Commissioner Mason is shedding tears over the fact that the Robinson - Patman Act, one of the nation's most effective andtrust laws. made it imper-

ative for the

FTC to order C. W. Harder the Independent Grocers Alliance, known as IGA, to cease taking brokerage commissions on foods bought for the independent wholesalers and retailers comprising the organization.

In the past, when the FTC has invoked the Robinson-Patman Act, against big interests such as in the Standard Oil of Indiana case, the case against the cement companies on basing point prices, and more recently the decision on tire discounts. Mason wrote the minority report.

\* \* \*

However, in this case affecting an organization of independent food operators, he not only sided with the majority, but also wrote an extra majority report.

And in this report, he prophesies the doom of independent business everywhere because of this order against IGA forbidding it to collect brokerage fees to finance the work of IGA.

\* \* \*

And he blames it all on the

Robinson-Patman Act, but in so doing, he overlooks a lot of water that has gone over the dam. Before the Robinson-Patman

This time of the year, when the | Act was found to forbid a buyer collecting brokerage fees, many big chains used this to buy their goods at a lower price.

This fact Commissioner Mason overlooks, stating in his report There is no doubt that some chains used the brokerage subterfuge as a means of covering up unlawful price discriminations, but it could have been stopped under the Federal Trade Commission Act."

\* \* \*
Significantly, however, the practice was not stopped until the Rob-inson-Patman Act was invoked.

Other organizations of independent grocers in the past affected by this law, have continued to grow and prosper. Both the Red and White Stores

and National Retail Owned Grocers are making gains without collecting brokerage fees. \* \* \*

But through his written report Mason strongly implies that the

solution for IGA is a repeal of the Robinson-Patman Act. Such an action would, of course, leave the chains free to pursue practions which would make it even more difficult for independents.

And what makes Commission-

er Mason's tears for the plight of small business, cruelly confined by the Robinson-Patman Act which he reluctantly must invoke, inconsistent are his frequent decisions against using the law against monopoly. He has too often voted to uncage the lions to now be effective as a bleeding heart for independent business. It all sounds like more propaganda to wreck the nations anti-trust laws.
