Farmers are reminded by County Agent Joe Jones to be on the ookout for cotton fleahoppers and The two insects have been showing up over the county in larger numbers this year than any

of the past five years. The fleahopper stings small squares about the size of a matchhead, causing them to fall off. Squares this size are not noticeable on the ground. Usually, farmers notice that their cotton doesn't have anything on it and realize insects must be at work.

Cotton planted thick and growing fast never fruits like thinner cotton and cotton growing a little more slowly, but quite a bit of the cotton doesn't have the fruit on it

Thus, the grocer takes the item out of stock, and gives it to the customer for a coupon and cut price, often less than grocers cost. Theoretically he receives from the corporation the amount of the discount, plus the le handling fee. But even at best, part of the grocers working capital is tied up weeks, or months, in conpens. Thus big corporation schemes to wreck independent manufacturing competition in an area is partly based on working on independent gracer's memory. But processing coupons is ex-

peugive. A big national chain operation now demands the usual eperation now actuality are taken to handling fee be raised to 2%c en the basis their figures show it actually costs them 2%c to han-dle every coupon they receive.

Thus, ironically, every time a housewife presents a coupon she is unknowingly helping to destroy independent business payrolls, perhaps her own families income.
