OKLAHOMA LANE FIRST IN COUNTY

Trunk lines will be put into service next Monday from the Oklahoma Lane exchange into Farwell for extended area service. Customer tie-ins will follow within that week for the Oklahoma Lane area.

Three Hereford exchanges are in operation. However service there is enabled only within the archanges, with no service into Hereford yet in effect. This results in the Oklahoma Lane exchange being the first in the system to have tie-in

In this picture Edmund Schlabs, Pete Braxton of the Black Grain Company, and Raymond Schlabs inspect some grains in a 50-acre field estimated all the way from 70 to 85 bushels yield per acre. This irrigated wheat is on potato ground where scientific fertilizing also has been carried out. Last year this plot yielded over 65 bushels wheat per acre.

1. Use chickens split in half lenghtwise for broiling. Break drumstick, hip and wing joints to keep bird flat during broiling.

2. Skewer wing and leg to body to make a compact flat piece of

3. Season each half chicken with about 1-4 teaspoon salt and 1-16 teaspoon pepper.

4. Place chicken on broiler (not rack). Brush with melted fat and then place skin side down.

5. Place in broiler 5 to 7 inches under heat source. Chicken should be broiled slowly. Regulate heat or pan position so that chicken just begins to brown lightly in 10 minutes.



CONTINUED FROM PAGE 2 pansion of new businesses that do not have base periods reflecting large earnings. It has measurably hurt small business and will continue to do so. Many of the corporations would much prefer that the excess profits tax expire and that the Congress increase the normal corporation tax rates. They argue that this would be more fair and would actually bring in more money.

As I said in a recent newsletter, if the excess profits tax is allowed to expire, you can expect a hard and tough fight for early reduction in individual income

BUREAUCRACY: Much has been said in the past few years about bureaucracy, and no one has condemned government by bureau and agency edict more than I have. I am increasingly disturbed by the continuing requests for more power for bureaus and agencies, and the failure to clip the wings of these administrative bodies, Recently the Senate passed a bill bringing several agencies under the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act that are now excepted therefrom. This action is nothing more than an enlargement of bureaucratic powers because under the provisions of the Administrative Procedures Act and the decisions of the courts in construing that act, the rights of citizens of the United States are determined in most cases by individuals appointed by individuals appointed by individuals apponted by elected officials. You may think that the record got stuck or that I was stuttering when I wrote this, but such is not the case. Many of the persons who are primarily instrumental in the decisions rendered as between individual citizens are three, four or five appointments away from the official elected by the people. Provisions in the laws granting the right to court review by an aggrieved party are of no consequence, simply because the courts have no authority to go behind the actions of the adminstrative body. Much of our bureaucratic headache has been caused by brief and unnoticed provisions in laws that appear to be very sensible and expeditious. However, experience has proven that we are paying the high price of losing our day in court by capitulating to unnecessary speed in the determination of our rights. The promotion of our way of life and the freedoms which we so jealously guard would be much better served if the money being spent in many of these administrative agencies was being used for increasing our court system. It makes little difference which party is in power or which individual is in charge of a bureau or administrative agency, there is a never ceasing pressure from these bureaus and agencies for


