It is understood that the winner must be present at the Saturday afternoon program to qualify.



It is our sincere desire at this time to familiarize you with one of our most pressing problems and this is a problem which concerns you and your school chudren in connection with transportation to and from school.

For several years now the lexas Department of Public Safety has been attempting to familiarize car owners and drivers of the necessity of observing all traffic regulations where a school bus is concerned. In the last three years school authoriuses have been warning arivers of the fact that it is a visition of the law to pass a school bus when it is stopped to take on or let oil children either coming or going. A lot of peop ; have peen observing this regulation and have cooperated 100 per cent, for which we want to express our sincere thanks and apwildlion. Now there seems to be a small per cent of drivers of automobiles who are either not tanimar with the law or are in too big a hurry to observe it and this letter is directed primarily to those people and to those not familiar with this regulation.

Please let us quote the law as it is given from the Texas Department of Public Safety in its driver handbook located on page 25. Quote: "When meeting or over-taking a school bus that has stopped to take on or let off children, it is necessary to stop. You may then pass at a speed or not over 10 miles per hour if the way is clear." End quote.

This organization uses this method to inform you of the necessity of observing this law to the letter of the law. We feel that the lives of the boys and girls of this community are of tremendous importance and that only with your cooperation and help, can we safeguard and protect the lives and health of







## TO ALL FARMERS, BUSINESS MEN **AND LABORERS**

NOTICE

We who depend upon Agriculture for a livelihood have reached the time when we must "hang together or hang separately." When the farmer goes broke, business and labor go broke, too. That is a fact of history.

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Now we have many problems in agriculture that affect all people in Parmer County. One of these immediate problems is the drastic cut in cotton allotments. The national cotton allotment, at present, calls for a cut to 17,-910,448 aces. It is proposed that this cut will allow production of 10,000,000 bales next year and wipe out the surplus. We of Farm Bureau say these figures are in error, as consideration was not given for cotton that would have been planted except for the drouth, and cotton that will not be harvested because of floods and other unavoidable disasters. Allotment of 17,000,000 acres cannot be expected to produce 10,000,000 bales of cotton. We advocate that we can plant 22,500,000 acres of cotton and STILL lower the surplus 2,000,000 bales. This increase would mean an increase in allotments for Texas from 7,304,000 acres to 8,989,600 acres, a gain of 1,635,000 acres.

Based on a yield of 200 pounds per acre, and a price of \$150 per bale, this increase would have an approximate value of \$98,136,000 to Texas Cotton Producers. Parmer County would profit greatly by this increase of 20 to 30 per cent. Each acre is worth about \$60.

To you fellows who are not Farm Bureau members: Numbers mean strength when it comes to legislative matters like this. There are now 550 paid up members in Parmer County, including business members. There are about 250 of you are not backing the attempt to obtain an equitable adjustment in this matter. \$10 membership dues right now could mean money to you and your neighbor next year. and allahal

Farm Bureau is the only organization in Parmer County, or in Texas, that can or will help you in problems of this nature, and many others. Each new member adds influence, strength and money toward accomplishing these objectives.
