There's a Lot to This Hunting....

With quite a number of local nimrods taking to the sagebrush this week for dove and quan hunting, we have noted with interest the press in for shooting from automobiles. releases being mailed out by the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

First we note that quail hunters are reminded that quail wings are again wanted to complete the study started last year on age and sex ratio and other bobwhite quail information. The commission said, "If you or any of your friends are in a position to participate, just let us know. We will mail you a supply of return envelopes on which you need not pay postage."

Then along comes another letter telling of \$8462.98 being collected in hunting fines during October. Contributing to this fund, fourteen persons were prosecuted for headlighting deer, sixteen involved taking deer in closed season;

four were prosecuted for killing wild turkey during closed season, and twelve hunters were taken

In dove shooting, forty-five people were fined for lacking licenses, 13 killed doves before or after hours, and ten exceeded the bag limit. One hunter was fined for shooting doves with

Then the grim report comes in-that of at least five Texans being killed so far during the 1951 hunting season; persons wounded totaled more than a dozen.

From reading these various aspects of hunting, we must come to the conclusion that only a good sportsman should participate in the fun for safety sake and for the proper perpetuation of game birds and animals for which to hunt.

And one of his favorite menus is the popular Brown Bread-Baked Bean supper. "But," says Frankie, "to suit my taste the bread must be home-made and served warm and moist the way my mother does it." Here is her recipe:

MOLASSES BRAN BROWN BREAD

1 cup ready-to-eat bran ½ cup seedless raisins 2 tablespoons shortening ½ cup New Orleans molasses ¾ cup hot water

1 egg
1 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon cinnamon (if desired)

Measure bran, raisins, shortening and molasses into mixing bowl Add hot water, stirring until shortening is melted. Add egg and beat well. Sift together flour, soda, salt, and cinnamon; add to bran mixture. Stir only until combined. Fill 2 greased cans (baked bean cans, 4½ inches deep, 2¾ inches across) about ¾ full; or spread in greased loaf pan (91/2 x 41/2 inches). Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) about 45 minutes for canned bread or about 35 minutes for loaf bread. Remove from cans or pan, slice and serve hot.

Yield: 2 loaves, 4½x2¾ inches, or 1 loaf, 9½x4½ inches.

The first of these two types is a non-convertible five-year level premium term policy that may be renewed every five years at the premium rate for the then-attained age.

The second type is a special form of National Service Life Insurance, on either term or permanent plans, that may be ssued to disabled veterans whose disabilities have been found to be service-connected.




