

Hundreds Pay Final Tribute To Earl Slater In Sunday Rites

Hundreds of area friends and relatives were at the Clyde Church of Christ at 4 p.m. Sunday to pay final tribute to Earl Slater, 74, former Clyde postmaster, who died unexpectedly while on duty as acting administrator of Callahan County Hospital in Baird about 1 p.m. Thursday.

Death came shortly after the highly respected church and civic leader had eaten lunch at the hospital. He had accepted the administratorship on a temporary basis about a week before his death. He had, as in the past agreed to serve as administrator while the board was seeking a permanent hospital head.

Funeral services were conducted by Owen Cosgrove, minister of the Clyde Church of Christ. He was assisted by Marion Hayes, minister of the Sterling City Church of Christ. Burial was in the Clyde Cemetery with Bailey Funeral Home in charge of the arrangements.

He was born in Canton on April 7, 1888, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Slater. He was the last surviving member of the family. He attended school at Canton, and moved to Clyde with his family in 1905. He was married to Miss Jessie McCammon at Clyde on August 12, 1912.

In 1908 he began 45 years service with the postal department in Clyde. He started as rural carrier and then became postmaster. He retired in 1953. He served as president of the Texas Rural Mail Carriers Association for four years. He was editor of the "Texas Carrier," an association publication, for 15 years.

Following his retirement from the postal service, he worked at intervals with the Callahan

County Hospital in Baird and served as administrator, assistant administrator and acting administrator whenever his services were required.

He had been a member of the Church of Christ for 56 years, and was an elder of the Clyde church. He volunteered his services as a preacher whenever needed at his home congregation or in other locations. He was well known as a song leader.

He is survived by his wife of Clyde, a daughter, Mrs. Ralph V. DeCoursey of Arlington, Virginia; a son, Billy Earl Slater, with the U. S. Navy in Florida, and eight grandchildren.

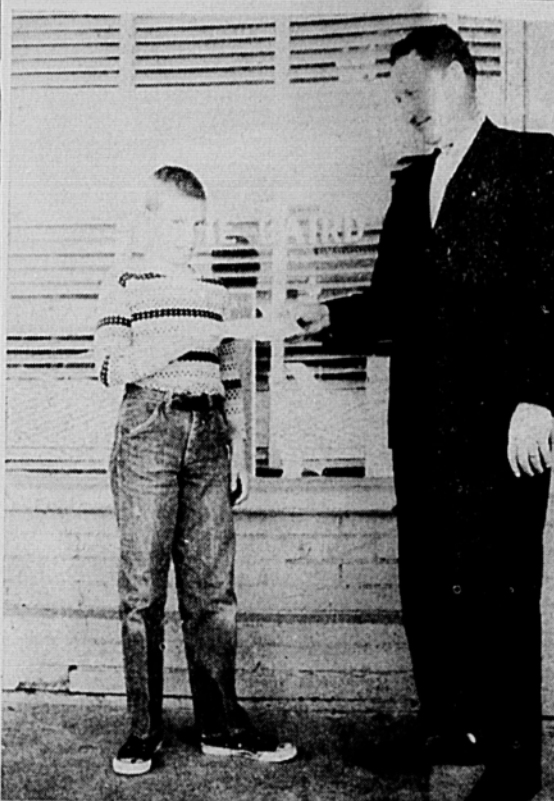

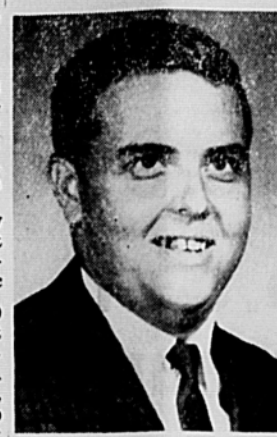
