Washington and Small Business:

Potter County, Texas, may become nationally famous.

Ernest Higgard could throw into oblivion fact that not only as nation failed to solve problem of Big Labor, as well as that of Big Business, but that two are intertwined.

Many authorities hold labor legislation of past 22 years has evaded real basic problem.

Early New Deal legislation sought to force big corporations and holding companies formed by uncontrolled depression causing mergers to deal with labor.

Then followed legislation to restrain Big Labor power.

Today it appears Big Labor, allied with Big Business, has formed a production monopoly.

Thus, heads of entrenched leaders in any industry gather together with the leaders of Big Labor, and wages, hours, and conditions are agreed upon for entire industry. These terms are also based on the earnings and abilities of a few big corporations to meet agreed terms.

But these terms become binding upon the entire industry in the nation with almost as much iron clad tightness as if Congress had passed laws prescribing what wages, hours, and conditions shall prevail in that industry.

No account is taken of the fact that perhaps some small competitor to the big interests, located in a rural area where living costs are lower, and where labor would rather work for less per hour in order to live better, could by making a deal with his labor satisfactory to both sides, overcome advantages held by the big interests enabling him to compete with them.

Neither is there any latitude for deals between employers and labor, such as existed around the turn of century when workers would draw less money than existing rate, taking difference in an interest in the company. This method resulted in building many successful businesses, to mutual advantage of all.

There is another factor. Some of the firms who put up only token resistance to Big Labor demands, are most active in operating foreign plants with cheap labor, are promoting abolition of U. S. tariffs in order to bring their foreign production into the U. S. cheaply to undersell independent competitors.

It's a cozy game, that of dealing with Big Labor to peg domestic labor costs at a high level to the disadvantage of independent competitors, and then further cut the ground out from under them with foreign goods produced with cheap labor. Potter County, Texas, may be the first to protest against this unholy alliance between Big Business and Big Labor, sanctioned by 22 years of Congressional meddling, but there is bound to be other counties heard from.

S.C.D Observations

Next week the Parmer County Soil Conservation District is going to hold the early summer tours. Tuesday, July 6 the Rhea community tour will start at the Parish House at 2:00 P.M. Wednesday the 7th the Lazbuddie tour will also start at 2:00 p. m. Then at 2:00 P.M. the 8th we will meet at the American Legion Hall in Bovina for that tour. Everyone is invited to attend any or all of these tours. We will show some slides, then go to the field and talk to some of the men who are using some of the conservation practices that are relatively new to most of us.

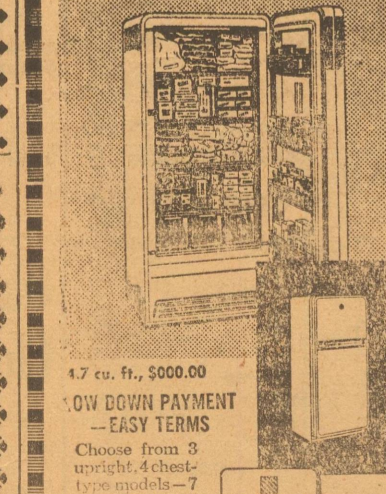
Mr. McMinn has used vetch be-

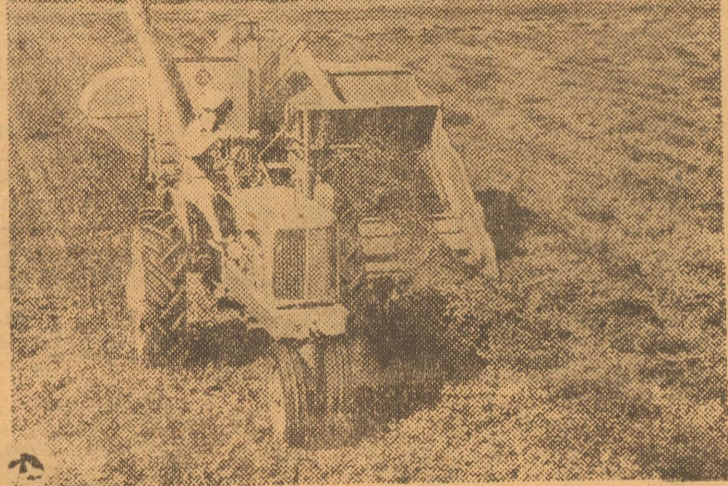
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Agencies Cooperate To Help Farmers

Farm Bureau Report

Exemptions for tractor gas are handled a little differently currently than they have been in the past. We realize it is not quite as convenient as it should be, but the dealers and the ones who take care of filling for you are working in cooperation with the comptroller's office in the slight change in procedure. In an effort to serve farmers better and more efficiently from every angle, government agricultural agency representatives and Farm Bureau Officers have

been meeting occasionally to discuss mutual problems. We sat in on the one last Tuesday and would like to pass along the following suggestions:

Abandoned cotton acreage must be officially measured if you want it to apply to the history of your farm for future allotment. If you will make an early date for the measuring (through your ASC officer Joe Camp) and manage to be on hand yourself to observe and assist in such measuring you can be sure it is done right. It is your responsibility, and if you will not

be there to assist, you really should not blame someone else if an error does crop up. Your cooperation will be appreciated, too.

We believe the SCS boys are rendering a wonderfully good service to our farmers. It seems they could do a little more for you if you will remember they are professional men, and limited in number. If you need them, be sure to call on them; but if you have a job you and your son or employee can do just as well, let the specialists continue working on something they alone can accomplish by utilizing their training. We believe that if you will bear this in mind, everyone will be able to accomplish more. Steve Bavousett is the director of SCS. These same things apply to County Agent Joe Jones' duties. Be sure to use them if you need them, but if you don't really need them, someone else does. They want to serve you as efficiently as possible.

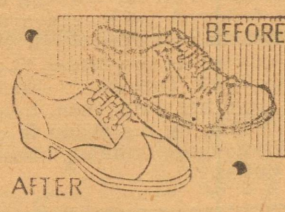

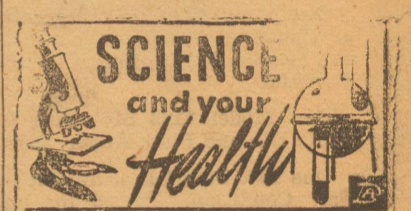

SUMMER RASHES

Along with pleasures—sunny weather, swimming and other outdoor sports—summer brings a special medical problem. Skin rashes such as poison ivy, heat and "swimmers' itch" are usually evident only during this time of the year and often cause great annoyance for vacationers.

One hot-weather rash known as prickly heat results from the plugging up of the sweat glands which then come to a boil. According to some doctors, the best way to prevent this condition (more easily said than done) is work or sleep for eight hours a day in air-conditioned room. It seems the cool air clears the sweat gland openings. But for those who can't get cooled off the modern way, talcum powder or calamine lotion is recommended.

Poison ivy, which occurs nowhere in the world except North America, has been plaguing vacationers for centuries. For those who're susceptible—and most of us are—the easy way to avoid the itching rash is simple: don't touch those shiny red-tinged leaves! For those unfortunate enough to get poison ivy, Dr. Leon F. Goldan of the University of Cincinnati and other skin specialists report practical results with a new hormone drug known as hydrocortisone. An ointment form of this drug such as Cortril can halt itching within hours and clear up severe cases of poison ivy within a few days, the doctors said.

The bite of a cool summer dip, especially in small, sheltered lakes, may be a case of "swimmers' itch." Caused by microscopic larvae and spread by snails and water fowl, swimmers' itch will appear as a rash a few minutes after a bather gets out of the water. The rash will disappear for ten hours and then return to stay for a week. There is no treatment for this itch other than soothing lotion.

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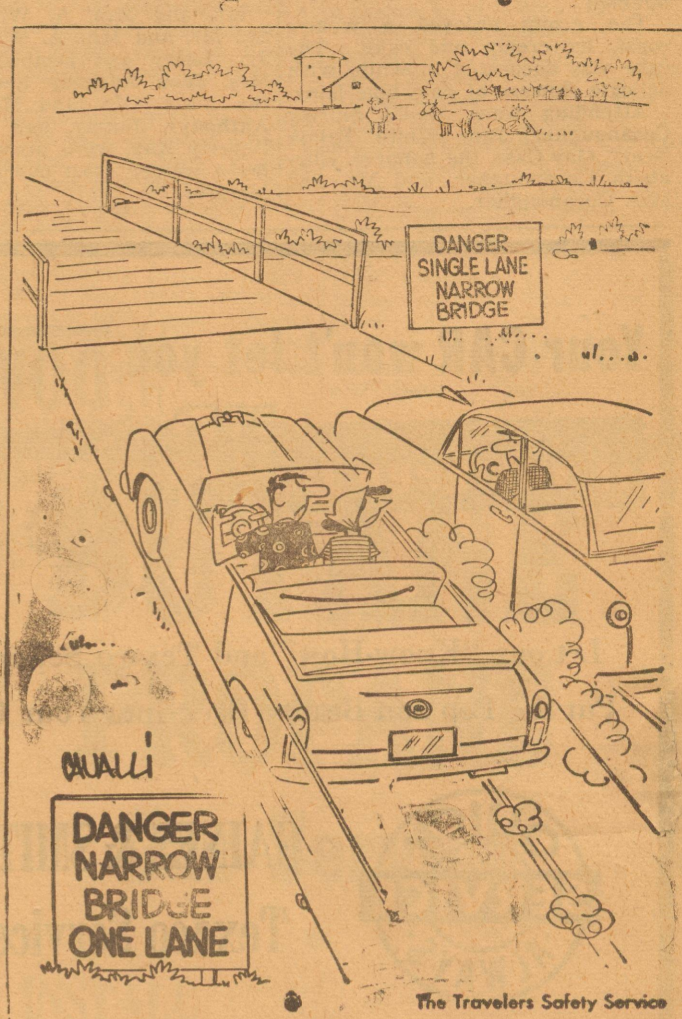

Frionans to Attend Firemen's School

Firemen will register Sunday afternoon, July 11, at A. and M. at College Station for the State Firemen's School that is to be conducted there. The school will close the following Saturday, July 17.

Dillie M. Kelley, Glenn Sparkman, Ralph Sherley and James Cunningham are planning to attend from Friona. If the entire four attend, a credit factor of 5 per cent will be earned by the city on its insurance rates. The group met Thursday to work out all details.

Glenn Sparkman will attend the Fire Marshall course to be conducted in the Student Union Building. The other three will go through a basic training course. In basic training, the group will deal with actual fires. A four-room house will be burned and the group will be instructed in the process of putting the fire out. They will also put out fires resulting from burning oil butane tanks, and one fire in a filling station. In the station the men will have to rescue a dummy, thereby enabling them to learn rescue procedure. Though the intended fires consume several thousand dollars in the burning of oil, gas butane and other expensive fuels, the training and instruction of the firemen save many more dollars during the span of a few years. The fuel is actually no expense, however, as it is donated by firms that handle it.

Ladder climbing, care of hose and pumps will also be studied.

Insurance companies will have several representatives present and it is estimated that the attendance will be near the 3,000 mark.

A banquet will be held Thursday to sum up what has been accomplished during the school. Here, prizes will be awarded for the best essays contributed on how to improve fire fighting.

The city and Ethridge-Spring Agency will bear the expenses of the group.

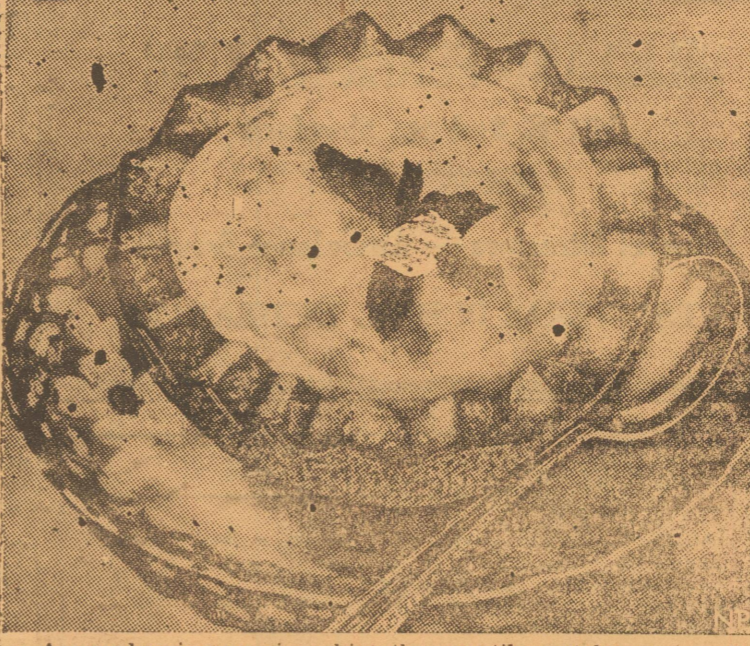
ATTENDED REUNION

Cantaloup Season Is Here Again!



A record spring crop is making the versatile cantaloupe unusually plentiful this season. Known for centuries, and cultivated in this country since Columbus landed, the luscious melon is a delicacy we rediscover each year about this time.

Cantaloupe starts the day off bright at breakfast, is a wonderful salad fruit and has hundreds of tasty dessert possibilities. Besides, it's a nutritious food, rich in minerals and vitamins (especially vitamin A) and low in calories.

In buying ready-to-eat cantaloupe look for those that are springy to the touch. Pressure by the thumb at the ends is not a good test. The netting should be well defined and the scar at the stem end should be slightly sunken and calloused.

Here's a wonderful dessert recipe that will help keep the bulge out of Summer diets:

CANTALOUPE CHIFFON CUPS

- | | |
|-------------------------------------|------------------------------|
| 1 envelope unflavored gelatine | 1/4 teaspoon salt |
| 1/4 cup cold water | 1/4 cup sugar |
| 4 eggs, separated | 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind |
| 1/2 cup fresh lemon juice, strained | 3 ripe cantaloupes |

Soften gelatine in cold water. Beat yolks until thick and lemon colored. Add lemon juice, salt and 1/4 cup of the sugar. Cook over hot water until thickened, stirring constantly. Add gelatine and stir until dissolved. Chill in refrigerator until beginning to set, (consistency of unbeaten egg white). While custard is chilling, halve the cantaloupes and remove seeds. With spoon scoop out some of the pulp, leaving about 1/4-inch rim of pulp in the shell. Notch edges if desired. Crush pulp with potato masher and measure 2 cups of pulp. Beat whites until stiff. Gradually beat in remaining sugar. Fold in gelatine mixture, grated rind and cantaloupe pulp. Pile into cantaloupe shells and chill until firm. Garnish top with sprig of fresh mint if desired.

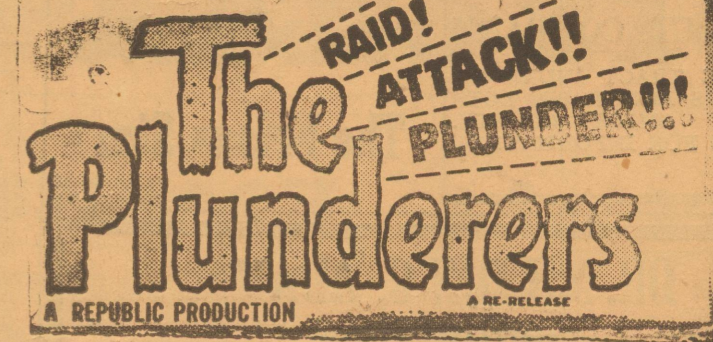

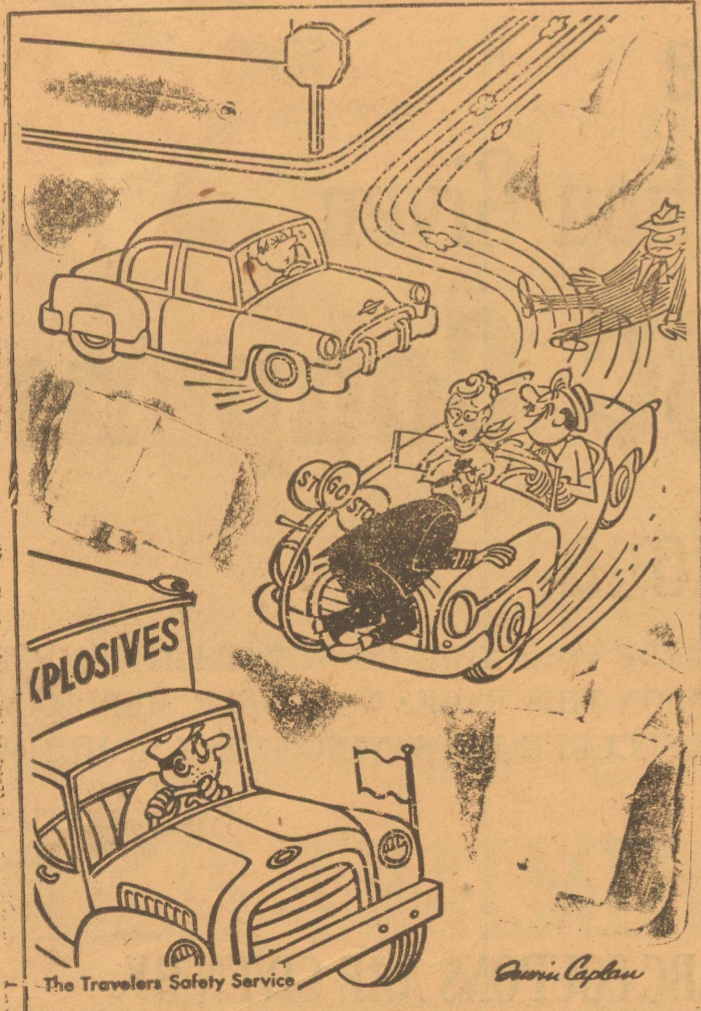
