# "Small Business"

An explanation of current attacks on the nation's anti-trust laws by many such as David Lillienthal, former head of the government's multi-million dollar experiment in socialism in the Tennessee Valley, is the action taken late last month by the Department of Justice.

# \* \* H. G. Morrison, Assistant Attorney General, released a 60 page printed report to the Senate Small Business Committee, headed by Senator John

Sparkman of Alabama, on C. W. Harder the history, and problems en-countered by the U. S. Department of Justice enforcing antitrust laws. \* \* \*
This report shows clearly the

part Justice Department had in winning World War II. And for the first time an indication is given why in early stages draftees drilled with wooden guns, and other make believe devices.

The Justice Department report states that just prior to Pearl Harbor, coutrol of the nation's resources was so closely tied up by a few organizations that it was difficult to get materials needed for defense.

American monopolies were

bound to foreign cartels. U. S. defense dragged because of international agreements on the use of raw materials and patents. Justice Department language on this point is quite clear.

Here it is, "One of the most startling disclosures resulting from the anti-trust investiga-

tions was the extent to which international cartels, particularly German industrial monopolies, had penetrated and secured control of the destinies of American business. As a result. if became clear . . . our industrial capacity and war potential had been seriously impaired by destructive cartel arrangements. These agreements limited American production, and use of technology, kept prices at high levels, prohibited American companies from engaging in world trade, and gave important production information to potential

enemies." Today, there are signs the same thing is taking place.

One example is the world wide controlled materials plan imposed on the United States by State Secretary Dean Acheson.

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

Hidden Ball Plan On Tidelands Nipped In The Bud

A plan was afoot between the Secretary of the Interior and the President to by-pass Congress and seize the tidelands in the event the veto of the Holland bill was sustained by Congress. Under the present situation the Executive Department has no authority to lease the tidelands. Even if the Senate should uphold the President's veto of the Holland bill, the Executive Department still would not have power to traffic in these lands. The secret plan that was afoot was a plan to use an old 1949 surplus property law under which GSA Administrator Larson had signed an order in April delegating authority to Secretary of Interior Chapman to dispose of oil and gas on the continental shelf. The Secretary of the Interior had gone so far as to submit the plan to oil company representatives and testified that these representatives had told him that they would be satisfied with such plan and would accept leases thereunder. All of this information and the tactics and scheming indulged in had been kept from Congress until Senator Holland made some charges on the Senate Floor on July 9th. After these charges had been made, the entire picture began to unfold and the opposition built up so strong and so fast that the Secretary of the Interior advised the Senate Judiciary Committee last Thursday that he and the President had abandoned the design to use this old law. 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

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

# Notice To Wheat Farmers

# New Regulations on Marketing of Wheat

Are Announced by the

# Federal Food and Drug Administration

As Grain Dealers of this area, we feel that all farmers producing Wheat and Grain should be advised of the new Food and Drug Law Administration program so that you will be ab le to prepare yourselves against certain financial losses not heretofore a primary consideration in determining the market value of Wheat: All farmers should know that soon all elevator operators will be forced to examine carefully all deliveries wheat by the farmer for signs of insect infestation and rodent and bird contaminations. The approximate tolerances are as follows:

- (1) Wheat Can not have more than 3 weevil exit hole kernels in 100 Grams (approx. 4200 kernels of Wheat
- (2) Wheat can not have more than an occasional rat or mouse excrement pellet.
- (3) Wheat can not have but an occasional bird excrement pellet.
- (4) Wheat can not have an excessive amount of filth.

These regulations are in the interest of all people and every effort should be made o encourage we handlers of wheat, that wheat is a human food and must be handler as food.

Remember that wheat with a high moisture content is an invitation to weevil infestation, heat damage and musty wheat.

# The Above Regulations also Apply to FARM STORED WHEAT

Your Grain Dealers cannot accept grain if it does not conform to the requirements necessary to be fit for human consumption. In order to avoid severe penalties for contaminated grain, all farm storage bins must be made bird-proof and rodent proof. Bins should be cleaned and treated for weevil infestation before grain is stored. Where grain cannot be turned it should not be stored when the moisture content is in excess of 12%.

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# How to Make Efficient Grass-Legume Mixture

Experience of farmers the country over and trials at agricultural experiment stations, have all shown greater yields and continued productivity of forage and greater livestock gains for grass-legume combinations as compared with either a grass or a legume sown alone. Increases of from 40 to 60 per cent in forage and gains in live weight of animals are not

Mixtures should vary according to the purpose intended and the prevailing soil and climatic conditions. Under most conditions simple mixtures of 2 to 4 species are preferable but sometimes more complex mixtures containing 5 or more species are desirable.

The advantages of a mixture can best be assured by giving careful study to its composition. Some considerations which are under human control, are the following:

1. If there are great variations in the moisture available in different parts of the field because of lay of the land or changing sea sons, choose a grass and a legume that like wet conditions and an other of each that thrives with less water. This will help maintain the desired grass-legume relationship over the whole field.

2. If high yields of roughage are desired to be fed with grains or other concentrates, the highest yielding species that are sufficiently palatable and nutritious, to be consumed and utilized by the particular livestock for which intended may be chosen. If the ra

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
