From a tax-roll list of only a few more than 700 eligible voters in the Friona box 654 were on hand to cast their vote for president.

Friona tally gave Eisenhower 454 votes and 200 for Stevenson.

Both amendments were rejected in the local box and at the county level.

Re-allocation of county taxes was favored 1082-738 in the county and 373-230 at the Friona box.

Voting for the major offices was as follows in the Parmer County boxes:

Eisenhower vote listed first: BLACK, 78-16; FRIONA, 454-200; BBOVINA, 221-128; FARWELL, 270-105; LAZBUDDIE, 172-90; OKLAHOMA LANE, 146-86; RHEA, 40-7; LAKEVIEW, 51-15; and absentee at 69-16.

With practically all of the state candidates cross-filed on the ballot, this very unusual circumstance in Texas resulted in two sets of votes to be tabulated for each office in these cases. For instance Price Daniel in his bid for the U. S. Senate received 1662 Demo - marked votes and 383 via the GOP route.

Other county totals were: Congressman - at large: Dies, 1652 R, 377 D.
Governor: Shivers, 1646 D, 383 R.

A sprinkling of write-ins was noted for most offices, but the totals were insignificant.

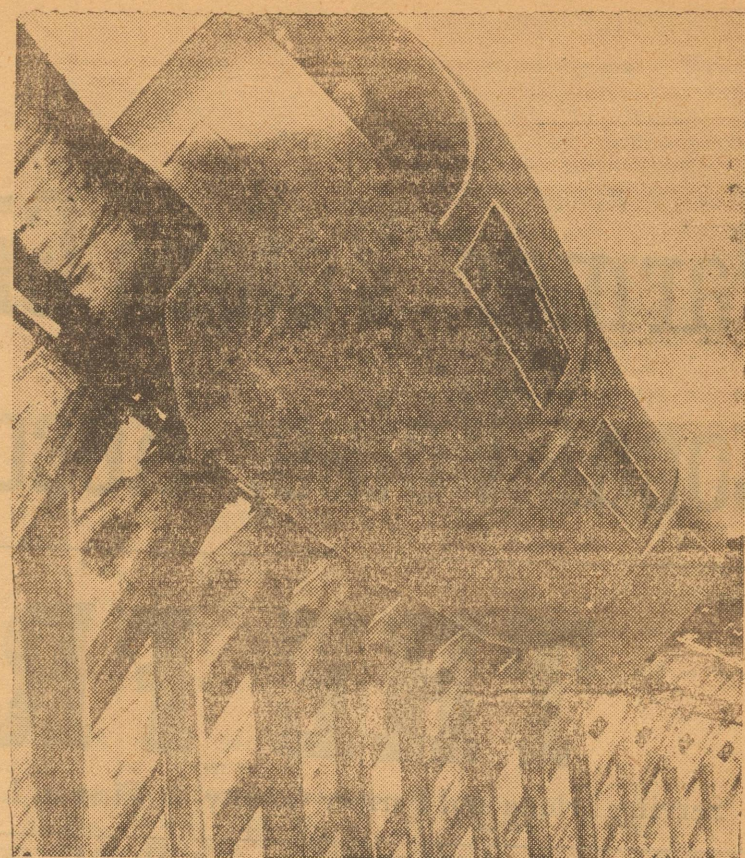

Answer to Question No. 1

Not if they are really frozen. Saw them at room temperature and call a doctor. Until you get help, wrap the frozen members warmly but keep them away from extreme heat, and rub above the frozen areas to increase circulation. New drugs that retard or prevent clotting of the blood are proving helpful in experiments with severe frostbite, reducing the number of amputations necessary.

Answer to Question No. 2: Yes. Due to the fast pace of modern life an extra burden is placed on the heart—taxing its strength beyond its normal ability. The problem of heart disease is also heightened by the increased life span. With more middle-aged and old-aged people to-

day, there are more "candidates" for this number one killer. Extensive research is making possible long and useful lives for thousands of persons afflicted with heart disease. Patients must carefully follow the advice of their physician to profit from the knowledge such research is building up on heart disease.

Answer to Question No. 3: Commonly known as TB meningitis, it is a tuberculous infection of the covering membranes of the brain. Formerly, the disease was always fatal. "Small Business"

At the end of a violently verbose presidential campaign, mail indicates voter confusion. This despite everything about the candidates from blood pressures to income taxes has been aired.

Many voters say they have heard learned discussions on Mongolia, Hindustan, Pakistan, fascism, communism, socialism, nepotism, existentialism, spiritualism, transism, latism, internationalism, isolationism, but little, if anything, about the United States of America.

Among other important domestic matters, both sides have been strangely quiet about the Office of Price Stabilization, or OPS.

Neither party can point in scorn with a clean finger because OPS created by a democratic-republican congressional coalition has survived by this coalition.

Many Washington observers feel OPS is the gravest threat ever poised at American freedom.

It is an American trait to laugh at the ridiculous. OPS is often called Office Plenty Serewy. Fifteen years ago Hitlerites were thought ridiculous until it was learned even ridiculous sounding demagoguery is dangerous.

OPS, in addition to reams of regular press releases, also has special releases for labor publications. For example, on September 29 alone, six propaganda pieces were sent to labor publications. The inspired work of four different OPS agents named Mason, Millken, Crossley and Barkley.

OPS Propagandist Mason re-

leased an essay on buying beef. He first establishes OPS regulations, requiring markets to identify grades of beef sold. The essay then gets complicated.

Most steaks must be trimmed so there is only one inch of outside fat. Presumably, the unspoken advice is for housewives to carry a measuring rule.

There are also stew meat rules. Diced stew meat with no more than 25% fat must not be cut smaller than one inch square; lean stew meat no smaller than 1 1/2 inches.

There are two grades of ground beef OPS says. The regular grade is limited to 25% fat; the lean grade is limited to 12% fat.

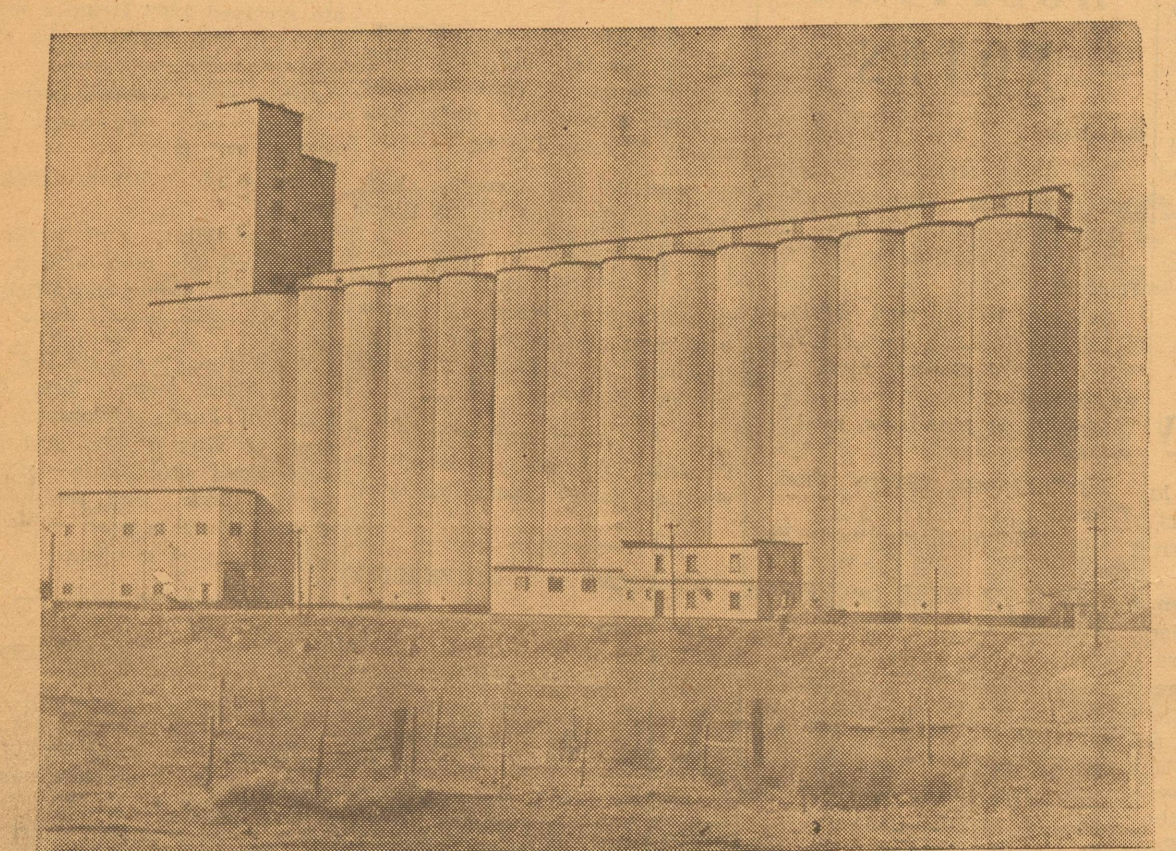
OPS says if a butcher cannot supply regular grade ground beef, he must sell lean ground beef at the same price.

As with all OPS regulations covering every business from bird cage manufacturing to night club operation, fines, and/or prison are threatened for any violation.

A butcher whose dicing may be off a fraction of an inch, may sit a few months in jail.

Over every businessman a similar sword hangs. Infractions of rules are many, because few independent businessmen have the time to interpret pages of rules and constant amendments thereto. Many have paid substantial fines for misunderstanding. Perhaps eventually many will be jailed.

Today in America more than a half million people are subject to imprisonment on the whim of the OPS. This is a more serious threat to American freedom than anything the Kremlin has cooked up yet.

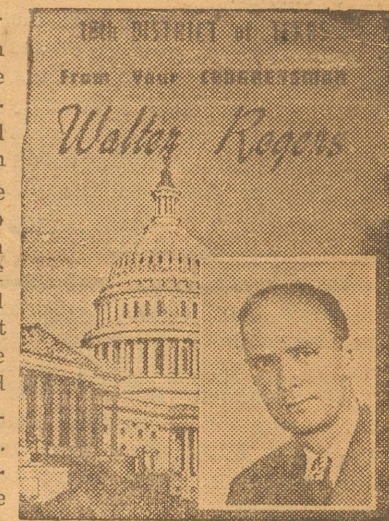

Importance of Three Gov't. Branches Noted

THE JOB OF THE NEXT CONGRESS:

Although much has been said on all subjects of national importance during the past several months in the election campaigns, it must always be remembered that there are three divisions in our democratic form of government, each of equal importance. These are the Executive Branch, the Legislative Branch and the Judicial Branch. The Legislative Branch which is the Congress is the branch that is always closest to the people, and it is through this branch that the voice of the people must be heard and reflected. It is this branch that also writes the laws that are the Executive Department and passed upon from a legal standpoint by the Judicial Branch. The 83rd Congress, which convenes January 3, 1953, will be confronted with some of the most tremendous problems that have faced a legislative body in many years. These problems will be both domestic and international. The domestic problems will concern expenses of the government, taxation laws, immigration laws, economic control laws, agricultural programs, public lands, banking and currency, the judicial system, veteran's affairs communications, and transportation and an endless number of others. Of these, probably the two most important at the present time are the expenses of the government and taxation. On the international scene it would be most difficult to point out the many items that must come up for consideration. However it would appear that the most important matters in this field are the early settlement of the Korean War (which in my opinion is the number one project for this country and the world), the eery of the United Nations, consolidation of the free people's front against communism, and world trade. The question of government expenses on the domestic front of course ties directly with the international program for the reason that approximately seven-tenths of the budget is earmarked for military or semi-military purposes. By this I mean the great bulk of the budget goes to pay for the preparedness program, a sizable slice is required for the payment of foreign aid, and another slice for the payment of our obligations to the veterans of this country. I have continually fought for economy in all phases of our expenditures and I sincerely hope that the 83rd Congress will be successful in reducing these expenditures to the extent that much-needed tax relief will be forthcoming to the individual taxpayer. There is of course such a thing as false economy and I am sure that no one in the Congress would feel that the prepared-

ness programs should be reduced to the extent that it would place us in the danger zone. The goal that should be sought is greater efficiency in the armed services and a cutting down of every possible practice that is not contributing directly to the



program. This same kind of economy can be practiced in the taxes and long strides were made in that direction by the last Congress. There has been some repercussions from the cuts that we made in appropriations but these have been relatively small. There has been no curtailment of services because of these cuts, and it is my opinion that we can go further in trimming general government and an endless number of these cuts are effected, it will mean that an additional large number of employees will be taken from the federal payroll. I feel that the reduction of the federal payroll is a must for two reasons. First, it will be a major step in the direction of reduced government expenses. Secondly, it will provide potential employees in many fields of private enterprise where there is at present shortages of help. One of the major tasks of the new Congress will be to see that the individual taxpayer or gets the benefit of any reduction in Government costs. By this I mean that when a reduction is made, the funds saved thereby should not be transferred to another division, another department, or another section of the government; the benefit should go to the man who has been paying the bill, the American taxpayer. This and all other problems reflected above are responsibilities of the Congress the representatives of the people. These responsibilities cannot be shifted to the Executive or the Judicial. They rest squarely on the shoulders of Congress and it is that body that can and must meet them and work out the problems. Unity of the entire nation is as essential in working out this job as it is in meeting the communist threat, and regardless of who serves as President, it is my hope and desire that the entire nation will unify and meet these challenges.

Precaution Listed as Light Infestation of Pink Bollworms Found in Cotton Here

A light infestation of the cotton pink bollworm has recently been found in Farmer County.

In sending out this information, from the Texas Dept. of Agriculture, John C. White, commissioner, states that the discovery of pink bollworm in your county is a matter of serious concern to your area farmers. For this reason, the Texas Department of Agriculture is making the following information available to your paper in the hope you will see fit to use all or part of it in an effort to acquaint cotton growers with the new problem they face.

The pink bollworm has been present in parts of Texas since 1917 and in the last few years has spread over most of the state. The infestation was especially heavy in South Texas this season, causing several million dollars worth of damage to cotton. Its history in foreign countries and in parts of Texas shows it to be one of the worst cotton pests known.

The Agriculture Commissioner advises that the infestation is very light in this county so far, and there is still a chance to control it before the insect gains a good foothold. There are only two successful means of control, White said.

The first is to quit growing cotton for a year or more, which the commissioner does not recommend, or to destroy the worm in its hibernating quarters.

The pink bollworm hibernates inside the cottonseed or in bolls remaining in the field after picking has been completed. White recommends that no untreated cotton seed be saved from this year's crop and that all untreated seed be taken to the oil mill or be fed to livestock. Only a supply of treated seed should be used for planting next year's crop.

Picking should be rushed and every effort made to pick as cleanly as possible. Strippers do a good job of cleaning the stalks. Cutting the stalks with a new type shredder kills a considerable per cent of the worms and enables a better plowing job to be done, said White.

As soon as possible after stalks have been cut, the remaining debris should be deep-

ly plowed under. Winter moisture will rot the trash and destroy the hibernating ground.

Commissioner White has asked Governor Shivers to issue covering all new counties where pink bollworms have been found. This act will place these counties under provisions of the Texas Pink Bollworm Law.

Later this winter, or early next spring, the Texas Pink Bollworm commissioner will meet to consider what further regulatory measures will be

necessary in the fight against the destructive insect. The first step after the proclamation will be the sterilization of all cotton seed moving out of infested areas. This action will protect the uninfested areas of Texas to a degree. Later it may be necessary to initiate planting and plow-up deadlines in various counties, depending upon the climatic conditions in areas of infestation.

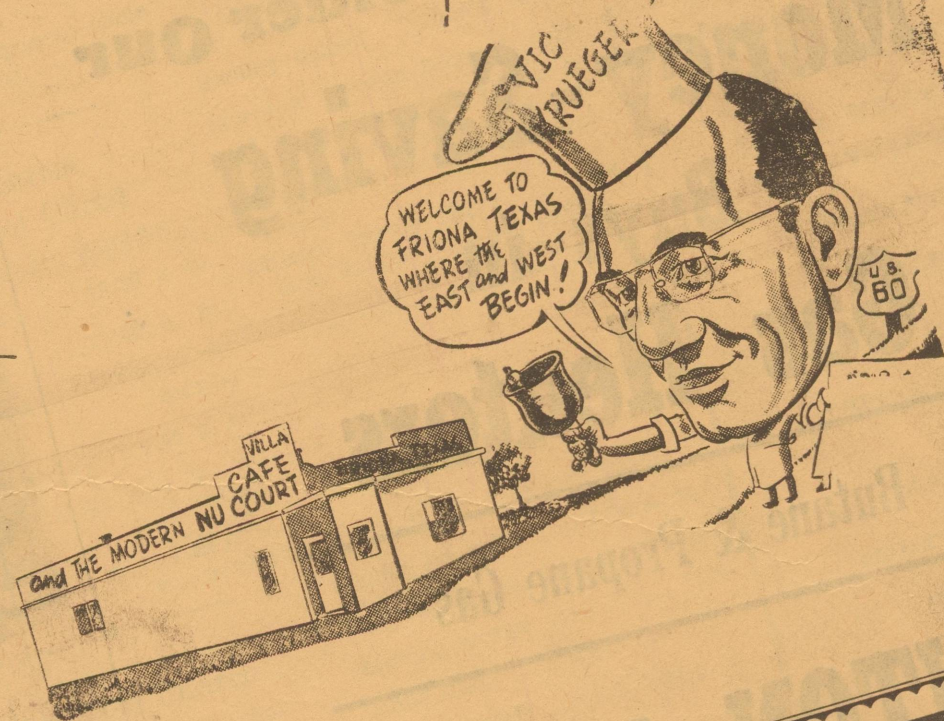

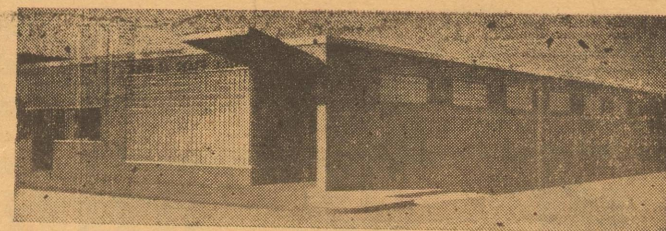

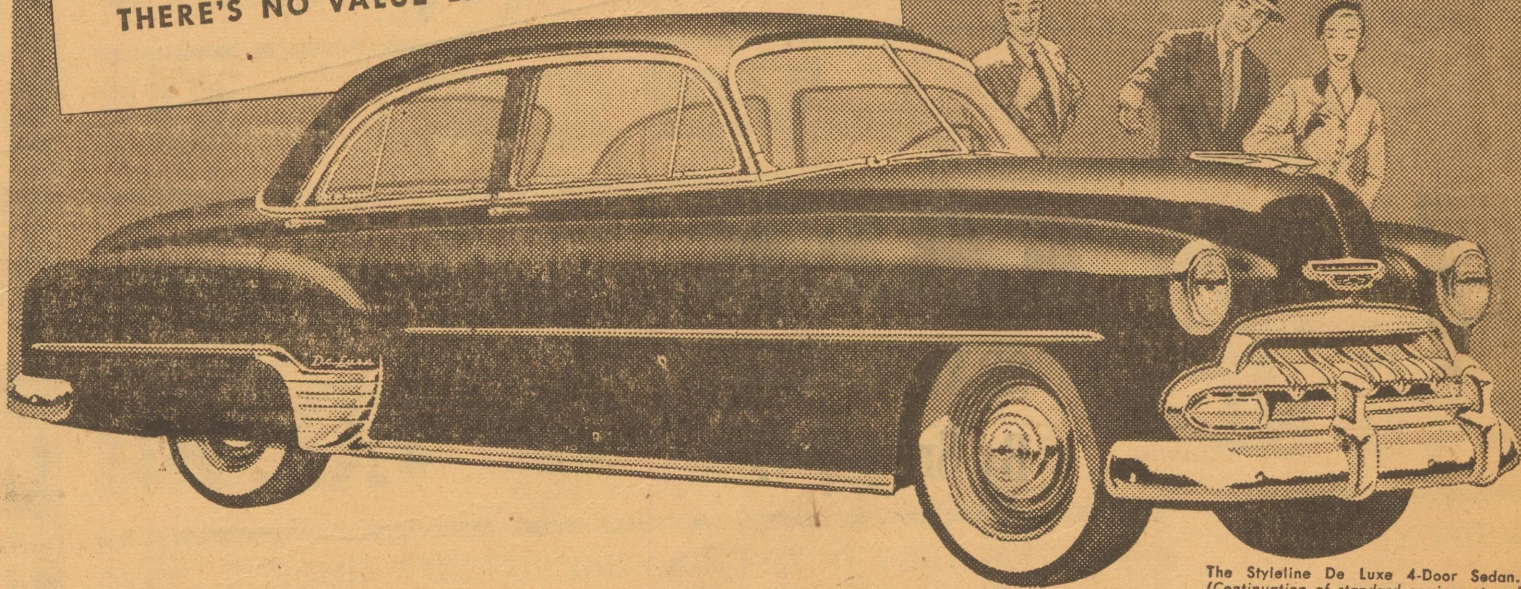

This will constitute notice to all persons that Darrel Harkins, has applied to the United States Patent Office for a patent on a well construction and a method of constructing a well, the said application being filed on October 10, 1942, Serial No. 51011 and the patent is now pending upon said method of constructing a well. The patented process upon which Darrel Harkins holds a patent pending is designed to secure good irrigation wells in quicksand and doubtful areas and the process includes the wrapping, snapping, fastening or welding to the outside of the casing any material for the purpose of holding back dry sands, quick sands, and caving sands from caving in to the water sands; it also includes the cementing or placing in the whole any hardening mixture installed in any way on the outside of the well casing for the same purpose, that is, to prevent the quick sand, dry sand or caving sands from falling into and damaging the water sand and or misplacing or injuring the pump. Another part of the process is swedging in smaller casing into enlarged casing and welding the smaller casing into the larger casing at the point where the dry sand contacts the water sand and at the top of the water sand or the use of two different sizes of casing. The process also includes fine inward perforation of the casing, 3-16 or smaller.
