Lazbuddie high school registration will be held tomorrow (Friday) according to announcement by Supt. J. G. Ward. Busses will run for the first time Monday morning at which time the elementary and grade school students will be registered;

Mr. John Brown will do departmental work in the 4th, 5th and 6th grades; Brown comes from Texas Tech. Miss Peggy Haynes returns as 3rd grade teacher, and Mrs. Melba Bowers returns as 1st grade teacher.

Woman Remains In Critical Stage After Sun. Crash

One woman still remains in critical condition today at the Parmer County Community Hospital as result of a head-on car and pick-up collision Sunday night east of Friona on Highway 60.

Mrs. William Vance Walker, 28, is receiving treatment in the hospital here, suffering from a concussion and fractured pelvis. Five people were involved in the collision. A 1951 Pontiac 2-door was being driven west by W. V. Walker, 29, of the Clovis Air Base. In this car besides the driver were Mrs. Walker and Mr. and Mrs. Lionel Johnson, also of Clovis.

The '46 Ford pick-up was driven by Sam Jones of Friona. Jones was hospitalized until Wednesday afternoon with a broken shoulder blade. Late yesterday he was carried to Farwell where he was lodged in jail and charged with second offense, driving while intoxicated.

Walker and Johnson received emergency treatment at the local hospital Sunday night and were dismissed Monday morning. Later Mrs. Johnson was transferred to the air base hospital at Clovis.

According to investigating highway patrolman Kirkwood, the wreck occurred near the Owen Seaman's headquarters just east of Friona when the pickup, headed east, forced two vehicles off the road before colliding head-on with the Walker vehicle.

Bovina Registers 38 Seniors-Juniors

Twelve seniors were registered at the Bovina High School on Monday of this week, and twenty six juniors were enrolled on Tuesday. Other students will register Monday, Sept. 1st, beginning at 9:00. The school classes are scheduled to begin on Tuesday and lunch will be served in the cafeteria.

Anticipated enrollment of the Bovina Schools is near 245 students with about 80 of these being in the high school.

Ratliff, coach and science; Mr. R. E. Everett, Mathematics and High School principle; and Mr. W. H. Willoughby, Superintendent.

New teachers at the Bovina Schools include Mrs. Hazel Rigdon, formerly of Achille, Okla., teaching the 4th grade. Mrs. A. M. Bradley comes to Bovina from Sudan, and she will teach the 5th grade. There are two new high school teachers: Mrs. Eva Simpson from Omaha, Tex., will teach English, and Mrs. Norma Osborn Mayben who comes from Baton Rouge, La., in the commercial teacher. Mrs. Mayben is no stranger to this vicinity, being the daughter of Jess Osborn of Muleshoe.

Cafeteria workers will include Mrs. Helen Wasson, Mrs. Lee Thompson and Mrs. Buck Lloyd. During the summer the school has purchased and installed a new dishwasher and sterilizer and a new electric steam table for the cafeteria. These are large new appliances and will be of great benefit to the cafeteria workers.

Seniors of the Friona High School will register this Friday afternoon to commence the 1952-53 school term activities. The Seniors are asked to register between the hours of one o'clock and three o'clock in the afternoon, Principal Dillie Kelley announced.

Juniors will register Saturday morning between the hours of Eight and Ten, according to the announcement.

Neither of these groups will have to report again until after the Labor Day week end, beginning their classes Wednesday morning. No activities of any kind are scheduled for Monday, Labor Day.

Busses will run for the first time on Tuesday morning, at which time grades 1 through 10 will be registered. The busses will return students home at near lunchtime.

First full day of school will be on Wednesday, and the cafeteria will be in operation at that time, Superintendent Dalton Caffey has noted.

Cafeteria charges this year will be 30c and 35c, an increase from the previous 25c and 30c meals. This advance of prices was explained by Caffey as being due to decrease in reimbursement from state source, together with lack of surplus commodities from which the cafeteria benefited last year.

Final touches are being applied in all departments and on the campus this week to ready the premises for the school opening. The new high school building is completed with exception of some small items of builders hardware, etc; most of the new furniture is in place with all promised for delivery before October 1st.

Fourth Grade: Both Mrs. Mabel Jones and Mrs. W. L. Edelman return.

John Parish also returns as principal; he received his Masters degree in schooling done this summer at NTSTC, Denton.

Two new faculty members will be in the Fifth Grade: Miss Martha Gibson, formerly teaching at Silver Valley, Texas, and

a Hardin-Simmons graduate; and Mr. Roy Rhodes, a graduate of Oklahoma City University and former teacher in Arkansas.

Tom Jarbo will return to teach in the Sixth Grade; another 6th grade teacher will be Mrs. Edna Polk who comes from teaching at Gerty, Oklahoma.

Mr. Lyndon Sanders, former Canyon teacher and WT graduate, will teach in the Seventh Grade, together with Mr. Harrison Cope, formerly of Amber, Oklahoma.

Mr. Bill Whitfield, W. T. graduate will conduct public school music in the grade school. Whitfield taught at River Road, north of Amarillo last year.

High school faculty personnel again will be headed by Principal Dillie Kelley.

J. T. Gee returns as head of the Vocational Agriculture program.

Mrs. Lyndon Sanders will be Homemaking instructor, coming to the Friona system from Canyon.

Mr. Lee Burnett comes as assistant football coach and head boys basketball coach. A graduate of Sul Ross College at Alpine, Burnett incidentally is a brother of Miss Marporie Burnett popular music teacher who formerly taught here but is teaching at Denver City this term.

Mrs. H. T. Carr remains in the local schools, teaching English in the high school this term.

John D. Fry is band director, and already has conducted several rehearsals for students in that department.

Raymond Cook returns as head coach and mathematics instructor.

Miss Gladys Elkins of Shawnee, Oklahoma, has been engaged as another high school instructor here; and Miss Tracey Smith of Oklahoma City will be science instructor. Miss Smith has taught the last eight years in the school system at Hot Springs, Arkansas.

We are blessed with a number of young folks of Mrs. Miller's energy—for instance there's Uncle John White who never ceases to amaze us with his keen observations and ready wit—to say nothing of his excessive energy.

A person who drives while intoxicated (DWI) breaks all the laws of decency in displaying any respect and regard for his fellowman.

And the silly characters who smile upon the indiscretions of the DWI are likewise a menace to decent society.

In other words, we have no patience with any contributing factor to drunken drivers loose on our highways.

And say what you please, spectres of the dead and permanently maimed in body or mind stalk every highway in our nation because of fools made more foolish emptying a bottle. Is it asking too much for each of us to exercise every precaution against the growth of this menace?

We've had long conversations with state highway patrolmen who are diligent in making arrests for DWI, and too often we've heard: "We've arrested 35 or 40 DWI's this month, but you know what happens? Your courts impose a minimum fine or otherwise let the culprit get by."

And upon talking to the judicial branch we've too often heard: "We want to do the right thing, and a lot of your good citizens have spoken in behalf of the charged party—stating that he's just a harmless fellow who likes his drink and seldom bothers anyone! Besides, we do not believe he'll do it again!"

In these instances, looks as if the public is the real guilty party, doesn't it? And those who condone, overlook, or embrace ARE GUILTY, believe me.

If you think we're being too harsh, please withhold voicing your displeasure until after you or some member of your family falls victim to a loose DWI, then come around and score us if you have the guts.

In the meantime, we hope the law enforcement bodies continue vigilance against these demons at the wheels; in fact we trust they will exercise a little extra care here—we can overlook a lot of other things if the law will really clamp down on the DWI; in fact we wouldn't care too much if parking regulations were overlooked in some instances even though it is bad business, we're sure, to park a (Continued on Back Page)

The Law and You

DO YOU KNOW what LAW is?

The term LAW has been defined in many different ways, and has many subdivisions and many special phases, but fundamentally it is an attempt by man to enforce the Golden Rule. Law is a set of rules which govern the relationships of individuals, organizations and institutions, and governmental bodies, individually, and in their associations and activities with each other.

Some of these rules change very seldom, such as the constitutional law. Some of these rules are amended, changed and substituted frequently, as in the case of legislative law. Some of these rules change slowly and gradually over a long period of years, as in the case of the interpretation of the laws made by the Courts. The rules by which we are governed today, are different from the rules which governed our forefathers two hundred years ago, but the rules by which our activities are governed constitute the law today. The rules by which our forefathers were governed constituted the law at that time. The law is in a constant process of change and revision, and thus our descendants a hundred years from now will have a different body of law than we have today. We can hope that fundamentally and basically the principals for which we stand will continue, but many new specific situations and problems will arise that we do not have at this time, and these will of necessity require laws to govern them.

Grass Roots

Press time again! I have been advised time and time again by people who know about writing such things as this that the way to do it is to write a part of the column every day. I am sure that they are right, but can't seem to get around to it until the last minute. At any rate maybe I can find something to fill up space between now and the noon deadline.

Looks like farmers and ranchers are a little weary of paying the high price of alfalfa hay. I have no way of knowing how many acres of alfalfa will be seeded but it will be sizeable. Seems like everytime I get settled someone is picking up alfalfa seed and a seeder. There are several varieties of alfalfa adapted to this area but the most commonly used one is southwest Common Every season there is a lot of heated discussion about Texas seed versus California or Arizona seed. There is little doubt in my mind about the comparison between Texas and these other states but in so far as the seed is concerned there is little difference. This is a pretty fast statement and I imagine I will get a raise out of someone on it, but I have the statements of some of the big hay growers around the country to back me up. A new strain of alfalfa, BUFFALO, was seeded here last Fall by Richard Ireland and considerable interest has developed from this seeding. Richard reports a quick hearty growth and a very fine stem hay. The selling point of the strain is that it is resistant to Alfalfa Wilt, and that plague of the hay fields is beginning to show in the High Plains area.


Speaking of the Irelands for a minute. Woodrow has a good demonstration of Hubam Clover seeding south of Hereford a few miles. The clover is making seed now and the field is white with blossoms. Woody seeded the Hubam into wheat early this

Spring and the growth that the clover has made is something considering the amount of moisture it received. Woody also has quite a stand of Pinto Beans on his home place here in Hereford. A lot of different ways to get organic matter back in the soil end build up the Nitrogen content of the soil at the same time.

Want o keep reminding you that it is time to get your plans made for Fall seeding of permanent pasture. This practice is definitely out of the test tube stage now and is a money maker on every irrigated farm. There is going to be a big demand for pasture here this winter and Spring and if you don't want live stock of your own there will be plenty of cattle-men who will be hounding you for pasture. If you don't believe this take a short trip in any direction and you will find the pastures burned up from the drouth. The Vetch and Rye fields will bring in a lot of return this winter and spring also. Irrigated pastures and Vetch fields were bringing \$1 a hundred per month last year, and all indications are that they will do it again this year. Get 'em seeded early and get some Fall grazing.

There has been a lot of Fungus showing up in the lawns around town. The common name of the stuff is Brown Patch and shows up as a circle of dead grass. This circle continues to grow until it has taken up the entire yard. Mercury compounds and other highly poisonous fungicides are effective on this disease, but as stated are highly poisonous. Mr. Robert Viegel found a compound in Amarillo that is put out by the Dupont Chemical Corporation that seems to be stopping Brown Patch in his lawn. Would be wise to watch the lawns pretty close for a few weeks.

Baked Salmon Croquettes
1 cup soft bread crumbs
1-2 teaspoon salt pepper.
1-2 teaspoon dry mustard or
1-4 cup diced onion.
2 tablespoons melted table fat.
1-2 cup milk
1 pound can salmon.
2 eggs (reserve 1-2 egg to coat croquettes)
Fine, dry bread crumbs.
Combine the crumbs with the seasonings, Onions, and table fat. Add the milk, the liquid from the canned salmon, and the slightly beaten eggs; mix well. Flake the salmon and add to the egg mixture. Spread on a plate and chill in refrigerator for about 30 minutes. Shape into croquettes about the size of an egg. Beat remaining 1-2 egg with 1 tablespoon evaporated or fresh milk. Roll in fine crumbs, then in egg and again in crumbs and place in greased shallow baking dish. Bake in a moderate oven 350 F. about 30 minutes or until brown. Serves 4 to 6.

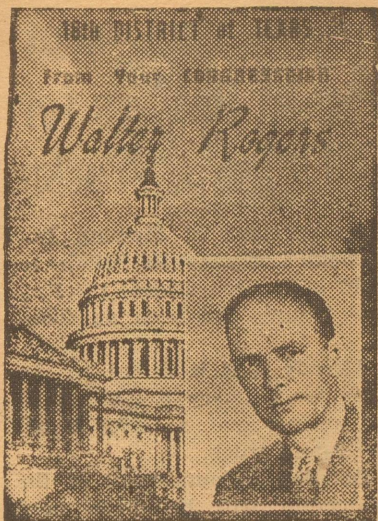

CANADIAN RIVER DAM

The need of an ample water supply in the Panhandle of Texas has been established beyond any reasonable doubt. Any argument to the contrary would have little force in view of the drought from which we have suffered. This need has long been recognized by those who are familiar with all of the facts. It is good that some questioned the feasibility of such a project and required all necessary facts in justification of it. This procedure eliminates the possibility of a "pork barrel project." Certainly the Panhandle of Texas is not interested in a pork barrel project, and I do not believe the people of West Texas would even think of tolerating such. Although the progress has appear-

ed slow on this project, it has been substantial. The bill as originally passed was an authorization for the construction of the project when funds were available. At the passage of this authorization commitments were made to the effect that appropriations would not be sought until the emergency was over. These commitments were made to senators who were objecting to the passage of the legislation and whose objection would have killed the measure and required the introduction of a new bill and the loss of all progress that had been made up to that date. Efforts are now being made to satisfy these senators that the project is necessary and seeking release from these commitments. All necessary legislation in addition to the original authorization has been passed save and except the appropriation for the actual construction of the dam. As most of you know, preliminary survey work has been going on this summer and much detail work has been accomplished. Our efforts here will continue and we hope to obtain some definite action in the next Congress.

The Cattle Feed Situation:

The tragic disaster that has hit the cattle people is going to do great damage to our section. The Department of Agriculture advises me that there is no grain available for feed purposes for the reason that there is no oats, barley or sorghum stored in Texas by the government. This certainly came as a surprise to me in view of the tremendous amount of feed raised in Texas. The department advises that the facilities for storage are being used for wheat, which is of course too high for the farmer, rancher or feeders to use. The nearest available grain is corn stored in Kansas, which must be sold at 105 percent of the support price, plus a carrying charge. This means that the price would be several cents more than the same corn could be purchased on the open market. There is only one source of relief for the cattle people insofar as the Federal Government is concerned, and that is Public Law No. 875, having to do with the President's Emergency Fund. In order for these funds to be used a request must be made of the President by the Govern-

nor of the state desiring such relief. If the request of the Governor is honored by the President and the particular area designated as a "disaster area" the funds from this source are earmarked for use in relief of such situation.

It is encouraging to note that many seeking public office or re-election are speaking favorably of the possibility of some tax relief. There was much ado in the last Congress about the various cuts in appropriations. The president now acknowledges that by reason of this economy wave, progress has been made toward a balanced budget. It is my considered opinion that a continuation of this economy wave, plus the closing of tax loopholes will result in a surplus in the 1953-54 fiscal year, and there is still a possibility that the 1952-53 fiscal year will not result in a deficit. If such is the case, we can of course get tax relief sooner than expected. I am glad to see the trend downward in government spending and hope that the speed of this trend will increase in the next Congress. The cuts made by the last Congress have proven that there are many services that the people can do without and not be missed. There are some services that can be abolished without undue interference to the public. If these can bring about early tax relief, certainly they should be abolished.

Importance of Legumes

Now is the time to make plans for those fall legume plantings. It doesn't take a student of the soil to know that legumes properly fertilized and inoculated have excellent effects on the soil structure and condition.

Texas A&M agronomists depict the best soil structure as being crumbly or granular to allow for deep penetration by roots and water. Proper air circulation between the small particles of soil is also necessary.

Some Texas soil is so packed and tight that very little water or air can penetrate it. Deep rooted legumes such as sweet clover and alfalfa on these tight soils can help to improve this fault. Legumes which add good organic matter and nitrogen to the soil content, but which do not necessarily open subsoils are vetch, winter peas, annual yellow sweet clover and crimson clover.

Another farming 'bug-a-boo' is the type of land which has a heavy dense sub-soil at a comparatively shallow depth. These sub-soils restrict the movement of plant roots and hinder circulation of water and air. Good remedies for this condition are deep rooted legumes or grasses which will punch holes in the sub-soil and aid the water-air-root conditions.

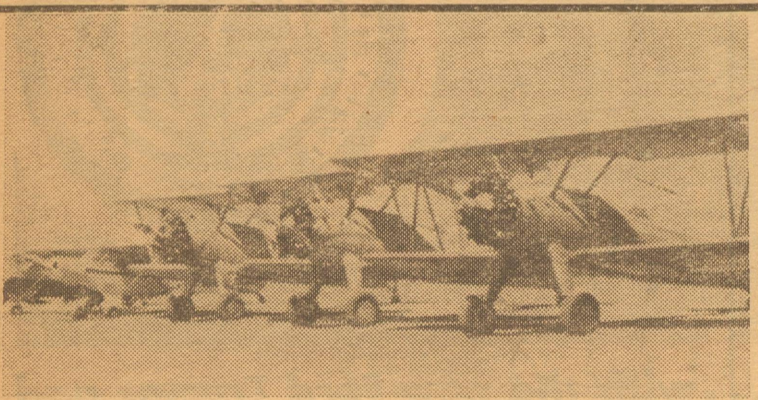
When plowed under the soil as a green manure crop, legumes increase the organic matter of the land. This matter helps hold the small soil particles together and improves the granular quality of the soil structure. High organic matter in the soil almost assures the best type of air circulation and absorption of water which is so essential to plant life.

The farmer who is unsure of the qualities of his soil can get professional help and advice. Soil samples taken from fields where legumes are to be grown should be sent to the Soils Laboratory, College Station, Texas, for analysis. This analysis will determine what kind and the amounts of fertilizers needed to make legume growing more successful in the various soil-type areas of Texas.

Legal Notice

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

No. 38

Providing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund

from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an education and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

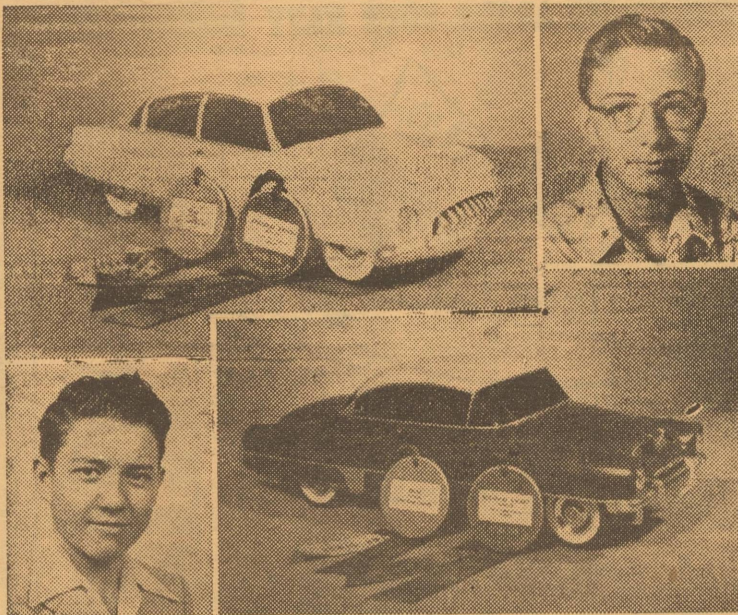

in Bovina, Texas, is now serving in Germany with the 2d Armored "Hell on Wheels" Division.

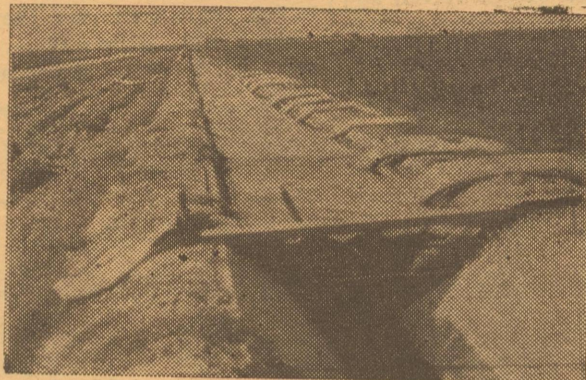
