IT'S A JUNIOR MARKETING SHOW

Jointly sponsored by the H-D Clubs, 4-H Boys and Girls and the FFA, today, in the shed at the rear of Manning & Cummings Motor company, which faces Leon Street, a Junior Marketing Show will be held.

H-D Clubs from Topsey, Union, West Clear Creek, Purmela, Mountain and other sections of the county will have exhibits, and in addition, the 4-H girls will have exhibits too, according to Miss Sidney Gibson, H-D Agent.

Exhibits will consist of centerpieces and other articles such as rugs for bedroom improvement, clothing for women and small children, canned fruit and vegetables. Judging will start at 10 o'clock and will be done by Miss Nan J. Mangold and Miss Euphie Bowman, H. D. Agents from Burnett and Bosque counties.

Announcements and awards will be made in the afternoon, Mrs. J. B. Kemp is chairman of the Exhibit Committee of the H-D Council.

PIGS, LAMBS AND CALVES TO BE SHOWN

In the boy's department, FFA and 4-H exhibits will consist of calves, pigs and lambs, which will be selected as to their marketing value, and will be judged on that score by T. D. Craddock, County Agent for Hamilton county.

Two requirements for entry are that the boys are either 4-H or FFA boys, and that the livestock be of market quality.

Exhibition tricks learned on the recent trip north will be used in the show.

SCS District in Tentative O. K.

Thursday, the state soil conservation board gave tentative approval to 25 petitions for formation of soil conservation districts.

It was suggested at the recent meeting here, that a part of Hamilton county be included in the Coryell County district, which also includes a small part of both Bosque and McLennan counties.

Scale models of actual buildings erected in Texas by NYA will be shown at the fair, and the insulation employed.

WTCC Continues Work on Rates

The Freight Rate Equality Federation will have a new secretary-manager to direct its widely watched campaign for equating the level of Texas freight rates with level applying in Central Freight Association states east and north.

To that post the Federation's officers have named Max Bentley, activities manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, to serve the FREF during the time that his chief, D. A. Brandeen, is engaged in his duties as member and secretary of a statewide fact-finding committee appointed by Gerald C. Mann, Attorney General of Texas, to assist him in investigating the structure of transportation charges affecting this state.

Brandeen was elected secretary-manager of the Freight Rate Equality Federation upon its organization last May. He is also general manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, which created the FREF to make statewide the freight rate equality campaign. The West Texas chamber's officers, in turn, have named Max Bentley acting secretary of its traffic board of which B. Reagan of Big Spring is chairman.

A Balkan neutrality bloc is being formed which will probably include Italy, Hungary, Roumania, and Bulgaria, with Italy as the instigator of the move.

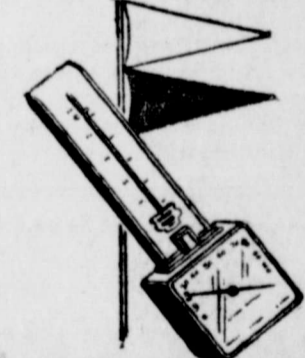
Three Royal Air Force men were killed yesterday, and 21 more, it is believed were lost.

ALBERT PERRY, FORMER GATESVILLE RESIDENT DIES IN FLORIDA

(From Hamilton Herald-Record)
 Albert Cornelius Perry, born at Paris, Texas, September 8, 1896 came to Hamilton with his mother and stepfather, Mrs. W. T. James and husband, and his brother, Wyatt Perry, at the age of ten years. He attended the public schools, but did not finish the high school course before entering into occupation for a livelihood. He was outstanding in character, and had an unusually fine, genial disposition that won for him numerous friends who were admiring and warmly loyal. The news of his untimely death came as a sad blow to all Hamilton people who knew Albert Perry.

The young man had lived in Hamilton very little since he came home from overseas where he served in the active fighting of the World War and afterward with the Army of Occupation in Germany. He suffered from the effects of the deadly German gas, and within the past several years had been an invalid. He received treatment in various hospitals and sanatoriums, but had been at his home in St. Petersburg, Florida, for some twelve months with his family and attended by a trained nurse, when the end came on September 7, at 6:30 o'clock in the morning.

While living in Gatesville, Albert Cornelius Perry was married to Miss Maggie Byrom, a member of a prominent family in that city. He was the father of a son, Charles Albert Perry. Survivors are the widow and her son; Mrs. W. T. James, mother of Albert Perry, and his half-brother, Garland James, of Hamilton, and a brother, Wyatt Perry, of Perryton, Texas, all of whom with W. T. James, the devoted step-father, attended the funeral.

The news story taken in part from St. Petersburg newspaper says:

"Albert Cornelius Perry, 42, retired salesman, who came here 14 years ago from Gatesville, Texas, died this morning, September 7, at 6:30 o'clock, at his home, 1929 Sixteenth street, south. Mr. Perry, who was born in Paris, Texas, was a member of the First Presbyterian Church here, the Masonic Lodge at Hamilton, Texas, and of the Veterans-of Foreign Wars in St. Petersburg.

"Funeral services for Albert Perry will be held tomorrow afternoon, September 11, at 2:30 o'clock at the Baynard chapel with the Rev. Dr. James A. McGuire, DD, officiating. Burial will be in Royal Palm cemetery."

AUTOMOBILE LAW EFFECTIVE OCTOBER FIRST

After October 1, prospective car buyers will be required to have a "Certificate of Title" which shows where he got the car, and who owned it before. The cost to the motorist will be 25c, it is said.

Attorney General Gerald Mann ruled that liens placed on tires, automobile radios, parts and accessories should be noted on the certificates of title as liens on motor vehicles under the new law effective Oct. 1.

The law is designed to catch up with car thieves and those attempting to sell mortgaged automobiles. Tax assessor-collectors issue the certificates.

"HI, TAXES"

That's going to be a slogan, from now on, especially, when you go to pay yours.

Do you know 43 PER CENT OF EVERY DOLLAR MADE IN THE UNITED STATES NOW GOES TO PAY GOVERNMENT (ALL GOVERNMENT) EXPENSES?

Ought we not have GOOD government for that?

The National Industrial Conference reports this in a study entitled "New Levels in Governmental expenditure, Taxation and Debt."

Government, according to their figures, is costing USA between EIGHTEEN and NINETEEN BILLIONS A YEAR.

President Roosevelt recently stated an estimate of the National Income was around SIXTY BILLION DOLLARS.

This 18 or 19 billions is 43 per cent of that!

From the preliminary issue of The Taxpayers Digest, we find in the USA the last year's cost of all kinds of government cost Americans an average of \$114.09 each, divided as follows: \$46.48 per person to the Federal Government; \$29.71 for State Government and \$37.90 for local government. This averages in Texas, \$6 a week per family for government and all kinds of government are constantly going deeper in the red. So called "hidden taxes" raise 59 per cent of this revenue. This is just to LET YOU KNOW!



Rather than writing you from Washington, I wish that I might be visiting with you in Texas. Our stay at home was all too short. In fact, we had just about succeeded in getting where we could best handle the matters that were brought to us when the call for the special session came. I had arranged to make a series of visits in different parts of the district. On these visits I planned to see those of my friends who had business with my office who could not

come to Waco. I am sorry this was not possible.

The President has, as you all know, called the Congress to consider the best methods of keeping the United States out of war. Much as we regretted to come back I am sure each member is glad to lay aside his personal wishes and return in the hope that we may be able to avert the terrible catastrophe toward which we are so surely headed. In some way many of our people have a mistaken idea that we have some kind of law that keeps us out of foreign trouble. Unfortunately we have no such law today. The only practical effect of the present law is to prevent the sale of airplanes to France and England. The present law does not effect Germany or Russia because neither of these countries want to buy our airplanes. They have more than all the rest of the world.

It has never been the SALE of goods but their delivery that has involved neutral nations in war. The bad dog bites the delivery boy not the "Piggly Wiggly" grocer. I think it is time for the United States to quit being delivery boy. But our present law puts no restrictions on delivery of goods—through the war zone in American boats—. As I see it, if we follow this movement of American ships into the war zone to continue it is certain to lead us into war. I want to stop all American ships, no matter what they carry, from going into the war zone. I also want to keep all American citizens out of the war zone, no matter what their business. The present

law allows Americans to sail on the ships of belligerents just as it did in 1917, and if we don't change it we will see the same things happen that happened in 1917. The present law also allows American citizens to sell goods to citizens of warring nations on credit just as they did in 1917. This is another serious danger point. If we allow American financiers to acquire a financial interest in the outcome of the war they are likely to lead us into war. I want to change these weak spots. So does President Roosevelt. I would do nothing that seemed capable of leading us any nearer to war, nor would I let anything remain undone that might keep us out of war. All nations lose. I fear that our free institutions of American Democracy might not withstand the pressure of modern war. I feel that we have no right to subject them to the test. I likewise feel that America has no right to gamble with our nation's future and with the whole future of civilization—and that is what we would be doing if we involved our country in war. I, therefore, feel that we have no right to allow the same conditions to continue to exist which led us into the war in 1917. We know that in 1917 the presence of American citizens in the war zone was the immediate spark that set off our entrance. We know that this spark was lit against a background of credit sales to warring nations. The present law allows both of these errors to be repeated. I think if we are to save America we must learn from the past.

I listened in person, as I am sure you did over radio, to the President's speech yesterday. I felt he outlined conditions well. I was only disappointed that he would even suggest allowing American ships or American citizens in the war zones under ANY circumstances. I believe we should KEEP THEM OUT. I don't think that there is any such thing as "travel at your own risk". No matter what warnings have been given when the American flag is shot down and American ships are sunk, the passions of our people are going to become so aroused that it will be most difficult to keep out of war. For my part, I prefer to say to all American citizens and ships—"Stay Out of Europe." If they don't stay out we can't stay out. I therefore think our government has a duty and a right to keep them out.

Inasmuch as the House passed a neutrality bill last session, which is now pending in the Senate, all of the fight will be in the Senate until that body acts and sends the bill back to us with such amendments as they may have put onto it. While the pending bill will doubtless be much changed, it will be used as a framework and thereby save a great deal of time that would be wasted if a new bill were to be considered by the House.

I would like to let our people know that there is not nearly as much feeling here in Washington that the United States is going into war as there is back in Central Texas. I am glad to find this true. I believe that practically everyone, here or at home, wants to keep America out of war. To my mind it is the most important thing that can be done for the world, probably during my entire lifetime. I think there is lots of information about our present neutrality law and the law we need. I know that we cannot guarantee that the passage of any law will keep us out of war, just as we couldn't pass laws that will guarantee that there will be no more crime, but just as we can make crime less likely, so can we make war less likely. That is what we hope to do.
