
The Palace seats some 300 and the Regal can handle about 600 or more. There'll be plenty of seats, and everyone is urged to attend one or more of these shows.

Mrs. Lucy Schloeman and her family of Gatesville were present for the dedication of a granite monument to her brother, the late Professor Charles H. Wedemeyer, pioneer educator and editor, at the North Belton cemetery Sunday afternoon, December 10.

Approximately 100 students and riends of Prof. Wedemeyer were also present, including other members of the immediate family: Charlie Wedemeyer and Miss Marion Wedemeyer of Greenville, Mrs. C. O. Edens of Georgetown, son and daughters; B. B. 
