## For the Farmers, and Proving It

Real issues are too, too often obscured by "red herrings" or furors kindled about a side-issue to minimize the real dangers.

We think there is trend to these maneuvers right here in our own county. A great deal is being said in the western part about the towns meddling in road discussions. According to a quotation printed in a column of a neighboring editor, "If these d—towns would leave us alone, we could settle these road locations." The columnist went on to say that judging from past experiences, the town boys only tend to mess up the deal, so to speak.

Well, we really don't know the reason for the f—es, but in principal we certainly agree, and we are glad to observe that there has been no undue "meddling" called to our attention in the Friona area. This publication has gone to bat for the farmers time after time, as has the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, the Lions Club, and other civic organizations. In EVERY instance where the Star has editorialized on road problems, and other problems affecting the rural areas which we serve, it has been only after careful consideration and discussions with the FARMERS, the bulwark of local economy and society. Certainly we don't get off on a tangent crusading for a cause that has no support or reason.

Along this line, we were very amused at a meeting we attended recently wherein the chairman, a very able fellow, time and again told how the problem at hand was the farmers' baby, to be settled, discussed, and maneuvered wholly by the farmers. Now that was exactly correct, but during the two hour session the farmers talked probably less than 15 minutes with the chairman deftly controlling the whole session. But with his repeated reference to the farmers "doing the job themselves," they probably thought they were! Red herring tactics, surely.

We are glad to report that the commissioner of our local precinct has the support of the residents in following road count procedures in determining roads to be petitioned. That is a very sound method, and until a pavement can lead to every farmer's doorstep, it requires no substitute.

The sooner everyone recognizes that towns want to serve the rural areas and the farmers in turn want to be friends and co-workers with the towns the better off we'll all be. Surely there is mutual understanding and progressive endeavor already among those in and out of the city limits. The danger lies in listening to rumors, and amplifying them, spread by interest, and individuals with an axe to grind.

Let's keep our vision focused on the real issues in Parmer County.

## Monday Morning Musings

The Star conducted no contest this year for "Headlines You Would Most Like to See in 1952" or for letters on "Civic Improvements Needed."

But don't think for a minute that this paper or the citizens of the area are unmindful of the progressive steps needed in this new year. In fact more enterprises and improvements have been discussed across our desk than at any time previously, and we are sure the Chamber of Commerce has experienced similar enthusiasm on the part of the public.

We are mentioning some of the items here that have been called to our attention. We would like to have further discussion of these - whether you think they merit our attention and promotion, or if they on the other hand are superfluous:

A zoning program for the city of Friona has been proposed. This quite likely will be presented the incoming commission as one of its first studies. In anticipating growth of the town, very probably such a move would be proper.

Both parents and students have repeatedly asked for a school page in the Star. We, too, would like to see renewal of this feature, and we are sure it will be resumed next year. School officials have pointed out that a more or less dis-arranged program has been necessitated this year at the school because of the fire and no journalism study was conducted. Let us be the first to welcome a school page - the public is

entitled to full coverage of sports and all school activities.

How about a big chamber of commerce banquet? There has been a lot of talk on this, yet little done. Couldn't such be held in the school gymnasium? Let us hear some early comment on this; a get-together is needed soon, and we believe Parmer County could draw a well-known speaker for the occasion.

Then there is the playground at the grade school. We are referring to the grounds surrounding and to the front of the grade school. Certainly more playground equipment would be desirable. And if that is not readily attainable, possibly the levelling of the grounds, with rocks and concrete slabs removed, would add to the safety and enjoyment of the grounds.

Restrooms in public buildings and a restroom or lounge for the women teachers of the schools have been proposed. We are thoroughly in accord with any improvement in this situation. We are surprised, in fact, that health authorities already have not taken steps in some of these matters.

Now this hodge-podge of suggestions is not a brainstorm of ye editor - but is a reporting of proposals made in our office by civic-minded, health-minded, education-minded citizens of both our rural and town area. Certainly they deserve careful scrutiny and in most cases ACTION. What about it?

**WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"**

In days of yore, when a king died, the official word was "The King is dead, long live the king" thus complimenting both the expired ruler and the new wearer of the crown. A paraphrase of this was enacted in Washington recently.

But the mere fact that he is not on speaking terms with fellow Communist Stalin somehow seems to change the situation in regard to Communism. Cynics say any day now, the State Dept. will issue a "white paper" defining the differences between a "benevolent communist," and a "malignant communist."

Of equal significance is the heavy shipments being made to European foreign possessions.

In the first five days of operation under a new name, \$4 million dollars worth of supplies, principally coal from the U. S. and oil, was approved for French colonies in Africa.

This presents two interesting questions which will no doubt be investigated in Congress.

One is the morality of taxing small American businessmen who must pay for their own expansion, as well as taxes, out of their own business development, to give to nations to develop their colonies for their own monopoly controlled profit.

The second question is the national morality involved in this nation helping finance the exploitation of other nation's colonies where the people are deprived of a voice in their own economic and political destiny.

You will hear more of this thinking when Congress considers the proposed \$5 billion dollar budget, and tax increase.

## Scouting Cited as Great Moral Force In America by Wellington Editor

"I will share the responsibility of my home, school, church, neighborhood, and community; and when legally of age, I will register and vote in all elections. I will deal fairly and kindly with my fellow-citizens of whatever race or creed, in the spirit of the Scout Law and America's tradition of equality of opportunity.

"I will work to preserve our American heritage of liberty and responsibility. I acknowledge that the privileges we enjoy were won by the hard work, and sacrifices, faith and clear thinking of our forefathers. I will do all in my power to pass on a better America to the next generation."

Today over 2,900,000 boys and men are actively enrolled in over 80,000 different units. Scouting is indeed a great asset to the nation. May it continue to succeed in influencing the lives of countless more boys as you go "Forward . . . On Liberty's Team."

**GI TRAINING**  
Former GI Bill veteran-trainees who returned to active military duty were reminded today by the Veterans Administration that they have little time to lose, in case they want to resume their GI studies after discharge.  
Under VA regulations, they must resume their training within a reasonable period after their release from active duty. That "reasonable period," VA said, stances of each veteran's case, will be based on the circumstances and will depend on the kind of training he is taking and a number of other factors.  
These regulations apply to veterans affected by the July 25, 1951, cut-off date for entering training, who had previously been in training under the GI Bill, but who were unable to be enrolled at that time because of re-entrance into military service.

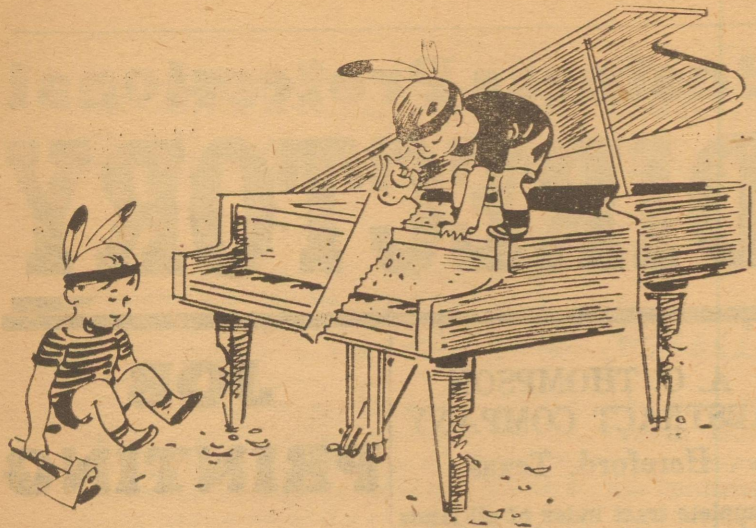
How did this Texas legend get started, then?

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## SCD NEWS and VIEWS

The following article came to us from the Castro County Soil Conservation District. Since we have about the same farming conditions as our neighbors to the East, it may be of interest.

"Earl Cole, whose farm is in the northwest part of Castro County, believes in taking every opportunity to make his farm pay more. When Cole bought the farm in 1946 it had been irrigated for 12 years without any attention to improving the soil. The yields were not what they should be. No matter how the land was irrigated the yields were not as high as a good farm like Cole expected. Something had to be done and soon.

Commercial fertilizer was tried, and it helped. It still helps, but Cole is not satisfied that it is the complete answer.

Legumes of different kinds were tried and among them was a 7 acre field of Ladino Clover. Ladino is a low growing shallow rooted plant that will live several years. The stems get about 2 feet long and when a joint comes in contact with moist soil it takes root. This soil forms a dense turf. Most of the roots are in the top 6 inches of soil, and more were found below 16 inches when the plants were about 18 months old. Nodules are plentiful on the roots. This means that the clover is taking nitrogen from the air and fixing it in the soil; building up the fertility for future crops.

Cole intended to harvest the seed last summer. The clover set a crop of seed that was estimated at 200 to 300 pounds per acre. The seed is expensive, current retail price is \$1.40 per pound. Several different methods of harvesting were tried, but the crop was so matted that no available equipment could make it.

There was a big potential loss because seed harvest was impracticable, but there was mighty good grazing. Two cows were turned in, and watched to see if



A lot of farm and ranch chores may be measured in "horsepower," but did anyone ever try to evaluate the energy required of the farmer?

It is a well-known fact that a tractor needs quality fuel and lubricants; a team of horses, a span of mules, or even a yoke of oxen, require an adequate amount of the proper ration to do the job.

But what of the farmer? Does he regulate his own diet to meet his energy needs? For example, does the farmer eat enough eggs every day to provide the fuel for the day's work?

The food value of the egg is high because it contains within itself all the materials needed for the development of the chick within the short space of 21 days.

Feed tests with laboratory animals and human subjects show that for them also it is a food of remarkably high value. Its protein, egg albumin, supports an even faster rate of growth than the protein meat and milk. Its fat occurs in a finely emulsified form and is as easily digested as milk fat. It contains all known vitamins except Vitamin C and all the mineral elements needed for the formation of blood.

For the farmer who works a full day, an ideal breakfast includes two eggs, fried, boiled, poached — or served in his favorite style. Eggs, too, are versatile inasmuch as there are so many tasty ways to use them, either as a dish or as a supplement to other recipes, that one need never tire of them.

Fruit juice, breakfast pastry and a cup of coffee may seem to satisfy the person who expends little or no energy during the day, but for the man who does a man's work, it's man's breakfast which includes at least two eggs.

they would bloat. The cows filled up and lay down. No bloat. Forty-eight more were turned in and watched. No bloat. Fifty days later the 50 cows had eaten the 7 acres of clover down to the point where supplemental feed was necessary. Ten days later, on the first of November, they were taken out. The Ladino is not growing much now, but is greener than most lawns. Cole is looking forward to another try at a seed harvest. Already plans are underway to get a type of mower that will slice through the tangled mat of stems, but if the seed cannot be harvested he still believes that grazing 7 cows per acre for 2 months is quite profitable."

The planting dates for Ladino are in the Spring from February 15 to March 15, in Fall from September 15 to November 10. Five pounds per acre is recommended in pure stands and 2 to 3 pounds in mixtures.

If you would like to know how many pounds of grass per acre there is in any pasture here is a handy formula!

Lay out a plot 3.1 feet square. Clip vegetation with a pair of shears.

Weigh vegetation on gram scales which you can buy for about 75 cents.

Multiply the gram weight by 10. This gives pounds per acre. Example: 125 grams clipped = 10-1250 pounds grass per acre.

The same formula holds true for stubble or any other type of forage.

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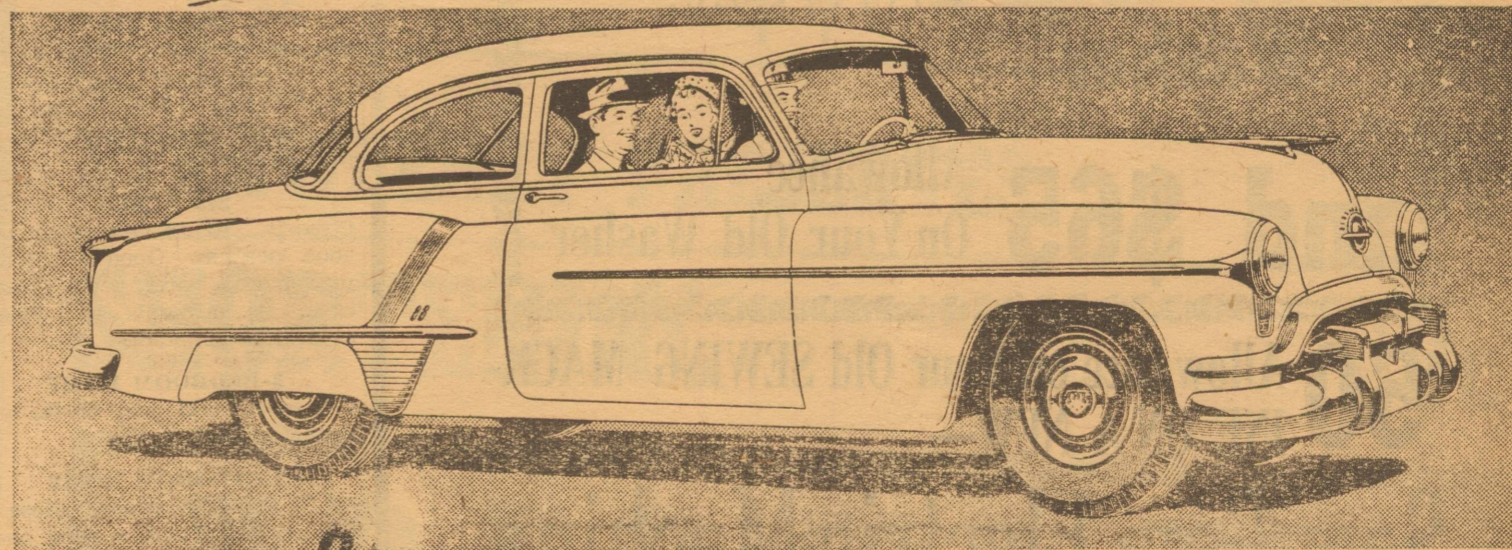

Insurance is a contract between the insurance company and the policy holder. In this contract the policy holder agrees to pay a certain sum of money for the policy of insurance, and the insurance company agrees that should the policy holder incur hospital expenses that the

insurance company will make payment to the policy holder of stated sums, as set out in the policy of insurance.

The insurance policy itself must state the complete contract between the parties. The oral statements of agents not in harmony with the policy are

not binding on the company. The company is bound to pay only such sums as are specifically set forth in the policy of insurance.

Practically all policies have a section called exceptions and exclusions. The policy holder should particularly read this section before purchasing a policy of any kind of insurance. It would be possible for a policy of insurance to have so many exceptions and exclusions as to practically nullify any benefits under the policy.

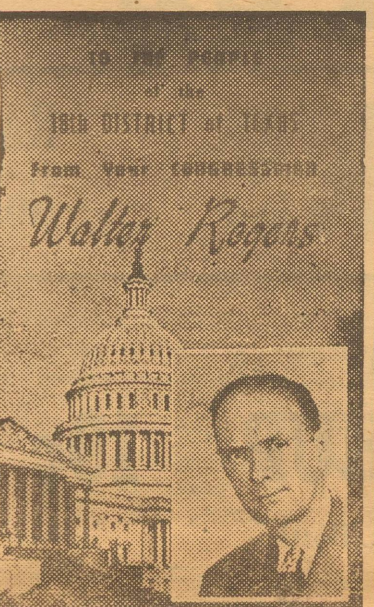

**EXTENSION OF BENEFITS UNDER SERVICEMEN'S READJUSTMENT ACT TO KOREAN VETERANS**

The hearings have commenced in the Veterans' Affairs Committee on legislation designed to extend Korean veterans the educational, on job training, housing and other benefits granted and extended to World War II veterans under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act. The benefits under this act are about the only benefits not yet extended to Korean veterans, but are in my mind of perhaps greater importance than those benefits heretofore extended. It is my opinion that these benefits should have been extended to Korean veterans during the first session of this Congress. This would have been done except for an investigation of some immoral if not illegal, practices and abuses that are being carried on under the original act. The committee investigating this uncovered much informative information concerning questionable fly-by-night schools allegedly set up for the purpose of imposing on veterans and milking the public treasury. Such vicious and shady schemes were not only an imposition on the World War II veterans, but were the basic cause for the delay in the extension of the benefits to the Korean veterans. These

hearings are being speeded up so that this legislation can be presented to the entire House of Representatives for immediate action.

During one of the recent hearings an argument arose between a witness and several members of the committee as to whether or not the Korean action was a "war" or a "police action." It was my observation that this was a question that could be answered unequivocally by some of the boys who have been over there. No matter what you call it, the weapons used are the same and are capable of dealing the same kind of death, the same kind of maiming, the same kind of destruction. Actually, we are in it and I say, "Call it whatever you want, but for the sake of humanity, let's get it over with." If we were not in Korea, but merely contemplating entry, there would be ample justification for the continuing debate, simply because the difference between a war and a police action is this: In order for this country to engage in war a formal declaration of war by the Congress is required. A police action merely means that troops, equipment and arms may be committed to certain sectors by executive order without a declaration by the Congress. Our responsibility at the present time is to get this Korean conflict over with and stop the senseless slaughter, maiming and destruction. We can argue about words later on.

**CONTEMPT CITATION AGAINST EX-COMMUNISTS**

The House voted 314 to 0 on House Resolution 517, citing Sidney Buchman for contempt of Congress for his refusal to comply with a subpoena issued by the Committee on Un-American Activities. This Sidney Buchman appeared as a witness before a sub-committee of Committee on Un-American Activities on September 25, 1951, in Los Angeles, California, at which time he admitted having been a member of the Communist Party between 1938 and 1945, but refused to disclose to the sub-committee the names of the persons associated with him in the communist groups to which

he had belonged while a member of the Communist Party. He is a writer-producer in the movie industry in California, and was uncovered by the Un-American Activities Committee's investigation of communist activities in California. There are many more of these just like Sidney Buchman who have profited lavishly under our system of government, but who have been betraying the very principles that made their success possible. I challenge the statement of this sorry type of humanity when they say that they have ceased to be communists. It is rather odd that they do not denounce communism until just before they are caught. It is also odd that after they have denounced communism for the obvious purpose of saving their own hide, they refuse to divulge the names of the sinister vermin and rodents

(rats and lice in plain Texas English) with whom they were associated. This to me is the proof of the pudding, and I say that this kind of human vampire should be cast from our shores along with the whole kit and caboodle of his associates. Here are the names of some of the productions with which he was associated: "Sign of the Cross;" "Thunder Below;" "Whom the Gods Destroy;" and a favorite of many movie goers, "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington." He should have written "Mr. Buchman Goes to Moscow," and conformed his own actions to the title One of his later productions was "To The Ends of The Earth," a rather fitting title for what the communists stand for.

There is quite a bit of talk around Congress for a resolution calling for disbarment pro-

ceedings against his attorneys, Pepper and Siegel of New York City, for questionable and sharp practices allegedly indulged in by them before the committee. The dander of the Congress is up, and the likes of Sidney Buchman and his associates can expect to be dealt with accordingly.

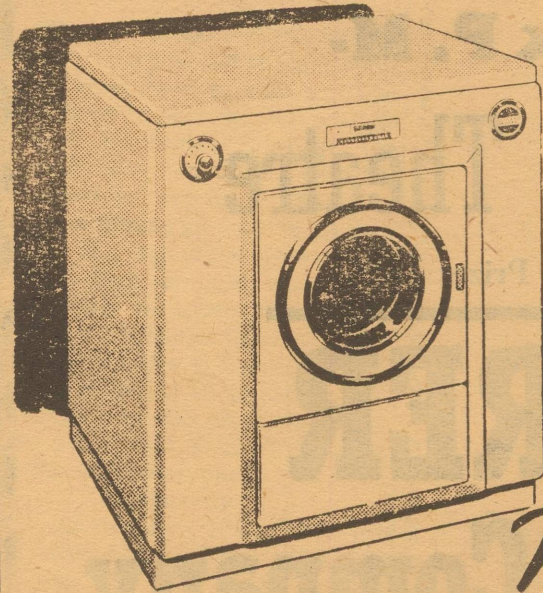

## Tractor Operations Contests Open to 4-H Members in New Program

Texas 4-H boys may participate in a new phase of the tractor maintenance program this year, according to E. H. Bush, agricultural engineer for the Service.

While conducting a series of 4-H tractor maintenance schools, Bush is experimenting with "tractor operators contests." If these contests receive favorable reaction, they will be included in the 1952 program, and the 4-H tractor maintenance demonstration teams will be eliminated. The demonstration phase has been conducted in Texas for the past six years.

Tractor operators contests give 4-H members opportunities to demonstrate what they have learned in the tractor maintenance program, says Bush.

Each contestant takes a written examination. He inspects his tractor, starts the engine, warms it up and operates the tractor. Then he demonstrates spotting, driving and backing. And finally he belts the tractor to another piece of machinery and operates it at half-throttle for a short time. He is scored for safety also on each of these operations. The 4-H tractor maintenance program is sponsored in Texas by the Stanolind Oil and Gas Company, Tulsa
