It is reported that the Office Plenty Screwy made the move on Christmas Tree lights solely MSA, successor to the Marshall Plan, has been getting all helper. The OPS wanted Santa Claus to know that they, too, stand strictly with him.

* * *
That was because just a few days before, the MSA gave away \$29,294,000 worth of materials to Europe, including \$700,000 worth of scarce paper to France. In fact, France did quite well, getting slightly more than \$14 million for the homeland, another \$2-1/3 million for her colonies.

But of course, other nations weren't left out either. The land of sweetness and democratic principles under Dictator Tito, Yugosiavia, got quite a big ioad of coal, shipped from the U.S., France got over a million dollars worth of copper stripped from the U. S. limited stockpiles, and Greece got a half million dollars worth of coffee.

But in addition to raw materials, Europe is now receiving millions of dollars worth of U. S. manufactured goods almost every day such as motors, tractors, engines, other apparatus.

And from all over Europe come reports of mounting unemployment in European industrial centers because of surpluses.

It seems the European cartel industries cannot afford to hire labor to build equipment and machinery, when they can get it for little or nothing through the generosity of the U. S. It is parent that while at home bureaucrats engage their time on trivia such as Christmas tree lights in April, and soft shell clams, the U.S. has yet to come to grips with the crux of both the domestic and foreign problem which is the rapid growth of monopoly and cartel systems.



Should the Senate fail to override the veto, the matter will not come ack to the House Representatives and the tidelands legislation will have suffered another setbac. I say 'another setback' for the reason that a failure on the part of the Senate to override the veto does not mean that the issue is settled. This fight will never be relaxed until this matter is settled right and these lands returned to their rightful owners. Texas Herbicide Regulations

Reports of crop damages resulting from careless or misuse daily unless farmers and ranchers exercise normal precautions in chemical applications as the season advances.

Herbicides 2, 4-D and 2, 5-5-T are excellent for the control of weeds, mesquite and bus y growths. They are not 'poisons' s many believe. Instead, these hormone chemicals energize plants, causing them to literally grow themselves to death.

Most broad-leaf plants are suseptible to this growing action Rice, flax, grain sorghums and rasses are not affected, however, and for this reason, 2, 4-D and 2, 4-5-T are good solutions to use n these crops to keep down veed infestations.

But many crops, such as cotton can be severely damaged by hormone herbicides if adpacent fields you to come in and look over are sprayed carelessly.



Damage from herbicides is usually easy to recognize It causes mutations in the plant, sometimes making the leaves grow in odd shapes and to curl at the edges. Unless the accidental dosage is too great, however, the farmer may still make his crop, even though the yield might not be as much as before damage occurred.

One of the duties of the Texas Department of Agriculture is to inspect all ground and air equipment used in application of herbicides to see that it comes up to specifications of Texas Herbicide Regulations. The department also issues permits to those farmers, ranchers and commercial spraying companies who wish to apply herbicides to the land.

All dealers are required to keep sales records, and all spraying companies or individuals must applications for two years.

These regulations apply in cases where more than 20 acres re to be sprayd. A fee of 10 ents per acre is charged for permits. For plots less than 20 and more than 5 acres, no permit is required but written notice must given the department that chemicals are to be applied. For

Grass-Legume Silage High in Feeding Value

Silage occupies an important place in Trestock feeding in the United States. It has greater palatability, a higher carotene content, and is less wasteful in feeding than any other form of forage preserved on the farm. It can be made under conditions not favorable for curing dry fodder and hay, saving a larger percentage of leaves, green color, and total nutrients for feeding.

The silo can be made to perform The silo can be made to perform double-duty by filling it with the early summer lush-growth of grasses and legumes for cossible use during the hot, dry, summer months when green feed may be short or of poor quality, and if used then, the silo can be filled again in the late successory or fell with corn the late summer or fall with corn, sorghums or a late growth of grasses and legumes for winter

A variety of forage crops can be made into nutritious silage. Until recently, about 90 per cent of all silage produced was made from corn, about 8 per cent from sorghums, and less than 2 per cent from small grains or hay crops. The percentage of silage now made from hay and pasture crops may be considerably above 10 per cent, and the percentage is gradually increas-

High-yielding legume and grass hay and pasture crops are coming to be important silage crops in the North and Northeast. Legumes, or a combination of legumes and grasses make a better silage than grasses ensiled alone. These crops are higher in protein, carotene and minerals than corn or the sorghums. They produce the best silage when cut at, or slightly before, the best stage for hay. This stage is usually after heads emerge, but before bloom for grasses, and during early bloom for legumes

Non-legume crops such as corn, sorghums, or the grasses cut after heading out, ensiled either alone or with an equal part or less of leg-umes, will produce enough of the right kind of acids to make good silage. Legume crops and imma-cure grasses which are high in proand low in fermentable carbo hydrates should be wilted or have d, molasses or ground dry grains added as a conditioner or preserva-tive. Fine cutting, firm packing, and 58 per cent are the requisites for the production of good wilted silage from high-protein legumes and im-

Hay and pasture crops are usualy cut with a mower, raked into windrows with either a side-delivery or dump rake, and then loaded fed such silage.

on the wagons by hand or with a hay loader. Green crops often are not handled satisfactorily with the ordinary farm machinery. The ra pass over much of the material, and the loader fails to pick the windrows up clean. Hay loaders must be built for heavy duty. The use of a windrower attachment on the cutter bar of the mower saves the labor of raking, and also lessens the chances of stones being elevated onto the wagon or truck along with the green material.

Machines which will pick the hay crop up out of the windrow, and field chop and blow it into the trucks or trailers, are coming into common use. The same machine can be used for field chopping corn or hay crops for silage, and for harvesting fieldcured hay, or hay to be dehydrated

The composition of silage is usually similar to that of the green crop from which the silage is made. (See table.) Forage that is palatable and nutritious when put into the silo should be the same when taken out.
