
JOHN CAMPBELL, colonial postmaster of Boston, certainly set a good example in the liberal use of the mails.

"Available data indicate that in 1931 the world catch of whales was 42,874. yielding 3,686,976 barrels of oll! The Antarctic fishery alone employed 10,-700 men, six shore stations, 41 factory ships, 232 whale catchers, and five transports. This period represents the era of the greatest exploitation of whales in the history of this one-thonsand-year-old fishery.

"In this more recent era, whales are being hunted in the occans of the world from Splizbergen to the South Shelland island; from the straits of Magellan to the coasts of Alaska and Township 5 South; Kamchatka: from the French Congo to the Seychelles; and from Saldanka bay to Japan."

Earth shocks recorded by seismographs as occurring in uncharted lands or oceans have been given . new interpretation by some scientists Because of their location it is impossible to check closely on them and the fact that earthquakes are not to be expected in these sections leaves the scientists puzzled. An example of these mysters quakes is one occurring recently in the region around Baffinland, near Baffin bay. This region is at least 3,000 miles from the nearest earthquake center.
