

# Crops Thriving After Gentle but Heavy Rain

With farmers of the Friona area talking of "4 inches at my place" or "over 5 out our way", the weather during the past two weeks has redeemed itself to put deep moisture over Farmer County. Most recent appreciable rain came Saturday evening, with more following Sunday in parts to bring a weekend total of one to over two inches in the Friona vicinity.

All this points to increased production of wheat, grain sorghum, cotton and potatoes on Farmer County farms. Arthur Drake of the Friona Wheat Growers states that though some hail has damaged areas, he estimates more wheat to be harvested than last year. Most elevators are emptying bins to make way for storage of the expected crops. Some wheat should be harvested as early as June 10th, with anticipated harvesting peak being about June 20th locally.

Some farmers who had irrigated heavily before the rains are apprehensive over rust possibilities, though at present there is apparently no widespread threat here.

Elevators and seed dealers report more maize seed sold this year than at any time recently. Some expected a doubled yield this year.

Most of the cotton within the county has been planted. A number of cotton farmers had their seed in the ground before the rains, and only a few have had to replant. Much of the young cotton is looking quite good. A small amount still is being planted.

Heaviest rainfall has been recorded in the northwest corner of the county and in the area east of Black. So far the county has escaped the floods and damaging downpours occurring in parts of Deaf Smith and other counties east and south.

# Comments from Your Soil Conservation Men

I hear that James Mabry is having troubles. Mel Swartz was out at James' place last Wednesday taking some pictures and making clippings. Mel found that Mr. Mabry had about 12 tons of green manure per acre. Now that is quite a bit of Vetch and Rye to be turning under. However Mr. Mabry had already come to the conclusion. He is having trouble getting his plow to handle the rank growth. James decided that the moldboard was probably his best

bet. He is going to add a nitrogen fertilizer to help speed the decomposition of the vetch and rye. As soon as most of the plants that are turned under are decayed, James is going to plant the area to grain sorghums. I am anxious to watch the sorghum crop to see the effects of the green manure. This particular plot of ground is next to the highway just south of Hub. Keep an eye on the grain sorghum and see for yourself the effects of vetch and rye.

County Agent Joe Jones and I have been working on some Soil Conservation District tours for the last of June. If you have anything that you think would be of interest for a tour be sure to let one of us know. We are particularly interested in legumes, waterways, cowpeas in grain sorghums, dyes in ditches, and methods of land preparation following legumes. E. L. Fairchild, Owen Seamond, Volley Hodges, Matt Jesko, Spencer Hough, and John D. Lovelace have completed the installation of their concrete pipe lines. Our checks show that they installed a total of 19,562 feet. These lines were all approved for payment recently.

We are interested in discussing with you your irrigation water application. If you are interested, come by the office and let us know or if you see a pickup out in your neighborhood just stop it. I feel that you have the opportunity to increase your income easier through proper water application than any other way.

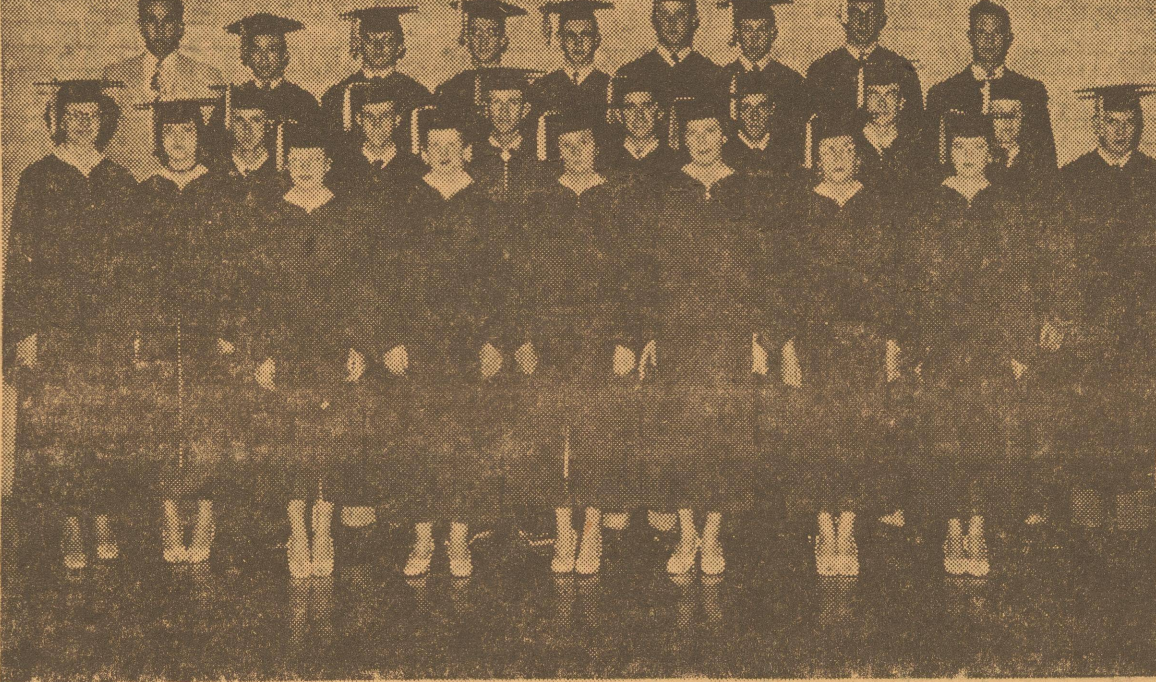

The contract was let Monday to Hammock Bros. of Lubbock for the elementary school building that is to be built. Contract price was \$147,200. Hammock Bros. began moving in Tuesday and are to have the building completed in 180 days. The location is across the street, east, from the old grade school building on the Slagle lot. The building will house grades

one through four, putting the school on a basis for the four-four-four plan. The dimensions will be 280 feet by 61 feet. The blueprint shows 12 classrooms, music room, office facilities, clinic, teachers' workroom, and book room.

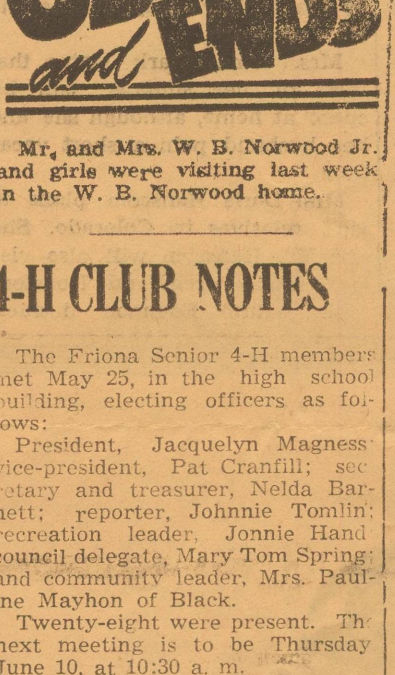

Fireman Glen Sparkman said he estimated the damage incurred at approximately \$300.00.

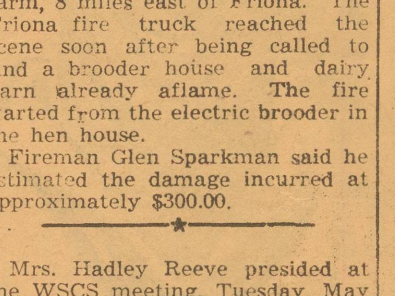

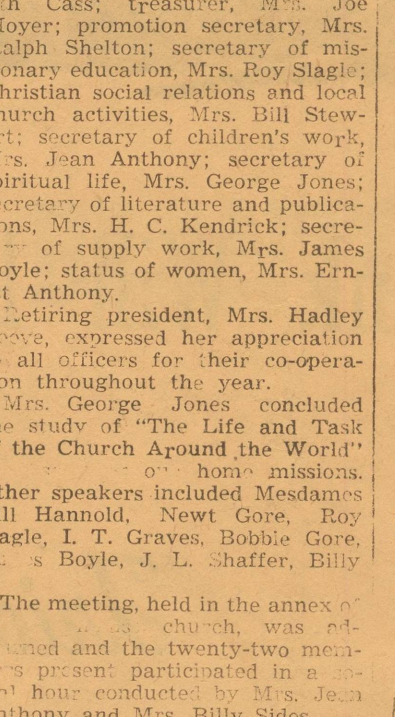

### "Small Business"

Small business knowing corrosive effects of heavy taxation, is interested in reduction of government expenses. But while testimony of the General Accounting Office before a Congressional Committee indicates substantial wastage of taxes in the army due to lack of business understanding, further GAO testimony also indicates lack of business management in the State Department may not only be wasting tax money, but also creating a lack of respect for U. S. abroad.

State Department which once controlled a modest budget now absorbs substantial tax money. Last year State Department spent more than a quarter billion dollars, roughly \$30 million more than Treasury Dept. spent operating far flung Coast Guard.

But State Department handling of funds could be partial reason why Europeans resist U. S. plans. General Accounting Office reports in the State Department had one of the young men buy the Baron Rothschild mansion in France for U. S. Embassy.

The fact the then Ambassador did not want to live in the place did not deter Washington thinkers.

For \$1,900,000 the Baron agreed to sell mansion to State Dept.

The mansion had carved oak wall panelling, marble banisters, tapestries, other items of great value, GAO reports.

But young State Dept. man handling deal utterly neglected to get sale terms in writing.

But before deal was set on to U. S. the tapestries, the oak panelling, marble banisters, other attachments were removed.

State department officials in France inquiring at the time were told they were being removed for cleaning. Told that was not a U. S. custom, the Frenchmen apparently shrugged shoulders and said something like, "But messieurs, this is custom in La D'ne France."

Before U. S. obtained possession mansion was sold. It was unimpaired, GAO says.

State Dept. official who made deal with Baron Rothschild, says international accounting firm, listing terms of sale as writing, is still on job.

So almost \$2 billion American tax dollars were sold on a real estate deal in France in a manner that amounted to a real estate broker's commission on the sale of a vacation spot without rising license loss.

This could be a reason why French have not received European Defense money. Perhaps the Rothschilds have entered the French official on how they sold a mansion to the Americans.

This could be set French official having to distribute along these lines, "If France enemy Americans don't know how to handle a \$2 million real estate deal, are they precisely the people to trust with the lives and fortunes of 40 million Frenchmen."

Whether one agrees or not with the policies and plans, was currently propounded in Washington one fact is clear.

In the family, on the farm, in business, and in politics, there is no substitute for sound business management for domestic tranquility, for prestige abroad.
