandle that they have been chosen to receive one of these lots at a total cost of \$64.00.

We want the public to have ALL the know facts about this project. Therefore, we have checked with the Better Business Bureau of Amarillo and have secured the following information:

1. The lots are only 60 feet deep.
2. They are outside the city limits.
3. There are no restrictions on the types of buildings which may be erected.
4. There are no paved streets.
5. There are no utilities.
6. There are no transportation facilities.
7. There is no city police or fire protection.

This information is submitted to you for your information and for the information of people in your city who receive letters such as those mentioned above.

# DRILLING TO START SOON ON DEEP TEST

## BUILDING - PAVING GIVEN GREEN LIGHT BY SCHOOL BOARD

Contract for New High School Building Let to BMFP Company; Bid of \$168,000

Friona School Board Authorizes Six Blocks of Paving South of Highway 60

The paving program was one step nearer its goal in Friona this week with the Friona School Board signing papers Wednesday whereby six blocks abutting school property south of the highway would be paved.

Blocks included in this sign-up included Cleveland Avenue between 9th street and the highway (the two blocks just west of the high school building); the east-west artery just south of the agricultural building from Euclid Avenue to Summit; the one block on Summit between 8th and 9th streets, joining the west side of the playground and 9th street between Cleveland and Summit.

Word from Mr. Dan Martin, Brown & Root Construction Company representative, was that the vote taken at the school board meeting was unanimous with these present, and that the paving would begin immediately.

The final top-coat is being placed on many of the Friona streets this week, with all the paving activity; in high gear while curb is being laid and caliche laid on some streets, others are being completed.

## The Law and You

By Robt. (Bob) Kirk

DO YOU KNOW what authority the last session of the Legislature gave to the Governor regarding civil protection and disaster relief?

Recognizing the need for an adequate organization to protect life and property in the State of Texas in case of disaster or "extremt emergency," the last session of the legislature gave to the Governor the authority to establish an organization to meet such disaster or emergencies, at such time as they might arise in the future.

The Governor is given the authority to establish by executive proclamation a State Defense and Disaster Relief Council, consisting of the representatives of such state agencies, departments and institutions of the State whose legal functions relate to important phases of this activity, and representatives of public or quasi-public relief organizations, and who may be designated by the Governor. The Governor is given full authority by executive orders and directives to put this council into full force and effect. The Governor is also given authority to co-ordinate the efforts of all organizations working along these same lines, so that the greatest benefit may be received from their efforts. The Governor is also authorized to prescribe the uniform signals, warnings, alerts, credentials, insignia, and to provide for dim-outs or other precautionary measures being necessary to prevent a minimized loss of life or

The various political subdivisions of the State are authorized by ordinance or otherwise to create local defense organizations, and to enter into reciprocal agreements with other local civil defense organizations for their mutual benefit in cases of emergency.

The possibility of such emergencies caused by enemy action are graver than most of us like to admit to ourselves, but we must all recognize the danger which is threatening us and cooperate in all ways with our State and National Civil Defense organizations. Each person must learn how he can help, when such emergencies do arise.

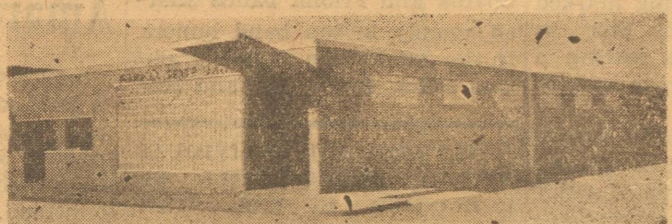

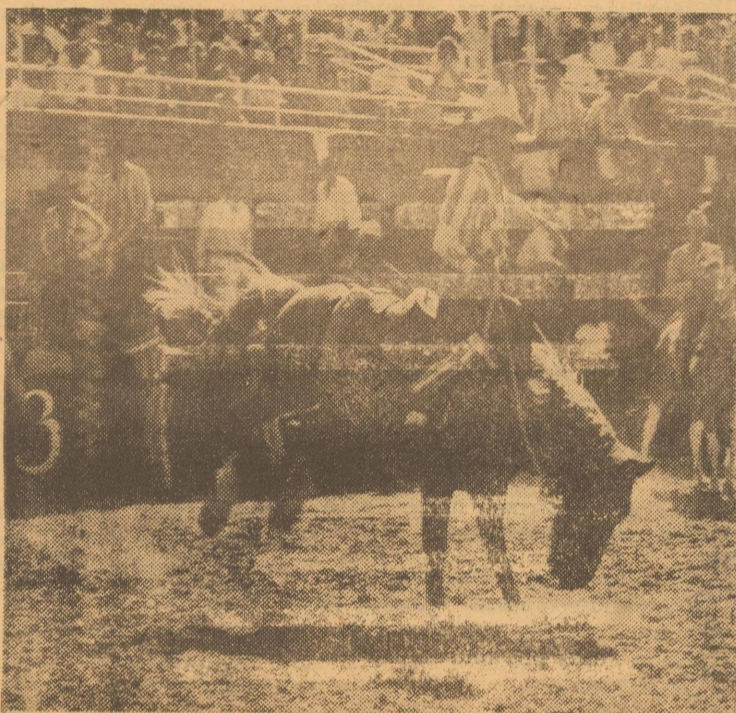

More Meat—Thanks to Science

The average American household's meat budget is being stretched by science this year. One reason poultry and pork are relatively plentiful is the fact that they are being fed on rations containing minute amounts of antibiotic. As little as a third of an ounce of terramycin in a ton of feed will speed up growth so much as to bring broilers to market size at 10 weeks instead of 12. With turkeys and hogs, from four to six weeks are saved. Farmers save time and feed.

Just how antibiotics work is not understood, and research is still being conducted. Antibiotic does not change the character of the meat, except that it comes from younger animals. Antibiotic-fortified rations do kill certain bacteria in the animals' intestines, but at one-third ounce per ton, no measurable antibiotic enters the animal's blood stream. Pigs and poultry fed antibiotics are thrifter. Fewer die, more come to market, and faster.

That last, after all, is what the consumer is interested in—because that means more wishbones, drumsticks and pork chops in the butcher shop and on the table.

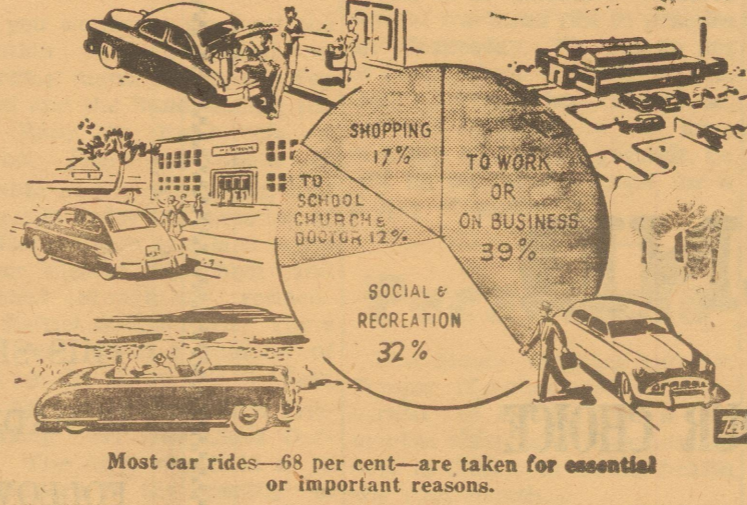

**America Depends on Family Car**



**DETROIT**—On an average day, at least one out of every three adults in the United States uses a passenger automobile for some essential purpose such as riding to work, conducting business or going shopping.

This and some 20,000 other facts about how the American family car is used were revealed in a nation-wide survey recently conducted by the Alfred Politz Research organization.

It was learned that 59 million people over the age of 14 ride in automobiles on an average day. This represents more than half of the U. S. adult population. Nearly half of these individuals use a car in connection with earning a living during a typical day, while almost one-fourth of them go shopping by automobile.

About 40 per cent of all rides taken in motor cars, and nearly one-half of the total passenger miles traveled, are for livelihood purposes, the survey showed. Shopping accounts for another 17 per cent of the rides and 11 per cent of the passenger mileage.

These indications of America's growing dependence upon the family car for essential transportation are borne out by automobile and population statistics of the past 10 years. While our population has grown 15 per cent since 1940, car ownership has increased about 50 per cent. Passenger car registrations for 1950 totaled 40,167,000 compared with 27,372,397 in 1940.

This growth in the automobile population has taken place despite the fact that motor vehicle production between 1940 and 1950 was less than in either of the two preceding decades. Consequently there are more older cars on the road today. The average passenger car is about eight years old, compared with the prewar average of 5 1/2 years. Likewise, there is a lack of middle age cars as a result of the wartime halt in automobile production.

In addition to the need for motor cars as essential transport tools, the nation relies on them as a major source of business activity, employment, and tax revenues. The automotive industry directly creates business for at least half a million separate enterprises, or one out of every six firms in the country. One out of every seven jobs, for a total of more than nine million, are automotive.

The average automobile buyer pays about \$95 in Federal excise tax on his new car. Last year, total automotive excise payments contributed nearly two-billion dollars to Federal tax coffers. In addition, highway users paid some \$2.5 billion in special state motor vehicle taxes and fees for an average age of nearly \$55 per vehicle.

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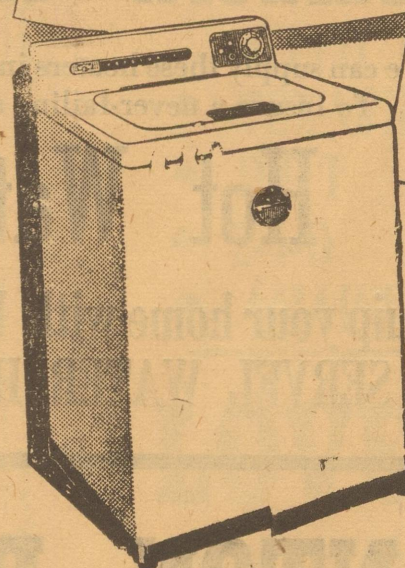

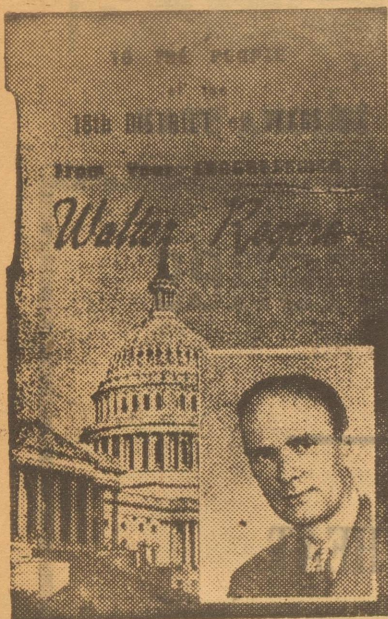

**TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT FROM YOUR CONGRESSMAN WALTER ROGERS**



Washington, D. C.  
September 13th, 1951.

Well, we got back to Washington after a most enjoyable trip to the district. The shortness of time would not permit me to visit all of the places that I wanted to, but an early adjournment of Congress would make it possible for me to be back and

visit the places that I failed to get to on this last trip. We came back to Washington by the northern route, that is Highway 66 to St. Louis and Highway 40 through Indianapolis and Columbus into Pennsylvania and then down to Washington. We got to ride on the Pennsylvania Toll Turnpike for about 90 miles. It cost us 85 cents, and was well worth it. There are no side roads coming into the Turnpike, and you can set your speed on this four-lane divided highway and sail right along. You can't get on the Turnpike except at toll gates, which are spaced about 25 or 30 miles apart. This turnpike is supposed to be paying its own way and may be the answer to the highway situation in many of the states. We finally made it into Washington about 3:00 a. m. Wednesday and were pretty well worn out from the trip.

The Senate has caught up with a lot of work during the recess of the House and we are again back at work on the important legislative matters that must be finished if Congress is to adjourn any time this fall. The raise in the military appropriations by the Senate is receiving much discussion here, as many of the members feel that the Senate version will tend to put too much of the burden on the low-

er and middle income groups and will not operate like the House bill, which fairly distributes the burden across the board. The nature of the tax raise in the House is temporary in principle, while the Senate version appears to have a certain degree of permanency. The need for additional taxes at the present time can only be justified by military requirements for defense purposes and should be on a temporary basis. The American taxpayer is entitled to a substantial reduction in taxes as soon as the nucleus of the way. If the additional taxes are placed on a permanent basis, it will be very difficult to effect the substantial reduction that I feel should be forthcoming within the next two or three years.

I have received inquiries concerning the new income tax regulations on the sale of one's home. Under the present law if you sell your residence, you are selling a capital asset and fifty percent of the profit is in-

cludable in gross income provided you have owned the home for more than six months. If you have owned it for less than six months, the entire profit is includable in gross income. Under the new version, the Revenue Act of 1951, as passed by the House, a person may sell his home and repurchase another home within a period beginning one year prior to the date of such sale and ending one year after such date and use the proceeds to purchase another home. If he uses the entire proceeds

from his old home to purchase the new home, he will not be required to pay any income tax on the sale price of his old home. However, if he purchases a new home at a less price than that for which he sold his old home, he of course will be required to account for the difference between the purchase price of his new home and the selling price of his old home.

| 2 teaspoons gelatin      | 1 teaspoon grated lime rind                               |
| 2 tablespoons cold water | Few drops green coloring                                  |
| 3 egg yolks              | 1 baked 9-inch pie shell or graham cracker crust, chilled |
| 1/4 cup lime juice       | 1/2 cup cream, whipped and sweetened                      |
| 1/4 teaspoon salt        | 1/4 cup shredded coconut, plain or toasted                |
| 1/2 cup sugar            |   |
| 3 egg whites             |   |
| 1/4 cup sugar            |   |

Combine gelatin and cold water in mixing bowl; mix well. Beat egg yolks until light. Add lime juice, salt, and 1/2 cup sugar. Cook in double boiler over hot, not boiling water, until thickened. Pour over gelatin and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Chill until slightly thickened.

Beat egg whites until foamy, add 1/4 cup sugar gradually, and continue beating until stiff. Fold into gelatin mixture. Add lime rind and green coloring. Pile lightly in pie shell. Chill until firm. Just before serving, spread with whipped cream and sprinkle with

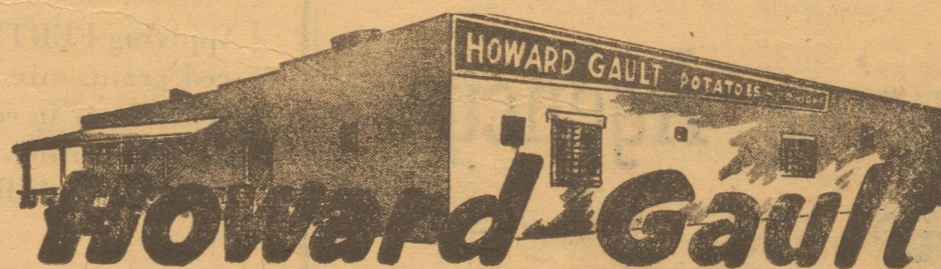

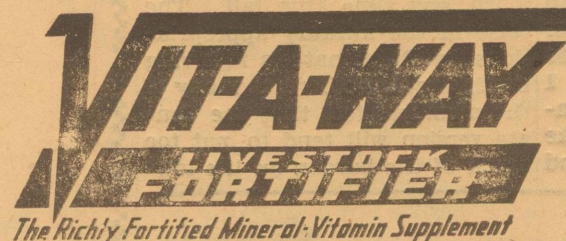
