



Sanders Graduates From FATAL WRECK—

Continued from Page 1 Person boy, Dovid, 6, who apparuntly suffered little harm.

The accident which literally stunned Parmer County occurred then the 1953 Chrysler 2-door being driven west by Mrs. Anderson collided with a '51 Chevrolet truck driven east by Paul Dowdy, 32, of Benton Harbor, Michigan. The truck, according to investigat ing officers, had veered into the oncoming lane of traffic, going on into the ditch on the north side f the road when the Anderson car that had taken the ditch to avoid impact. Actua point of collision was off the pavement in the edge of the north barrow pit, Sheriff Charles Lovelace reported. The car struck the truck just to the rear of the cab, Highway 60 within the city limits shearing off the top of the car and dislodging the rear wheels of the truck (see picture) throwing the wheels into a field where they came to rest some 40 ft. away. The truck traveled about 120 ft. after the impact. No skid marks from either vehicle were in evidence.

Mrs. Anderson was found behind the wheel of her car, Mrs. White aldeady dead alongside in the front seat. Johnny was slumped on the floorboard behind the front seat, and David was thrown clear of the vehicle, an incident credited with saving his life.

Little Johnny Anderson died the same afternoon at 6:30 in a Clovis hospital, and his mother died there at 2:45 this morning.

Though the truck carried the driver and three passengers, none were injured. Dowdy, the driver, was following the wheat harvest and was driving this truck belong ing to W. W. Walsh of Bovina Riding with him were R. B. Kelly of Childress, also employed by Walsh; and Allan Ray and Phillip Edward Wilcox, 8 and 12 years old, of Bovina.


