## Mrs. Miller Directs Queen Contest

Parmer County Farm Bureau is joining other Texas Counties again this year in staging an annual queen contest. This will be the second annual event for this county, to be held in the Friona school auditorium on August 27 at 8:30 p. m. Texas Farm Bureau will provide \$500 for the state winner to go with her matron, to the American Farm Bureau Convention in New York City in December, according to Ralph Smith, Queen Committee Chairman.

Mrs. Ralph Miller of Friona, is in charge of promotion and accepting entries for the contest. Civic clubs, businesses or individuals are invited to sponsor candidates, as they did last year when there were 18 entries. The county winner will enter the district contest to be held in Amarillo in September. The winner there will go, as guest of Texas Farm Bureau, to the State Convention in November to participate in the state contest.

The purpose of the contest, according to Smith and Mrs. Miller, is to give proper recognition to the beauty, charm and personality of farm and ranch girls and promote a better acquaintance with the principles of Farm Bureau.

The contest will be an honest to goodness "Queen Contest"—not a bathing beauty affair. Girls will be judged by an out-of-county panel on three main points: Appearance, poise and personality. Contest rules are: Candidate must be the daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member; single; 16 years of age by September 1 and not over 22 years of age on that date. Daughters of directors, officers or employees of Farm Bureau are not eligible. A fee of \$5 will be charged for each entry. Clothing for the County Contest will be informal street clothes (preferably cottons). The winner will go formal from there on. Farm Bureau will outfit the County Queen for District Participation.

Last year's queen was Miss Denise Magness, sponsored by Gib's Cleaners of Friona, and runner-up was Miss Peggy Hardage, sponsored by John S. Williams of Farwell. Those desiring to sponsor candidates should contact Mrs. Ralph Miller, or inquire at the Farm Bureau office. Community workers will be named next week.

An enjoyable evening of entertainment will be in store, and Cotton John, Farm Editor of KGNC, will act as Master of Ceremonies.

## Price Support Benefits Contingent Upon Acreage Allotment Compliance

To qualify for price support for wheat or for any other crop in 1955 a farmer must stay within all acreage allotments established for his farm, explains Joe Camp, office manager of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Furthermore, he points out, if more than 10 acres are to be diverted from allotment crops, the farmer must comply with a total acreage allotment in addition to any crop allotments assigned to his farm in 1955. In other words he must not exceed any acreage allotment assigned to his farm in 1955.

## Potato Harvest In Full Swing Here

Over 50 carloads of potatoes have been brought to the Friona Potato Shed, according to Herman Neff, owner. The market at the moment is considerably weaker, states Neff, due to the shipments of potatoes arriving from Washington, Oregon, and Idaho. Market is expected to increase, however, in about a week, when these shipments are out of the way.

Several farmers are now in the midst of potato harvesting. Among these are Hardy May, Kenneth Neil, and Jimmy Jesko. At least 90 per cent of the potatoes so far received, have been grade 1. This is a large improvement over last year's crop, when very low-grade potatoes were often brought to the shed.

The shipments are going to the south and southeast during this particular point of harvest. A greater demand and a better price are offered this year, a fact that increases the desirability of potato farming. Neff estimates that approximately one-third of the crop has already been harvested.

if he expects any of his crop to be eligible for price support. The total acreage allotment will be the crop allotments and the 1953 acreage (or adjusted acreage) of other crops. Hay, cover crops, green manure crops, pasture, and idle crop land and summer fallow are not included in the total acreage allotment.

This provision of the program has not been effect in 1954. Camp explains, and therefore should receive careful consideration by farmers before planting crops to be harvested in 1955. Nor is it affected by the outcome of the wheat referendum to be held July 23. Furthermore, he explains, the "compliance with all acreage allotments" requirement for 1955 price supports will be in effect for farms with a wheat acreage allotment of less than 15 acres.

The purpose of this provision, according to Camp, is to assure a better balance in production, avoiding shifts which would simply transfer surplus problems from one crop to another.

# Zoning Board Named; Set To Work in City Planning

The Friona City Commission acted Monday evening to immediately carry out the requests of the Citizens Meeting of last week to set up machinery for study and re-zoning of the city in regard to building codes and fire ordinances.

A Zoning and Planning Commission was appointed by the Commission to study the situation, publishing its findings, and making recommendations to the city officials.

Appointed were Glenn E. Reeve, Oscar Baxter, Joe Douglas, Forrest

Osborn and Sloan Osborn. This commission is to make their first report to the city fathers at the regular commission meeting the first Tuesday evening in August.

The new Zoning Board met in special session Tuesday afternoon to study their functions and set up organization. Reeve was elected chairman, and Baxter was named vice-chairman.

This group is expected to set up a building code for the entire city, business and residential lots, so that

anyone can check the code and ascertain the type of construction required on any designated block or lot.

Heretofore considerable dissatisfaction has been voiced by builders and property owners who charged inequalities existing in the requirements, also vague wording of the old 1931 zoning ordinance under which the city is now operating; an ordinance allowing leeway of interpretation by different parties.

The city commission in their Monday night meeting passed a resolution approving the plan of the addition to the West Loop Drive addition to the city.

Also an ordinance was passed creating the Planning and Zoning Commission.

Another interim ordinance was approved requiring that building permits first be approved by the Planning and Zoning Commission before review by the City Commission until such time as permanent ordinance was set up after findings and report of the Zoning body.

## Bovina E.A.S. Phone Service Will Be Placed in Operation by Aug. 1st

A new type of telephone service will be inaugurated in the Bovina area on Aug. 1. On that date, the telephone subscribers there will be able to call telephone subscribers of the Tharp exchange without assistance of an operator or payment of a toll charge for each call made. On the same date, telephone subscribers in Tharp will be able to call Bovina subscribers without assistance of an operator and without the payment of a toll charge for each call made.

The new type of service, according to R. E. Blatz, district manager for the General Telephone Company of the Southwest, is called "Extended Area Service." Blatz defines it as a service and payment arrangement whereby the subscribers of two different telephone exchanges can call one another without the payment of a specific toll charge for each call made. The physical arrangement requires separate telephone lines between the

two telephone exchanges and special dial telephone equipment in the telephone central offices. The payment arrangement, Blatz explains, is the addition of a flat rate amount to regular monthly exchange service bills and is in lieu of a charge for each call made.

Calls from Bovina to Tharp will be made by dialing "9" followed by the Tharp telephone number desired.

Blatz also announced that new telephone directory for the area was scheduled for publication in November, 1954, and that it would include the telephone numbers of subscribers in the Tharp exchange. Until the new directory is issued, Blatz suggested that subscribers call information for the number of parties in the other exchange. Hereford, Blatz explained, is the operator office for Bovina and Tharp and has an up-to-date list of all subscribers in both exchanges. Hereford is also the long distance office for the Bovina and Tharp telephone exchanges.

New rates include Extended Area Service but do not include Federal Excise Taxes.

# Friday Election Points Future Wheat Quotas

## Four Voting Places Announced in County

On Friday, July 23, at four different polling places, wheat growers of Parmer County will vote for or against marketing quotas for the 1954 crop.

The referendum, according to

Joe Camp of the Parmer County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, will determine whether or not the quota program now in effect will continue for next year's crop.

Two-thirds of those who vote must approve quotas before they can be put into operation. The current program, which was voted on a year ago, was approved by 87 per cent of the voters—390,221 to 57,536.

Officer Manager Camp urges every eligible wheat grower in Parmer County to vote. A producer is eligible to vote if he will have more than 15 acres of wheat on his farm for harvest in 1955. In other words, he can vote if he would be affected directly by quotas, which apply only to farms with more than 15 acres of wheat.

If quotas are approved, there will be marketing penalties on any "excess" wheat—produced outside the acreage allotment—and the full level of price support authorized for 1955 will be available for those who comply with their allotments. If quotas are not approved, there will be no quotas or marketing penalties, and price support for those who stay within their allotments will be at 50 per cent of parity.

Farm allotment notices, as well as an explanatory leaflet giving the essential facts of the 1955 program, were sent out today to Parmer County wheat growers of record. The following voting places in the county will be open from 9:00 a. m. to 7:00 p. m., on Friday, July 23:

## Amarillo Chaplain To Preach Here

Chaplain McCalmont's present assignment is working with a retraining group on the base at Amarillo in an attempt to rehabilitate young men to further use in the Air Force, striving at the same time to restore men to God.

## Insect Control Urged for Cotton

Farmers are reminded by County Agent Joe Jones to be on the lookout for cotton fleahoppers and lygus. The two insects have been showing up over the county in larger numbers this year than any of the past five years.

The fleahopper stings small squares about the size of a match-head, causing them to fall off. Squares this size are not noticeable on the ground. Usually, farmers notice that their cotton doesn't have anything on it and realize insects must be at work.

Cotton planted thick and growing fast never fruits like thinner cotton and cotton growing a little more slowly, but quite a bit of the cotton doesn't have the fruit on it that it would normally be expected to have.

Lygus stings small squares and small bolls, causing them to fall.

It is very important, states Jones that the cotton set its early crop of fruit; usually early cotton gives better grades, enables you to get it out of the field before weather gets too bad, and lessens the danger of early freezes, cutting yield and causing lower grades.

We shall scratch the name of this fellow Yarborough.

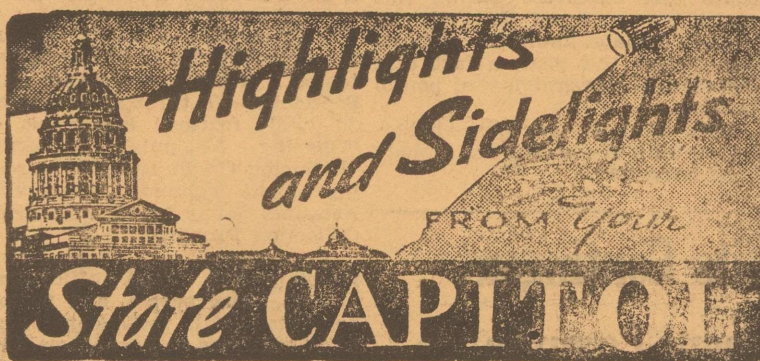

Watch Your Step, Congress!

AUSTIN, Texas.—Texas politicians turned to the grass roots trails, trying to swing undecided votes, as the campaign wound into its final days.

Most attention was centered on the governor's race, in which Allan Shivers and Ralph W. Yarborough flung charges and countercharges at each other in a dazzling exchange. Some of Shivers' contentions were:

That Yarborough was using "vile methods in an attempt to cover up his tie-in with the CIO-PAC which was trying to take over the government of Texas."

That Yarborough campaigners had spread false rumors to the effect that Shivers wanted to abolish the orphan state home at Corsicana.

That Yarborough has promised George Parr to call off the clean-up campaign in Duval county.

### Yarborough Retorts

Yarborough came back with these accusations:

That Shivers had tried to suppress an FBI investigation of the Gatesville school last year.

That Shivers is a "hyphenated Democrat-Republican."

That Shivers had not reported all of his campaign expenditures.

### Positive Side

Both candidates, stump speaking in the villages and towns, also had their positive statements to make, in addition to charges against each other, although the latter phase made the most headlines.

Shivers, saying that he was drawing surprisingly good crowds, emphasized his record in office, pointing to more money spent for roads, schools, and welfare programs. Yarborough pledged improvements in the state government and more money for state services.

He also expressed interest in a state youth program to combat juvenile delinquency, and was critical of the slash in appropriations which

wiped out the Community Services Division of the Youth Development Commission.

"The field representatives of the commission who worked with local government and groups, and also as parole supervisors for youngsters released from state schools on parole, were eliminated," Yarborough commented.

### Delegate Rolling

Texas' Supreme Court has been asked to determine how Democratic delegate strength shall be counted this year.

Significance of the question is that its solution will have a strong bearing in deciding control of party conventions.

Previously the State Democratic Executive committee had called for computation of delegate strength by considering both Democratic and Republican votes that Shivers received as a cross-filed candidate in 1952.

Anti-Shivers loyalists, backed by two lower court decisions, have argued that the convention strength should be based only on Democratic votes recorded in the last state election year.

It is the first time in Texas political history that the question has arisen.

### Drought Aid

John C. White, the state commissioner of agriculture, went to Washington and asked that federal assistance be given to 27 Central Texas counties, hard hit by drought.

White told federal authorities that Central Texas people face possibly the worst crisis in history unless help—in the form of money or rain—comes soon.

### Red Law

Texas' new anti-Communist ruling that outlaws membership in the Communist Party or any organization attempting to overthrow the government by force may not hold up in court, says Attorney General John Ben Shepperd.  
Shepperd, who called the legislation the "most inclusive and far-sighted anti-Communist law in

the nation," warned state lawyers that a former court ruling holding that control of sedition belongs exclusively to the federal government might render the law invalid.  
Shepperd added that the ruling, handed down by a Pennsylvania court, might "knock out all state sedition and treason laws."

### Duval County

Suspended by the Supreme Court was an order halting the prosecu-

tion of Duval County political boss George Parr and several of his associates.

Attorney General Shepperd, halting the ruling which clears the way for action on 28 indictments returned by a special Duval County grand jury, said it "clears the decks for prosecution of the indictments."

It is my opinion that if there is any business in the United States that does not need a subsidy, it is the insurance business. If you have a mortgage on your home, the chances are that some insurance company owns that mortgage, because many, many mortgages are purchased every day by these com-

panies. The bill would have provided at least a door to socialized medicine, to which I am unalterably opposed.

### BUYING FROM OR SELLING TO UNCLE SAM

You would be most amused at some of the transactions and proposals that are presented to the Congress. Some are to sell items to the government, and some are to purchase items from the government. The same group may want to buy one item from the government and sell some other item to the government. The amusing feature about the whole situation is that the value of the items are determined by two different formulas in the minds of these groups. When they want to buy something from Uncle Sam, they demand that it be given to them at bargain basement prices, or it's socialism. When they want to sell something to Uncle Sam, they demand about five prices for it, and if any question is raised, they immediately scream that the government has gone socialist and is trying to rob all of the private citizens of their property. Frankly, the value of an item, whether it be a transmission line or a bucket of paint, should be determined by the same formula, whether it is being sold to the government or by the government.
