# Here's Why We Are Apprehensive

some "harsh words" directed at some OPS practices by the Friona Star. The daily was not criticising the Star, simply quoting us.

The particular instance cited was that of applications being required before any stock fair, show, or exhibit could be held, with permission consequently granted by the OPS for the club or show stock to be sold at the fair and slaugh-

Are we radical? Picture this situation as we sincerely see it and judge for yourself: So far as we have been able to learn, there has been no difficulty incurred by any show in securing permission to hold. And there has been no demying of any club boy of the right to sell his stock. The business transastions have been made just as though there were no OPS, EXCEPT that the applications were required and the paper work was supposedly imperative, and as we see it a great deal of foolish time and money was spent in administering this ruling that acfually affected the buyer and seller in no way at all.

This trend is dangeroous. At a time in our history when essentials should hold the limelight bureaus are taking priority with their excessive administrative costs and red tape. The fundamentals of American enterprise are based moon self-reliance, self-government, and individual initiative, NOT, MIND YOU on guardianship by a multitude of bureaus. The courts of the land can adequately administer justice; the law enforcement bodies can maintain law and order; a wise administration can formulate policies; and an aggressive, freedom-loving people can prosper, WITHOUT the ever-present shadow of same newly created bureau - and there is one to check most every operation of your business or

We note the Dallas Morning News has quoted even your private lives. You may be acquainted with the efforts to place search-warrants in the hands of bureau employees in the Rio Grande valley region for the purpose of searching a man's own premises for "wet-back" Mexicans. This is a grim and stricking example of the dangers of excessive "guardianship". Already there are courts of law and the policing departments, set up by our constitution, for issuing and serving search warrants - and when a bureau employee is necessary to parallel these functions - then it's time for harsh words!

> Maybe the consequences of the trend has not affected you, individually, as yet, but they have affected many others, people who actually have become apprehensive and "afraid" of government edicts and representatives. This in a democratic government where you and I are supposed to be self-governing through the due process of the election laws. Fear is actually creeping into the lives of a great cross-section of America. Fear of the future, fear of breaking some ruling at the present, fear of the visit of the inspector. And fear breeds violations, certainly. These are not pretty words, they are not healthy observations and definitely not good publicity but they are correct reports of actual con-

> As long as freedom of the press remains, we shall continue our insistance upon return of government to the bodies set up by the constiution, the soundest document we know and the fairest system of government yet devised by man. When this or that politician or that appointed bureaucrat attempts substitution for these fundamental principals, then watch out America and move over Russia for we'll be following in your beaten path of un-Godliness and chaos.



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
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
