### Can Republicans Win?

What the Republicans need to insure victory in the presidential election this year is three to five million new votes or a split among the Democrats. The Republicon party has been lagging behind in popularity for 20 years.

The Republicans since 1932 have shown a an increase in popular votes and the Democrats since 1936 have shown a decrease. The total, however, includes the solid South with heavy Democratic majorities that helped give the Democrats a margin of 3,364,000 votes in 1948.

In 16 states with 166 electoral votes the Republicans now hold the governorship plus a majority of Senate and House seats. These states are California, Oregon, Washington and Idaho in the West; North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Minnesota, Iowa and Wisconsin in the Middle West; and Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine in the

There are also 15 states with 190 electoral votes where Republicans hold either the governorship or a majority of Senate and House seats. These are Nevada, Arizona, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico in the West; Illinois, Michigan, Indiana and Ohio in the Middle West, and New Work, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Maryland and Delaware in the East.

If the Republicans can carry all these states in the presidential election they will have 356 electoral votes. They need only 266 votes to win. But why do the Republicans win so many state and congressional offices and lose in the presidential elections?

One reason is the influence of Washington bureaucracy propaganda on 18,000,000 persons who get federal treasury checks for services, relief and other handouts and 6,000,000 more who get money from federal contributions to state funds. Only 7,000,000 get checks drawn on funds from state and local government taxes.

The propaganda pressure of Washington bureaucracy on voters in states where the Republican majorities are small may be enough to keep the federal administration in office. In state elections this pressure may not be a factor.

Those receiving checks from federal funds directly and indirectly include over 2,000,000 civilian employes, over 5,000,000 under public assistance programs, over 4,000,000 under social security, over 5,000,000 getting veterans benefits and over 3,500,000 getting agricultural aid. If all these and others getting money from the federal government voted they would account for nearly half the number of votes cast in the 1948 presidential election.

Can the Republicans overcome this handicap in states where they have small majorities and win state elections? If they do they will have to make a real fight and show the high cost of government to the millions of voters who do not get money from the federal treasury and who did not take the trouble to vote in the last presiden-

age of the 2793 lots of seed offered for sale and sampled by the State as seriously misbranded. Both the federal and all State laws require that seed offered for sale be accurately labeled as to variety, purity, germination and weed seed content. In the first 3 years of record in Indiana, 1925, 1928 and 1929, the average misbranding was 33 per cent; in the years 1937-9, it was 15 per cent, and in the last 3 years (1949-51) it was only 4.1 per cent.
