THE EUROPEAN WAR

Monday one of the greatest battles of the war began on the British front south of Arras, in France. The British drove the Germans from the strongest position and captured three or four lines of trenches. Eleven thousand prisoners and several hundred guns fell into the hands of the British.

Many of the German prisoners said they had had no food for four days because it was impossible to bring food to the front owing to the terrific fire of the British guns.

This is the second time in the past month that the power of the British guns to destroy the most elaborately constructed trenches has been proven.

Naturally the English and French are greatly encouraged by their success in forcing the Germans out of trenches that required more than two years to construct.

If Hindenberg can not check these onslaughts of the British and French armies January 1918 is liable to find the western front on the Rhine.

Congress is rushing war measures to raise the largest army and the greatest navy this country ever had.

Five billion dollars in bonds is asked for to finance the war one year.

For the first time in the war the Stars and Stripes went into battle on the French front Monday. The flag was carried by a young Texan in the Canadian army. He was wounded and is now in a hospital in France.

A munition factory was blown up in Pennsylvania Tuesday, and 121 persons killed and over 200 wounded, mostly women and girls. Officials say the explosion was the deliberate act of conspirators.

WAR PROCLAMATION BY THE PRESIDENT; ALIENS ARE WARNED

Subjects of Kaiser Ordered to Keep the Peace.

CITIZENS OF U. S. ASKED TO SUPPORT GOVERNMENT

Wilson Calls for Volunteers for Both the Navy and Army—May Resort to Selective Draft Later—Enemy Foreigners Barred From Government Property.

Washington, April 7.—The state of war proclamation which President Wilson signed on Friday follows:

"Whereas, the congress of the United States, in the exercise of the constitutional authority vested in them, have resolved by joint resolution of the senate and house of representatives bearing date this day, that a state of war between the United States and the imperial German government, which has been thrust upon the United States, is hereby formally declared: "Whereas, it is provided by section 4067 of the revised statutes as follows:

"Whenever there is declared a war between the United States and any foreign nation or government or any invasion or predatory incursion is perpetrated, attempted or threatened against the territory of the United States by any foreign nation or government and the president makes public proclamation of the event, all natives, citizens, denizens or subjects of a hostile nation or government being male of the age of fourteen years and upward who shall be within the United States and not actually naturalized shall be liable to be apprehended, restrained, secured and removed as alien enemies."

Authority Given President.
"The president is authorized in any such event by his proclamation thereof or other public acts to direct the conduct to be observed on the part of the United States toward the aliens who become so liable; the manner and degree of the restraint to which they shall be subjected.

"Whereas, by sections 4068, 4069 and 4070 of the revised statutes, further provision is made relative to alien enemies:

Proclaims a State of War.
"Now, therefore, I, Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim to all whom it may concern that a state of war exists between the United States and the imperial German government, and I do specially direct all officers, civil or military, of the United States that they exercise vigilance and zeal in the discharge of the duties incident to such a state of war, and I do, moreover, earnestly appeal to all American citizens that they in loyal devotion to their country, dedicated from its foundation to the principles of liberty and justice, uphold the laws of the land and give undivided and willing support to those measures which may be adopted by the constitutional authorities in prosecuting the war to a successful issue and in obtaining a secure and just peace.

Duties of American Citizens.
"And, acting under and by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the United States and the said sections of the revised statutes, I do hereby further proclaim and direct that the conduct to be observed on the part of the United States toward all natives, citizens, denizens or subjects of Germany, being male, of the age of fourteen years and upward, who shall be within the United States and not actually naturalized, who for the purpose of this proclamation and under such sections of the revised statutes are termed alien enemies, shall be as follows:

Position of Aliens.
"All alien enemies are enjoined to preserve the peace toward the United States and to refrain from crime against the public safety and from violating the laws of the United States and of the states and territories thereof, and to refrain from actual hostility or giving information, aid or comfort to the enemies of the United States and to comply strictly with the regulations which are hereby or which may be from time to time promulgated by the president, and so long as they shall conduct themselves in accordance with law they shall be undisturbed in the peaceful pursuit of their lives and occupations and be accorded the consideration due to all peaceful and lawabiding persons, except to far as restrictions may be necessary for their own protection and for the safety of the United States, and toward such alien enemies as conduct themselves in accordance with law all citizens of the United States are enjoined to preserve the peace and to

treat them with all such friendliness as may be compatible with loyalty and allegiance to the United States.
Penalties for Disobedience.
"And all alien enemies who fail to conduct themselves as so enjoined, in addition to all other penalties prescribed by law shall be liable to restraint or to give security or to remove, depart from the United States, and pursuant to the authority vested in me, I hereby declare and establish the following regulations, which I find necessary in the premises and for the public safety:

"1. An alien enemy shall not have in his possession at any time or place any firearms, weapons or implements of war or component parts thereof, ammunition, maxin or other silencer, arms or explosives or material used in the manufacture of explosives.

"2. An alien enemy shall not have in his possession at any time or place, or use or operate, any aircraft or wireless apparatus, or any form of signaling devices, or any form of cipher code or any paper, document or book, written or printed in cipher or in which there may be invisible writing.

"3. All property found in the possession of an alien enemy in violation of the foregoing regulations shall be subject to seizure by the United States.

Must Not Approach Forts.
"4. An alien enemy shall not approach or be found within one-half of a mile of any federal or state fort, camp, arsenal, aircraft station, government or naval vessel, navy yard, factory or workshop for the manufacture of munitions of war, or of any products for the use of the army or navy.

"5. An alien enemy shall not write, print or publish any attack or threat against the government or congress of the United States or either branch thereof, or against the measures or policy of the United States, or against the persons or property of any person in the military, naval or civil service of the United States, or of the states or territories, or the District of Columbia or of the municipal governments therein.

Residences Restricted.
"6. An alien enemy shall not commit or abet any hostile acts against the United States or give information, aid or comfort to its enemies.

"7. An alien enemy shall not reside in or continue to reside in, to remain in or enter any locality which the president may from time to time designate by an executive order as a prohibitive area.

"8. An alien enemy whom the president shall have reasonable cause to believe to be aiding or about to aid the enemy or to be at large to the danger of the public peace or safety of the United States, or to have violated or to be about to violate any of these regulations, shall remove to any locality designated by the president by executive order and shall not remove therefrom without permit, or shall depart from the United States if so required by the president.

"9. No alien enemy shall depart from the United States until he shall have received such permit as the president shall prescribe or except under order of a court, judge or justice, under sections 4069 and 4070 of the revised statutes.

"10. No alien enemy shall land in or enter the United States except under such restrictions and at such places as the president may prescribe.

May Compel Registration.
"11. If necessary to prevent violation of the regulations all alien enemies will be obliged to register.

"12. An alien enemy whom there may be reasonable cause to believe to be aiding or about to aid the enemy, or to be at large to the danger of the public peace or safety, or who violates or who attempts to violate, or of whom there is reasonable grounds to believe that he is about to violate, any regulation to be promulgated by the president or any criminal law of the United States or of the states or territories thereof will be subject to summary arrest by the United States marshal or his deputy or such other officers as the president shall designate, and confinement in such penitentiary, prison, jail, military camp or other place of detention as may be directed by the president.

"This proclamation and the regulations herein contained shall extend and apply to all land and water, continental or insular, in any way within the jurisdiction of the United States."

Call for Volunteers.
The president also issued a call for volunteers to bring the army and navy up to war strength, and gave his indorsement to the general staff army bill designated to obtain men by selective conscription.

"The necessary men," said the president in a statement, "will be secured for the regular army and the National Guard by volunteering, as at present, until, in the judgment of the president, a resort to selective draft is advisable.

"The principles embodied in the legislation presented by the war department to the military committee of the senate and house have my entire approval, and its specific recommendations embody the best judgment of the officers of the war department."

SHOULD SUPPORT RED CROSS
President Wilson Recognizes Society as Official Volunteer Aid Organization of the Country.

Washington, April 7.—"Relief work which is undoubtedly ahead of us" was referred to by President Wilson in a letter sent to the Washington branch of the American Red Cross, saying that as the official volunteer aid organization of the country the society should receive the generous support

of the American people. The letter was read at a meeting to raise funds for the local organization.


"In order that the relief work which is undoubtedly ahead of us should be made thoroughly efficient," the president wrote, "it is most desirable that it should be concentrated under one organization. The American Red Cross comes under the protection of the treaty of Geneva and has received due recognition from all foreign governments. Its status is thus definitely determined and assured."

We seem to be in need of a "food dictator" in this country.

When the war ends Uncle Sam may find himself with one foot in France and the other in Mexico.

A newspaper in Germany says if the German submarines fail Germany is lost, but expresses the belief that the subs will win the war.

The doctrine of the "divine right of kings" is responsible for more wars, blood shed, devastation and sorrow than all other devices the Devil ever invented to plague mankind.

The most welcome news that could be flashed over the world just now would be: "The war is ended." May it come before American boys have to go to Europe to fight either on land or sea.

The United States flag is already on the battle front in France used by the foreign Legion Aviation Corps. Fritz will see more of that flag than he ever dreamed of if unfortunately the war should drag along for another year.

Of course the American people, as a rule, are not mad at the people of Germany, and do not want to destroy them as a nation, but do want to hobble the Kaiser so as to make it impossible for him ever again to disturb the peace of the world.

Do not place much confidence in a revolution in Germany to overthrow the Kaiser while the war is going on. What will happen to the Kaiser after the war is another thing, and the one thing that is prolonging the war. The Kaiser dare not admit defeat and it will be the duty of the allies against him to force him to admit defeat.

The German government professes to believe, the entry of the United States against them is of no importance. They treat America with contempt; call our government a dwarf making faces at a giant, Germany. It will be the duty of our army to knock about fifteen millions of tons of self-conceit out of the Reventlows of Germany.

To a Texan in the Canadian army falls the distinction of being the first American to carry the American flag in battle in the European War. The Texan, name not given, carried the Stars and Stripes in the desperate fighting in France Monday, and was wounded. Texas will be there when the fighting begins by the American army.

We used to laugh at the glib-tongued orators who dealt with millions as referred to money, but this war is talking in billions while pop orators talked in millions.

The first step of our government is a proposition to issue five to six billion dollars in bonds to finance the war for one year. The federal government only spent three billion dollars in the four years of civil war. The warring nations of Europe have spent money in such large sums the human mind cannot comprehend them.

One of the mysteries of this war is why the German Kaiser and the Prussian Military clique that surround him seem so indifferent to the United States entering the war. They have treated this country with about as much respect as if it were a fifth or six rate power. The newspaper comment in Germany shows that the German people are either woefully

ignorant or grossly deceived about the people of this country. The Kaiser clique in Germany either believed this country would not enter the war either because it was afraid of the German sentiment in this country, or they deliberately provoked war for some unknown reason.

Editor Geo. M. Kerr has sold the Clyde Enterprise to Mr. E. F. Butler, who assumed charge of the paper last week. We regret to see Mr. Kerr retire from the newspaper business, but glad to learn that he will remain at Clyde, where he is engaged in the real estate business. We wish for the Enterprise unbounded prosperity under Mr. Butler's management. We want to see every town and community in the county grow and the best agency for the development of any town is a live, clean newspaper.

We should not place too much reliance on a revolution in Germany to end the war. No doubt part of President Wilson's message was intended to foster this idea in the Germans mind, but we doubt if it will have any serious effect with the German people. For centuries Prussia that now dominates all Germany and her allies, has been a war like people and for fifty years more so than ever. The German is trained to believe that kings rule by divine right and that the first duty of a citizen is to obey orders from his superior without question. The German people, as a whole, are the best trained people on earth for both peace and war, and to such an extent has the state, backed by the military castes, so completely submerged the individual in the state that it is difficult to do anything with them.

There is little likelihood of a successful revolution in Germany during the war yet it might come. The greatest danger to the Kaiser and his family will be when the war ends even if successful to German arms; and almost certain if there are defeated which so far as human ken goes will end in defeat for the Kaiser. That is why he is anxious to patch up a peace that will enable him to claim a victory to satisfy his own people. For this reason the war must be fought to a finish.

WHY CONSCRIPTION?

We are willing to concede most anything to the national Administration in conducting the war, but the effort of the army officers to force conscription on the country at this time we believe is wholly unnecessary and most unwise. We condemn Germany's outrageous military machine and here the army officers of this government are trying to ram the same system down American throats. Conscription may be necessary later on, but we do not believe it will be.

Regular army officers have always had a contempt for a volunteer army.

England has not had compulsory military service for a century, until this war, and as we understand it has not a general conscript law now, only partial we believe, and England is bearing all the brunt of the war on sea and the greatest part of it on land.

If Congress lets the Military fanatics of this country control they will turn this country into a military oligarchy, worse than Germany's, if possible.

Lets go slow. Americans have never flickered when called on for service. Let them have their volunteer units and we will meet any force on earth.

The American army officer is a splendid fighter and capable as a rule, but his game is to fight and train great armies, and he wants the most complete military machine possible, that is right of course, but there is a dangerous side opposite that Americans have always feared, and it is the domination of the army. That is what ruined Germany and plunged the world into war. "Conscription does not sound good to Americans, but if the time comes that is necessary to make victory sure, then all will submit cheerfully. Lets not lose our heads about military "preparedness."

The Kaiser to Hollweg: "Say Hollweg, what other popinjay nation has declared war against "ME" today?"

Hindenberg does not seem to be so successful against the French and English as he was against the Russians. Is "Old Hindenberg" Germany's last hope doomed to failure, too?

A German paper dismisses President Wilson's message to Congress by saying; it starts out with a falsehood and ends with blasphemy. As President Wilson's message was a scathing arraignment of the German Kaiser, the German paper must really believe that the Kaiser is what he claims to be, God's vicegerent on earth to execute his vengeance upon sinful nations. The late Elbert Hubbard once said, "The Kaiser talked about God as if he was always waiting in the ante chamber of the puffed up German ruler to serve his every whim." If any ruler of the present generation is guilty of blasphemy it is the Emperor of Germany who has been strutting up and down Europe for a quarter of a generation preaching the power of armed force while pretending to favor peace. This man who lauded the acts of Attila the unspeakable Hun, and imitated him in his unspeakable devastation of little Belgium and Northern France. No wonder the whole world is rising against such a ruler. No rest or peace should be given until he and his house are destroyed root and branch. We do not mean murdered as he has caused the Belgian and French non-combatant citizens to be murdered, but removed from power so that they can never again curse the world as they have by this unholy war. The Hapsburgs of Austria are no better than the Hohenzollerns of Germany, or Romanoffs of Russia, and deserve the condemnation of the civilized world for starting this war, even if it is true that Austria was only the puppet of the German Kaiser, who refused every effort of other nations to stay the hand of old Francis Joseph in his outrageous demands on Serbia that started the war. The old Emperor is dead and has had to appear before the "Great Judge" for his cowardly act in attacking a weak nation. His House, that has been more of a curse than a blessing to his country is liable to join the Hohenzollerns and Romanoffs in private life. It will be the brightest day in the world's history when autocracy in Russia, Germany, Austria and Turkey is destroyed.


