





Two weeks later, Morrison returned to private life.







More Pay For Texas Teachers?

Twenty-five states, including traditional competitors like California and Florida, now are paying their public school teachers more than Texas does, Charles H. Tennyson, executive secretary of the Texas State Teachers Association, reports.

In Texas the average classroom teachers is paid \$2,960 a year, whereas in New York she makes \$4,500 a year. California, the number-two state in the nation, pays an average salary to teachers of \$3,900.

In an effort to equalize present conditions, the Texas State Teachers Association will ask the next legislature to increase the minimum beginning salary for public school teachers to \$3,000 a year. 





Pointers on Lawn Care Furnished by Agronomy Department of Texas A & M

A neat, well kept lawn will add to the value of a home, and lawns properly managed will provide a cool, restful cover for the homesite even during summer months. J. R. Watson, Jr., of the agronomy department at Texas A&M College, says that by recognizing the basic conditions necessary for lawn care the home lawn enthusiast may have a lawn that will provide pleasant relaxation and prevent soil from blow ing and washing.

A grass should be selected that is suitable for the particular locality. Some of the grasses best suited to Texas are Bermuda, St. Augustine, and Buffalo grass. Others not so popular are Centi-e pede and various strains of Zoy sia grass. Bermuda grass is probably the most popular and the best suited for all around purposes. However, St. Augustine grass is the best for shaded areas Watson points out that the grass selected should be adapted to your locality and one that suits you.

Lawns should be fertilized in the spring and fall with a complete fertilizer, such as 10-5-5 5-10-5, or 8-8-8. During the summer it is not necessary to add a complete fertilizer, but nitroger should be added every 30-40 days, for grasses are heavy nitrogen feeders Ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate may be added at the rate of three pounds of ammonium nitrate and five half the total. pounds of ammonium sulfate per



School Land Leases Sold at Auction



Methods now used in selling oil and gas leases on state school lands are robbing Texas children of millions of dollars, Guy Patterson, 46-yearold Eastland oil man, declared this week in announcing his candidacy for State Land Commissioner in the Democratic primaries. Patterson pledged himself to change the system of "sealed and secretive" bidding now used to one of "open and competitive" selling at public auction from the State capitol steps. The Texas-born Patterson-he was born near Lott, Falls County, and came to Eastland in 1924-said he would have plenty to say about present policies of administering State-owned lands and State-spon-sored Veterans benefits.



The Adjournment When Congress adjourned, the adjournment was sine die. This is a Latin phrase the literal translation of which is 'without day.' In other words, insofar as the Congress is concerned the adjournment is final and conclusive. Whether or not Congress reconvenes this year is a decision that is in the power of one man -the President of the United States. Had the Congress recessed, it could have set a day for return or could have been called back by the leaders of the House and the Senate. Had there been no important mat-

ters for consideration, the reces could have been continued. voted against the sine die resolution along with a small handful of members, mostly from the South. I did this for a number of reasons, but the three mos important are as follows:

(1) In view of the presen world situation, I do not believe that the decision to reconvene or not reconvene the Congress should be left in the hands o one man. Past experience has proven that a one-man snap judgment decision is sometimes prompted by emotional rather than reason. I do not believe that this power should be in the hands of one man during these troublesome times;

(2) We are at war regardless of what name is applied to the

mediate action by the Congress. Even a temporary delay in revery costly to the United States;

(3) There are many legislative matters that died for want of action. Many of these should be acted upon this year, especially the several proposals to cut income taxes so that the small income people could get some relief. I had hoped that we could get some action on the bill that I introduced to bring about this result. It would have helped the small income families especially. Several members introduced similar bills, and if we had the time to get one of these bills to the

Despite zooming general living expenses, the cost of liquefied etroleum gas has remained relatively stable, "spot survey" by LP-Gas Information Service, Chicago, among nation's dealers reveals. In contrast to an average rise of 63% in all items contained in U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics cost of living index, LP-Gas rates increased only 7% in ten-year period ending April 15, 1952. Here's One Bright Ray in Living Cost Spiral—LP-Gas Prices up Only 7%

CHICAGO—In the face of sky-rocketing living expenses in prac-tically all major categories, the cost of liquefied petroleum gas, used principally in rural, small town and suburban areas, has

advanced only 7% since 1942. This was revealed by the LP-Gas Information Service, Chicago, following a nation-wide "spot survey" among leading marketers of the fuel.

of the fuel. In the same ten-year period (April 15, 1942, to April 15, 1952), the average of all items included in the cost of living index released by the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics climbed 63%. Food prices registered the sharpest gain with a 92.3% rise. Other in-receases were as follows: housecreases were as follows; house-furnishings-69%; apparel-60.2%; miscellaneous-54.6%; fuel, electricity and refrigeration -39.3%, and rent-28.6%.

Industry leaders attribute the stability of LP-Gas rates in constability of LP-Gas rates in con-trast to the general rise in living costs to several factors.
