Confused about the 'Tideland' References? Geologists - Engineers Attempt Clarification

A confusion has been established in the minds of people not only by the erroneous use of the term "tidelands" but also by an attempt to establish these offshore submerged lands to be of no economic importance to the State of Texas.

The offshore submerged lands of Texas and Louisiana are but a continuation of the Gulf Coast Embayment-a part of which is located on land, and part of which is covered by water. This strctural province coyers the en tire Gulf of Mexico, including the shore areas immediately surrounding it.

This geological province is a very large basin into which rivers, during millions of years, have deposited sediments many thousands of feet thick. Folding faulting, and uplifting through earth structural changes and piercement by salt masses have resited in the formation of reservoirs favorable for the accumulation of gas, oil, and sul-
