What does this mean? It means that money has been made here, living is on more prosperous scale than in many, many counties, but the citizens have been going elsewhere to buy!

Deaf Smith County, immediately our neighbor, chalked up retail sales of \$14,902,000. And of course Lubbock and Potter County sales were in the high brackets. Even Randall County, with its close proximity to Amarillo, showed \$11,910,000 retail sales.

Then the figures show something that many of us have realized for some time: someone has slipped -either the local resident has little yen for supporting the local merchant, or the local merchant has fallen down in his merchandising, leaving more advantageous conditions to be found elewhere. Maybe it has been a combination of both factors

"Small Business"

Often major Washington explosions are triggered by a circumstance obscure to the public. * * *

Thus, recent request of major airlines could set off probe.

Major airlines have applied to CAB, the Civil Aeronauti:s Board, for per-mission to reduce commis sions paid independent travel agen cies. CAB has everything per-

taining to civil C. W. Harder

CAB has in the past taken many steps to block independent airlines from competing with the majors, so they apparently feel it will be a routine matter to secure approval for the plan to cut down the independent travel agent. Yet, the issue, from the airlines' standpoint, is so petty, it may be the straw that breaks the camel's back.

Independent travel agents are credited with doing a great sell-ing job for air travel, but in addition travel agents have become almost indispensable to the traveler. Buying transportation through an experienced travel agent who knows facilities, con-necting lines, and other data, the traveler avoids standing in line in an airline ticket office, the often futile attempts to seek information from a green clerk

For this service, the travel agent receives a 5% commission. Thus, on a cross country trip, the average commission to the agent for all his services is only \$4.95. But now the major airlines want to cut this to \$1.50.

In fact, major airlines are going even further.

Fully staffed ticket offices are opening in many communities so small they do not even support a medium-sized department store. In smaller towns they are trying to sell tickets through traveling ticket trucks.

It is important to bear in mind that airline tickets are not a commodity bought by a large share of the people on a frequent basis. Thus, in many communities there is no economic justification for an airline office.

Yet major airlines are willing to spend dollars to save pennies.

Therefore, this move may start a full scale probe of airlines.

* * *

ment of the major airlines?"

It is based on several factors


For example, despite the fact that the major airlines receive millions from the U. S. Treasury as a mail subsidy, in practically every major U. S. city plush airline facilities occupy highest valued property.

Yet, when independent competition has succeeded in getting permission to fly, despite CAB obstructions, it has given the public good low-cost service at a profit with no subsidies.







If you can prove your title against all the world, it is a good title. If, in addition, the evidence came directly from cotton farmers, tained in proper public records, it is a good record title. Ordinarily only a good record title is salable.

Here are a few of the common sources of trouble in real estate transactions to show why the minor expense of a title exami nation is justified.

Many persons sign "earnes

Consider this: Open thy mouth, judge righteously, and plead the cause of the poor and needy. they are mere reciepts with no serious implications. In reality they may specify, among other things, the kind of title you

A "warranty deed" from a responsible seller is comforting to have but it is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. A warranty deed does not guarantee marketable title

Moreover, serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller on a warranty deed is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt. Even if he is available a good title is much better than a law

The fact that the seller has possession of an "abstract" does not mean that he owns the property. An abstract is only a history of a title. Possession of an abstract no more indicates ownership of land than possession of the history of Texas means that you own the state.

Some purchasers of land feel safe because the title is being examined at the time of purchase by an attorney for the mortage lenders. This seems logical but is a dangerous theory. Mortage lenders are sometimes willing to accept less than good record title as security. This is sound business for them because, among other reasons, the chances are that the mortage will be paid off so that no expense in perfecting the title would ever need be incurred. It is risky business for you when you are putting your life savings into the purchase.

These are a few of the reasons why a title examination is an important safeguard to you, When it is completed, the attorney gives you a written opinion stating his conclusions as to who owns the land, the defects in or charges against such ownership, and the requirements to be met if any, to make good record title.

Off-hand this may seem a simple operation. In fact it is not. It requires the interpretation of numerous deeds, mortages, wills, court decrees and other instruments; the consideration of the order in which transactions and events affecting the title occurred; and the application of statutes and court decisions to the various situations disclosed in the ab-


