When farmers didn't have 90 per cent parity for crops.
When jackrabbits were known as Hoover Hogs;
When they told us prohibition was a noble experiment. It was.

An Open Letter To Rep. Sam Rayburn

"I listened to your address to the people of Texas in which you stated that a vote for Steyenson and the Democrats were the surest way to get back the tidelands of Texas. You also stated that if it had been handled in the right way, we would probably have them back now.
Now, Mr. Rayburn, I think and the people of Texas think you should answer a couple of questions. First, how did we come to lose our title to this land in the first place? Also, who is responsible? Now if you and Mr. Connally and Mr. Johnson know so well how this could have been handled, why is it you didn't do something about it? After all you are to serve the people and not master them. None of you ever raised your voice in defense of this great heritage of ours. Not because you thought it would be wrong, but because you were afraid of your political life in Washington. Just remember you are elected by the voters of Texas.
You tell us how much better times are for us and our families. Of course, everyone has more money than they did in 1931-32. Cotton was five cents a pound and wheat was 25 cents a bushel. Then, I wonder, if you remember in 1937 after four years of the New Deal prosperity and the first good cotton crop we had to send Marvin Jones several telegrams and finally got a 7-cent loan per pound on cotton in order to get it off our hands. We never did get anything more for it.
"Without the war we would still have seven-cent cotton, 35-cent wheat, six-cent cattle and seven-cent hogs. So let us not be fooled, Mr. Rayburn and my fellow Americans. For every dollar of prosperity we enjoy, some fine American boy sleeps beneath the soil of a foreign land. He died thinking he had helped make the world safe for democracy. He frown on that battlefield, but our little men in Washington lost the peace."

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WASHINGTON AND—
"Small Business"

A wily Persian, Mossadegh, Premier of Iran, is causing frenzied side stepping in Washington.

His current actions, plus the recent release of the long secret Federal Trade Commission report on the worldwide oil monopoly to the Senate Small Business Committee, could, and may, blow the lid off the cozy control plan of Big Oil.

A British firm, Anglo-Iranian, had the oil concession in Iran. The FTC report shows this British company is linked with Standard and other U.S. companies, to peg oil prices.

Iran disagreed with the royalties paid for its irreplaceable petroleum. The merit of the issue is a matter for conjecture. The FTC report states Persian Gulf Oil sold to the U. S. Navy for \$1.05 during the war, and to the Marshall Plan for \$1.88, costs from 27 to 40 cents per barrel to produce including royalties.

Perhaps the wily Persian took the viewpoint that if the world must pay such high prices for oil, Iran should get more.

The situation now became involved. Iran has 2 million tons of oil to ship, but no buyers.

None of the major American companies have made a move to buy oil from Iran despite their claims of fierce competition in the oil industry. Independent U. S. oilmen do not dare buy Iranian oil.

British published advertisements in U. S. threaten anyone attempting to buy the oil.

So in a non-communist world of supposedly free trade, that world is confronted with a buyer ready and able to sell, and no buyers.

Mossadegh has worked State Department into tight corner.

For one thing, State Department offered Iran \$10 million in U. S. taxpayers' cash to settle a claim Iran has against British Anglo-Iranian. It was refused.

State Secretary Dean Acheson then made the most startling offer of all. In writing he stated that the following condition "the freedom of Iran to sell its oil on other than a monopoly basis" is acceptable to the U. S. Thus, for the first time in years a high level U. S. official has recognized publicly monopoly practices in oil industry.

This official recognition of an oil monopoly, plus the Federal Trade Commission report on a world oil monopoly, could be the start of restoring the petroleum industry to a status of free competition, restoring opportunity to independent U. S. oilmen.

Consumers could also be relieved of the burden of an artificially supported price structure.

Big Oil seeks to establish the entire matter as Russian inspired. However, for a year Iran has had oil to sell, and despite boycott has not sold Russia.

While in desperation Iran may eventually be forced to the Russian market, it will be monopoly forcing that move. The entire fight with Iran has been to save the oil monopoly. If Iranian oil were sold to independents as well as the monopolists, it could end the cozy arrangement by which British and American interests peg oil prices around the world.

LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK



BY **TED GOULDY**

Most heartening news to livestock producers in weeks was the rally of cow prices at Fort Worth late last week and which carried over into Monday's trade. Cows sold Monday \$1 to \$2 above the low time last week. There was a better feel to the trade, though stocker demand remained very dull, and some signs of improving stocker demand at northern points were encouraging.

Lighter runs of sheep around the market circle set off a little rally in the sheep yards at Fort Worth Monday. Some lambs and some ewes sold 50 cents higher.

Hogs opened the week with a 25 cents higher to 25 cents lower market to top at \$18.50 to \$19 at Fort Worth. It was notable that hogs closed at the day's low points here and at other major markets. Sows drew \$14 to \$17.

The stronger tone to the market at Fort Worth and at other points around the market circle was particularly good news since October's twin gobblins, deteriorating ranges and heavy receipts, plumped calves and sheep to the lowest levels for the current crop and to the lowest point since OPA controls were removed in October, 1946, just a week ago.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings sold for \$23 to \$31 and common to medium sorts sold for \$13 to \$21, with cutter grades at \$10 to \$13. Fat cows sold for \$12.50 to \$15.50 and some heiferettes topped at \$18. Cannors and cutters sold for \$8 to \$13, few under \$8. Bulls drew mostly \$10 to \$17, a

few best to \$18 and above. Good and choice slaughter calves sold mostly at \$16 to \$22 and a few fancy heavies of 500 to 600 pounds drew \$22 to \$26 and better in the baby beef

class. Common and medium \$3.50 to \$5.25 at the close, with slaughter calves drew \$12 to old wethers from \$7 down, \$16 and culls sold for \$10 to Yearlings cashed at \$6.50 to \$16, \$12. Choice stocked steer calves and fat lambs sold from \$23 and steer yearlings sold at \$22 downward. Feeder and stocker down, sparingly, mostly \$21 lambs sold from \$8 to \$17, with down. A few cows went back cull slaughter lambs from \$6.50 to the country at \$12 to \$16. to \$8. Old Bucks sold from Slaughter ewes sold from \$3.50 to \$4.50.

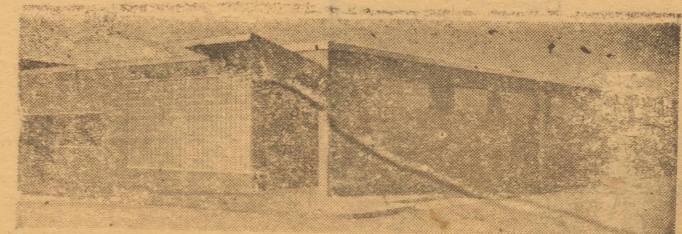

 On this the 8th day of September, 1952, the Commissioners Court of Parmer County, Texas, convened in regular session, at the regular meeting place there-of in the Courthouse at Farwell, Texas, with the following mem-

bers of the Court, to-wit:
 A. D. Smith, County Judge, E. R. Day, Commissioner Precinct No. 1, C. H. Jefferson, Commissioner Precinct No. 2, E. F. Billingsley, Commissioner Precinct No. 3, H. L. Ivy, Commissioner Precinct No. 4, being present, and, among other proceedings had by the Court were the following:
 Commissioner E. R. Day introduced an order and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Commissioner C. H. Jefferson. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Commissioners E. R. Day, E. F. Billingsley, C. H. Jefferson, H. L. Ivy;
 NOES: Commissioners None;
 The order is as follows:
 WHEREAS, at the general election held throughout the State of Texas on November 7, 1944, the qualified electors of the State, voting on the proposition, approved the amendment to Section 9, of Article 8, of the Texas Constitution, which amendment provides that the Commissioners Court in any county may re-allocate the county tax levies authorized in Section 9 of Article 8, by charging the rates provided for any of the purposes authorized in said Section by either increasing or decreasing the same, but in no event shall the total of such taxes exceed Eighty (80c) Cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for any one year, provided that before the Commissioners Court may make such re-allocations and changes in such levies the same shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county at a general or special election; and in event such re-allocations and changes are approved by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of any such county, such re-allocations and changes shall remain in force and effect for a period of six (6) years from the date of the election at which same shall have been approved, unless the same again shall have been changed by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of such county, voting on the proposition; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court of Parmer County, Texas, deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County to re-allocate the county taxes authorized by Section 9, Article 8, of the Constitution, by changing the dates in respect to certain county taxes as herein provided;
 THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF PARMER COUNTY, TEXAS:
 That a special election be held in said County on the 4th day of November, 1952, which is not less than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:
 "Shall the Commissioners Court of Parmer County, Texas, be authorized to levy and collect in each year for a period of six (6) years from the date of said election, county taxes as follows:
 Not exceeding fifty five Cents (55c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for County purposes;
 Not exceeding fifteen Cents (15c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for roads and bridges;
 Not exceeding five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, to supplement the jury fund of the County; and
 Not exceeding five Cents (5c) on the \$100.00 valuation, in any one year, for the erection of public buildings and other permanent improvements."
 In the event that the annual

levy of a tax not exceeding fifteen (15c) cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation for the further maintenance of the public roads of said County has heretofore been, or shall hereafter be, authorized by a majority of the qualified property taxpaying voters of the County, voting at an election held for that purpose, nothing herein shall be construed as rescinding or in any manner affecting the power and authority of the Commissioners Court to levy and to continue to levy said tax.
 The said election shall be held under the provisions of the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, particularly amended Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution, and Section 3a, Article 6, of the Constitution, and all persons who are legally qualified voters of said County, and who are resident property taxpayers who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election.
 The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

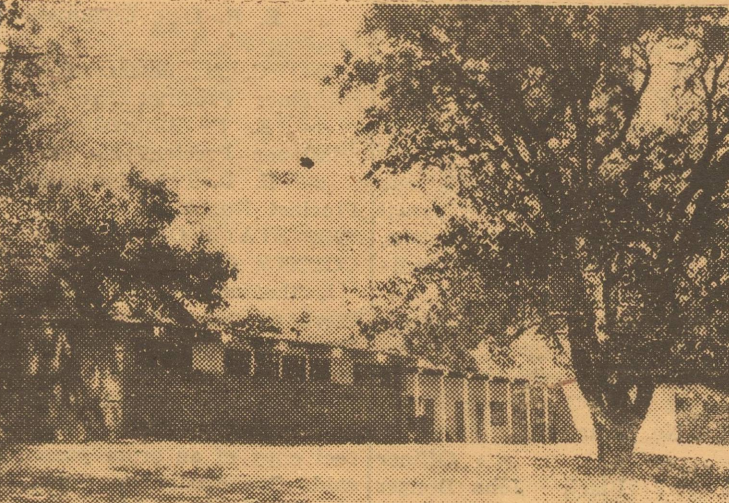
