Rev. Lewis Knight of the Congregational Church will deliver the Thanksgiving sermon, and the public is urged to attend this inspirational song and worship service.

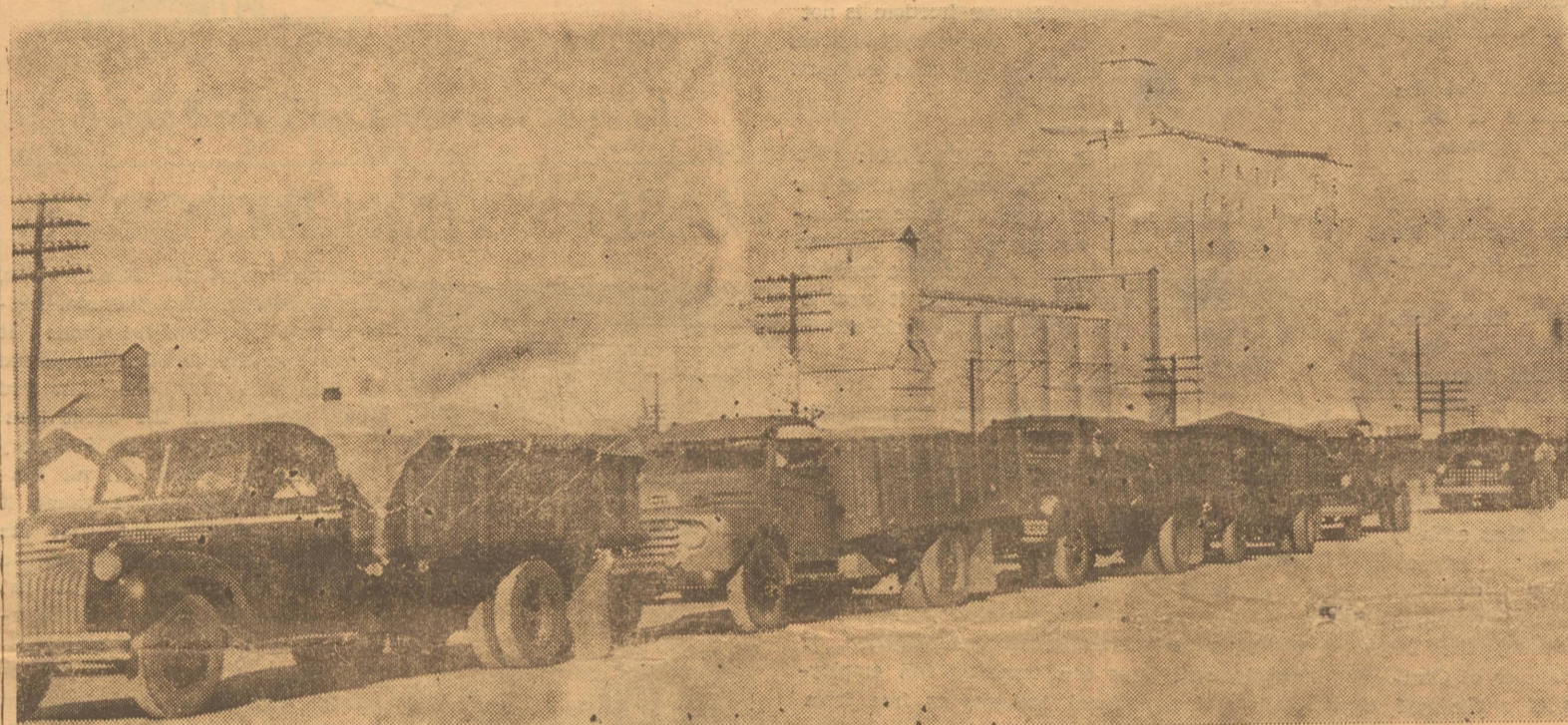
Song leader will be Charles Allen, with Miss Phyllis Treider serving as pianist.

Harvest Taxes Parmer Elevator Capacity

Reminiscent of a few years back when wheat trucks blocked the roads in Parmer County, truckloads of maize this week had to await their turn before unloading at elevators reaching their capacity storage until rail and truck transport could empty bins.

Grain harvest probably is at its peak now, and completion is expected over the weekend with continued ideal harvest weather prevailing. Storage throughout the county has been filled to capacity. All elevators are shipping out as fast as possible, making room for the still arriving grain.

One Friona elevator Sunday expected little grain to be brought in only to be taken by surprise with 44 carloads received that one day alone!

Little testing is being done at the elevators, with grain dry enough to meet specifications, most testing below 14 per cent at the maximum.

Mechanical cotton strippers have been pressed into use this week and the local gin is operating day and night. Near 2,000 bales have been ginned here to date, with heavy receipts also noted at other gins in the county.

You and I have heard this question, no doubt sometime-somewhere, anywhere that a commerce organization functions.
As to the local situation, we comment that the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is doing more than could be expected of any organization as lacking in funds and membership participation!
It's the truth—few memberships have been paid this year, and numerous projects are pressing for both attention and financial support. A few members are carrying the load.
So when you receive that second letter this week reminding that your C of C dues are needed, why not cooperate immediately? You'll find that your participation will help the organization to accomplish more.

CLIFTON FORGE, VA., DAILY REVIEW: "As publishers of a daily newspaper, press freedom is not ours, alone. We are simply trustees of that right on behalf of the people. And we shall be ever mindful of that trust."

Its high time for sober driving to become even closer linked with sober thinking—for safety's sake.

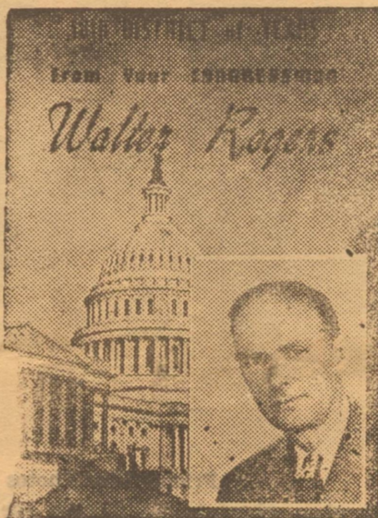

WASHINGTON REPORT:



BEHIND THE SCENES:

Purrowed brows and whispered appraisals of doubt have not been unusual in official circles since the November 9 news conference at which Secretary of State Dulles was quoted as saying that the Eisenhower administration has never said it would be forever opposed to recognizing a Communist government in China. Some of the news services immediately construed this statement to mean that consideration was being given by the administration to the recognition of the Communist regime in China, some stories indicating that the Communist regime may be recognized. Some, apparently assuming that Secretary Dulles meant that recognition of Red China was being considered, are prophesying a definite split in the administration over this

particular issue. In other words, they anticipate that the real repercussions are yet to come. It seems that the construction placed is the cause for the furrowed brows, rather than the words that on the language of the Secretary were actually spoken. In all fairness to Mr. Dulles, I think it should be pointed out that the Secretary certainly did not intend to convey the idea or thought that the administration was considering the recognition of the Communist regime in Red China. His remarks very clearly reflected that the present anti-Western and aggressive policies and attitude of that regime would preclude consideration of recognition of such regime as the government of China. Mr. Dulles fully appreciates the many facets of this problem and in speaking on the matter would, no doubt, have in his mind three major items. First, he fully understands and properly evaluates the bloc in the Congress that is completely pro-Nationalist China. Several of the outstanding leaders of this bloc are members of the House and Senate from the West Coast areas. Secondly, the Secretary knows full well that a Communist regime would have no inhibitions against loudly but falsely proclaiming pro-Western and anti-aggression policies in order to secure recognition by Western powers as well as admittance to the United Nations. He also knows that, once such result was accomplished, that same regime would

WASHINGTON AND—

"Small Business"

The hue and cry for Agriculture Secretary Ezra Benson's scalp points up fact that anybody who holds this post under present conditions is destined to be a hapless goat, unless supplied with billions of dollars to play Santa Claus.

Secretary Benson took stand against heavy spending farm programs as a matter of principle. Benson's defenders state falling farm prices started before he took office. Available Washington records appear to prove this.

Some in Washington held there is no solution to the farm problem. Others claim that the only solution is free trade so that American farm products can be exported. However, they overlook fact that much food is being imported today from nations where people need it, wherever a chin is found in the protective tariff laws.

But others have formed a different concept on farm problem.

They say instead of looking to Agriculture Department nation's farmers should look toward Justice Department and Federal Trade Commission for active Anti-Trust Law enforcement.

Housewives are linked but records show independent retailer and wholesaler are not getting rich. And farmers producing food get only a small share of the dollar spent on most items.

For example, the grower is currently receiving less than 4 cents from the can of peaches retailing for 25 cents, or more. Processing costs account for a part of difference, but industry

dent canners are not making excessive profits.

But into a can of peaches goes various materials.

The tin must be bought through a British controlled monopoly. The sugar is bought at prices controlled by world wide agreement. Sales of cans is held by a few. In many other food products a parallel situation exists.

The supply of commercial fertilizer needed to produce most crops is controlled by a very few firms, some of them subsidiaries of major oil companies. This same situation prevails with insecticides and fungicides. The gasoline and oil that the farmer must buy is sold on a controlled monopoly basis.

And under the present laxity of anti trust enforcement, there appears to be no remedy.

For example, just before the pickle packing season, packers were informed of a 30 per cent immediate increase in the salt price. It was a take or leave it demand, because independent competition is lacking in the salt industry.

Stemming back to the days when with rifle and plow, he carved out his security, the American farmer has always been a symbol of free enterprise.

But faced with a controlled market for his products, and with controlled prices for what he buys, the American farmer is a prisoner to a captive market.

More and will be voted to farmers. Only a complete and thorough application of the anti trust laws on all levels of the food business, including the supply of materials needed to produce and process farm products will stop need for anti-

not hesitate to return to their godless, dictatorial, anti-Western, aggressive and enslavement policies. Thirdly, the Secretary also knows that the House of Representatives has, by vote on a resolution, openly condemned and opposed the admittance of Red China to the UN.

We all know that one of the basic principles of Communism seems to be the theory that the end sought justifies the means employed. Certainly the Secretary of State knows this and he is not getting soft toward Red China. I think the proper construction of his remarks would have been that the administration had never taken the position that the Nationalist government of China was the only government that would ever be recognized.

CUTTING EXPENDITURES: One of the local columnists has pointed out that one of the biggest departments of government has hired a private firm to make a survey of the department and to recommend changes that will bring about more efficient management and effect economies. I do not yet know the terms of the agreement between the department referred to and the private firm, but certainly intend to find out. These surveys are very costly to the taxpayers, and, so far as I can determine, have produced very little in the way of results. One such survey cost the taxpayers approximately \$600,000, yet the over-all cost of the department involved has not been measurably decreased. It's good business if you can get it. I don't recall any of the reports containing a recommendation that the departments stop spending the taxpayers' money to hire these survey firms.

THE NATION'S HEALTH: I noticed the other day that many of the present day diseases and ailments are caused by synthetic foods and certain food processing methods.
