


Kector Funeral Held on Friday


Award Texas 4-H'ers Chicago Trips .

COVETED all-expense trips to the 32nd National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago have gone to four Lone Star State club members who have distinguished themselves in the 1953 National 4-H Canning, Farm and Home Electric, Food Preparation, and Girls' Record pro-grams. Summaries of achievements of the state winners follow:

FIRST PHEASANT SEASON LOOMS FOR PAHANDLE

Texas' first legar pheasant eason, confined to 28 Panhandle counties, will be used by Game and Fish Commission technicians to further study gaudily decorated this gam bird.

The Panhandle season comes in two periods - December 5 and 6, and December 12 and 13, with a daily limit of two cocks and a possession limit of four.

The director of Wildlife Restoration asks hunters to forward. any bands found on the birds' legs. He said these might come either from Texas private game breeders or from the states of Oklahoma and Kansas from which many of the pheasants probably originated. He said the commission will provide hunters with case histories of birds from which bands are taken.
