R.A.F. BOMBS NAZI PLANT
London, July 9 (AP)—British bombers, made a blazing raid on the Reich's great ersatz gasoline plant at Leun.

Seven British bombers were reported lost in night attacks and eight fighters during daylight channel skirmishes, but the British claimed to have shot down 5 German planes during the night and 13 Wednesday.

U.S. AIRMEN TO CHINA
Singapore, July 9 (UP)—Thirty American airplane mechanics and maintenance men arrived today enroute to Chungking to aid the Chinese air force.

COMMONS CHEERS NEWS
London, July 9 (AP)—Winston Churchill predicted on Wednesday that British and United States naval forces may find it mutually advantageous to assist each other in guarding the supply lanes between Britain, Iceland and America.

NAVY KEEP SEA OPEN
Washington, July 9 (AP)—Secretary of the Navy Frank Knox said Wednesday that President Roosevelt had told the Navy what to do if it became necessary to shoot in order to protect Atlantic approaches to United States bases against hostile activity.

FRENCH WANT PEACE, SYRIA
Vichy, July 9 (AP)—France asked Britain Wednesday for an end to the melancholy, month-old Syrian war, "in order to halt grievous bloodshed in a combat daily more unequal."

NAZIS CAUSTIC, ICELAND
Berlin, July 9 (AP)—Germany, thru an authorized spokesman, charged caustically Wednesday that United States troops might as well be in a British port as in Iceland from the military point of view, but gave no hint as to whether the American occupation would provoke actual armed retaliation.

RUSSIANS ROUT NAZIS?
Moscow, July 9 (UP)—German forces shifted from the English Channel invasion coast after installing dummy wooden guns to hide their withdrawal were reported on Wednesday night to have been routed in a savage Russian counter-drive on the central front 325 miles west of Moscow.

FAIN ASKS N.B.C. PROOF
Austin, July 9 (AP)—State Senator Clem Fain of Livingston, chairman of the committee to investigate un-American activities, today asked the National Broadcasting company for evidence to substantiate statements of a radio commentator on the recent U.S. senatorial election.

7 NURSES LOST AT SEA
Washington, July 9 (AP)—Seven American Red Cross nurses and one Red Cross worker were feared lost at sea Wednesday night as the result of two ship sinkings attributed to submarines.

A OLD TIME ball player dropped in t' see me last week an' he got all het up 'bout th' modern ball players bein' sich softies an' not bein' able t' talk it. He pulled up his pants an' showed scars all over his legs maid by sharp spikes t' help prove his point.

"T'day," he sed, "if a player gits a inch gash in his leg they'll talk him outta th' gaim an' call a doctor an' th' reporters maik a big fuss 'bout it in th' papers. In th' ole days he'd have t' break a leg t' git two or three days rest."

We asked th' ole timer what was th' reason fer most modern ball players bein' soft. He allowed they was gittin' ball players frum colleges insted o' farm boys frum th' small towns. I figger he mought have sumthin' there.

A farm boy jist natchilly gits tuffened up durin' his boyhood more'n city boys. They walk more, wurk harder an' eat better grub. Them blackeyed peas an' sow belly with buttermilk an' corn dodgers puts on a dern site more mussel than hamburgers, fancy steaks an' salads.

You'll notis t'day where most o' our best football players cum frum. Th' big colleges bring 'em in frum high schools in smaller towns. Jist check over th' stars in our South-west Conference fer th' past fue yeers. Ninety per cint o' 'em cum frum high schools in small Texas towns.

While sports t'day require more brains an' fast thinkin' than in th' ole days, mussel an' stamina count th' most in th' long run. A boy what keeps his body in good shape will have a much better chance o' bein' a sports star than th' one with brains alone.

An', regardless o' what th' radio announcers say, smokein' ain't ever dune a athleto inny good. I can't think o' a single one right now what was a cigarette fiend. Still I know dozens what chawed tobaccie.

Chawin' tobaccie don't git in yer lungs an' talk away yer wind.

Th' ole timer asked me how long had it bin since I seen a pitcher twirl a dubble hedder ball gaim. I had t' admit it had bin several yeers. In them days they wus sum moughty hot semi-pro gaims. I umpired one at Kaufman once an' they wus more than \$15,000 wurth o' cotton an' money bet on th' contest. They brought me down frum Dallas an' paid me \$100 t' umpire th' gaim. It wus a tuff one, but I finally got through with it.

I never wus called as miny fancy naims in my life. But, after th' gaim I rode back in a auto t' Dallas on friendly terms with three o' th' players what called me th' worst naims durin' th' gaim.

We found sum moughty cold home brew jist this side o' Crandall. We got so friendly like we cum dern near kissin' each other 'fore we got back t' Dallas.

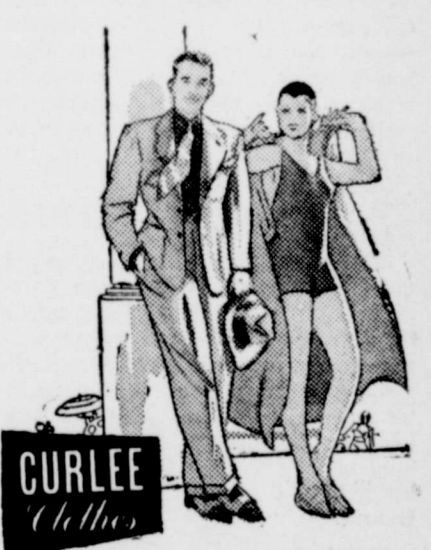

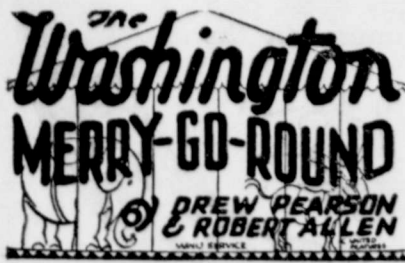

MORE ON 'HESS-MESS'

Following the outbreak of the Nazi-Russian war, European capitals buzzed with reports of a German offer to Britain to make peace, then turn their united forces against Soviet Russia. These reports were not empty rumors; they were absolutely true.

Behind them is a story of the most audacious and astounding Nazi intrigue of the war to date. Its opening scene was the sensational Hess "flight" to Britain; its closing paragraph the "surprise" Nazi declaration of war on their ally, Red Russia.

The inner details of this brain-reeling plot are not yet unraveled and all of them won't leak out until the history books are written. But authorities have pieced it together and it is now possible to get the main outlines.

Hatred of Communists.

Following the victorious Balkan campaign which made Germany master of Europe, powerful military-Nazi elements, always hating the Communists, began urging peace with Britain in exchange for a British-German coalition against Russia. After a bitter struggle inside the Nazi party, Hitler sided with the anti-Red group and the wheels were set in motion to line up the British.

It was realized that they would have to be approached in such a manner that they could not doubt the authenticity of the Nazi plan. So Hess was chosen for this mission. Not only was he the one man in Germany closest to Hitler, but he was also known for his hatred of Communism. And before the war he had had contacts with the British nobility.

So Hess, not flying alone, but accompanied by several guiding planes; and not taking off from central Germany as reported, but from Norway, made his dramatic descent on the estate of the Scotch duke of Hamilton.

Hess' Message.

The message brought by Hess in substance was as follows:

(1) Britain and Germany would enter a coalition as the chief partners in a new Axis; (2) Italy would be placated with some minor possessions of France, which would be stripped of its empire; (3) Germany would retain a free hand on the whole of the continent, with Britain helping to establish that free hand by joining Germany in conquering Russia.

The British government's answer was to incarcerate Hess and immediately notify Washington and Moscow of the plan.

The subsequent chain of events is history. Darlan and Laval were among the first to get wind of the scheme, and rushed to Hitler offering complete "collaboration." This drew withering denunciations from President Roosevelt and Secretary of State Hull.

Britain, which for months had been trying to make up its mind to attack in Syria, launched an offensive with Free French forces to seize this strategically vital region. Then on June 15, British intelligence got wind of quiet German withdrawals of air and other forces from French bases. This was why the British took the initiative in their continuous day and night bombing raids wreaking havoc on key German centers.

Russia Fearful.

Fearful of attack and anxious to appease in all directions, Moscow abandoned its stiff-necked coolness to Japan and hurriedly signed a pact in order to ensure at least temporary tranquillity on its eastern border. Simultaneously Stalin abandoned his traditional behind-the-scenes role and actively assumed the reins as premier of Russia. Russia began massing 160 divisions on its western borders.

It was at this time that Ambassador John Winant returned to the U. S. A. at the request of Prime Minister Churchill in order to give President Roosevelt a complete fill-in and to deliver categorical assurances from Churchill that Britain will never make peace with Hitler.

Note—The British government was so sure Hitler would attack Russia that Churchill was able to prepare and deliver his historic radio address only 18 hours after Hitler invaded Russia.

CAPITAL CHAFF

Sentiment is increasing in several states for a "Federal Union of Nations." The North Carolina legislature has memorialized congress to undertake an international federal union now, and Representative Woodring of Pennsylvania is proposing the same to the Pennsylvania legislature.

One of the strongest foes of war in President Roosevelt's inner circle of defense advisers is Bernard Baruch, head of the 1917 War Industries board. Baruch believes the U. S. is not prepared to wage large-scale military action.

Telling newsmen about his inspection of a new powder plant in Tennessee, OPM Director General Knudsen remarked, "They are turning out the stuff in great shape," and nonchalantly pulled out of his pocket a stick of dynamite. Most of the reporters, pop-eyed, nervously doused their cigarettes.
