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## Man gets 40 years for trying to defraud churchgoers

DALLAS（AP）－A man convicted of cheating min－ isters and their churchgoers out of tens of millions of dollars was sentenced to 40 years in prison on family members，to pay about $\$ 62$ million in restitu－ tion．
Gregory Earl Setser， 50 ，was convicted in June of 22
counts including conspiracy，securities fraud and counts including
Setser，who was head of an import－export company which operated out of Canton Texas，and later Ontario，Calif．，is also a self－proclaimed former min－ ister，according to a news release from the Department of Justice．
At trial，a jury found that Setser exploited his con－
nections to prominent members of the evangelical nections to prominent members of the evangelical ultimately defrauding investors out of about $\$ 62$ mil－ lion in a Ponzi scheme．
Setser＇s defense attorney argued during the trial that his client was a failed businessman，not a con
artist．

In fact, the program is a necessity for many area res dents who can't afford to have their taxes prepared professionally, and the heart and soul of the operation are volunteers.
AARP volunteers explain many special tax credits and deductions and how people may claim them on
their tax returns. They help complete returns, as well right down to any refunds that might be due the tax payer.

AARP volunteers will begin doing taxes on Feb. and continue on each Monday through April 9. It should be noted that Feb. 19 will be a holiday and the
