REDS ADMIT NAZIS GAIN

Moscow, Aug. 11 (AP)—Stubborn fighting on two new and important sectors of the Leningrad front and the Ukraine was officially reported by Soviet Russia as the Red army told of throwing huge boulders and old armored trains at some places in the battle against the invaders.

LOOKS BAD, AUSTRALIA

London, Aug. 10 (AP)—A sudden critical turn in the Far Eastern situation was reported from Australia Sunday night, and from informed quarters in London, from Chinese diplomats and Australian and New Zealand sources it was evident that all eyes were turned on Washington.

R.A.F. SLAMS NAZI COAST

London, Aug. 10 (AP)—The RAF stepped up its daylight sorties over the English Channel and the German-occupied coast of France Sunday, dispatching planes across the gusty Strait of Dover which observers said were the largest force used in some time.

U.S. BREAK WITH VICHY?

Washington, Aug. 10 (AP)—A break in diplomatic relations with

the Vichy government was reported probably Sunday if it became evident that leaders on defending the French empire would mean German's gaining full use of strategic Atlantic bases on the French African coast.

WARDEN SLAIN IN BREAK

McAlester, Oklahoma, Aug. 10 (AP)—Warden Jess Dunn of Oklahoma state prison, three convicts and a county jailer were slain Sunday in a bloody bid for liberty by four long-term prisoners who shot the warden, held as a hostage when officers closed in.

TROOPS TO TAKE PLANT?

Federal troops were reported poised at eastern camps Sunday night for a possible march on the Kearney, N. J., plant of the Federal Ship and Drydock Company if the government decides on drastic action to end a 3-day strike on \$495,000,000 worth of defense ship building construction.

BOWIE TROOPS IN LA.

Mansfield, La., Aug. 10 (AP)—The full strength of the 36th division was mustered into its forest base near Mansfield tonight, ready

for the last week of conditioning before the army's maneuvers.

W. LEE SAYS "SAM, LAY OFF"

Dallas, Aug. 10 (AP)—In a transcribed broadcast, without music, Senator W. Lee O'Daniel today told Texans "it is time for the government to commence to back off and leave the people alone."

When he got to Washington, O'Daniel said, he found "the old law mill still grinding, and turning out instructions telling the restaurant men how to run their restaurants, the manufacturers how to run their factories, and the railroads how to run the railroads."

He added "it will be a sad day when everything in this nation gets regimented and controlled from Washington".

DEMOS WANT ARMY HELD

Washington, Aug. 10 (UP)—Democratic leaders were revealed tonight to have rallied sufficient support over the week end so that they feel confident the house will approve at least a 12 month extension of military service, with a reasonably good chance that it might follow the senate's lead and make it 18 months.

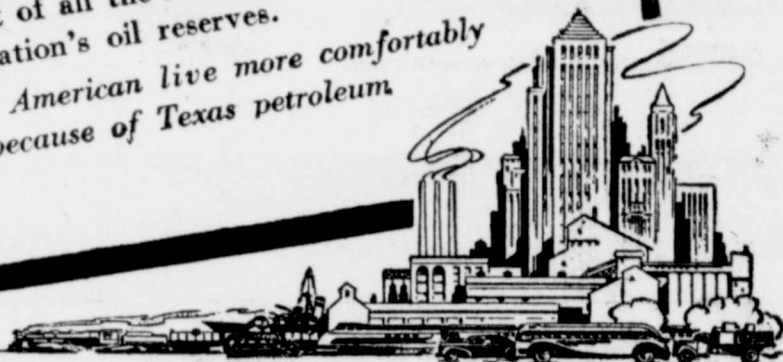

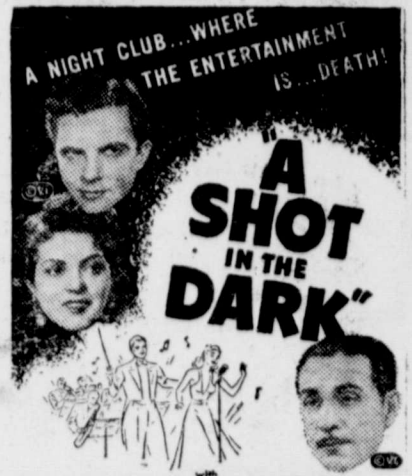

The long awaited tax bill is before the House. The debate was postponed because the leaders of the House became alarmed at the action of the majority last Tues. in rejecting a conference committee report on the plant seizure bill. This bill, which had passed both House and Senate, provided that the government might take over any industrial plant vital to the national defense if it refused to cooperate. As I have previously explained, an effort was made and defeated in the House to extend the authority to cases where the plant was closed down by strikes. The Senate had included such a provision. The Conference Committee brought the bill back with a provision expressly authorizing the taking over of any defense plant closed down "for any reason". I felt that it was a very fair and much needed provision. I voted for the conference report, but the House again showed that it is more afraid of Harry Bridges and John L. Lewis than it is of Hitler or the Japs, and voted 255 to 114 to reject the conference report and to deny the government the right to take over a defense plant where production is stopped by a strike. As I see it, this is an open invitation to a repetition of the kind of strikes that tied up the North American Aircraft plant and the Allis-Chalmers plant. Of course the nation would be much safer if such votes as this were never taken. I hope that some of those who

have criticized members of Congress for not insisting on a showdown on some of these matters will now realize that it is not wise or helpful to demand a vote unless you have reasonable prospects of winning.

Anyway, after this vote the House leaders became alarmed for fear that the House would reject the "closed rule" they were presenting for the consideration of the tax bill and hastily adjourned. During the evening it was agreed that the closed rule would be modified enough to give us a chance to vote on the provision requiring "joint" returns on the income of the husband and wife. This will be the only item on which a separate vote will be taken in the House, and unless the amendment must be considered in the "Committee of the Whole." The Committee of the Whole is actually the whole House but acting as a committee. The vote in the Committee cannot be a record vote. If the amendment carries in the Committee it must then be ratified in the House (by the same members but acting under different voting rules.) At this time there can be a roll call vote, but if the amendment is defeated in the Committee of the Whole it cannot be brought before the House. Of course, I shall vote for the amendment to the bill and against the proposal to require joint returns. It seems to me that to require joint returns would break down every

CROP CONDITIONS ARE REPORTED BY JOHN VOSS OF W.P.C.A.

John Voss, of the WPCA makes the following crop condition report on Coryell county.

"Cotton at this time is fruiting extra well. Corn is practically made, will average about 25 bushels over the county. Hay crop is good. The wheat was very sorry; most of it was harvested, some loss due to too much rain. Have had some weevil damage, but at this time they are letting up a bit. The range is good. Livestock are in good condition. Some losses in spring lambs due to needles and stomach worms. Not many livestock sales being made, but there is a good demand for any kind of butcher cattle.

The majority of the wool from this county is in warehouses. Have an ideal "season." All crops are made, except cotton, and it will do better without any more rain. Recently the leaf worm has been reported active in a small way."

dent apologists, the often-heard from Mr. D. Worth Clark, self styled "Isolationist" Senator from Idaho, and co-worker with Senator Wheeler and "Colonel" Chas. Lindbergh, after repeating time and again that we should not be concerned with Hitler's aggression, stated this past week that the United States should "take over" Canada and all of the South American republics. Of course, this does not represent the view of the American government or the American people, but it will be so easy for Hitler to make the people of South America think it does. Thus, one irresponsible man who has always tried to embarrass his country in its hour of peril does more to strengthen Hitler in South America than all the German agents have been able to do in 15 years. Thus, the "Isolationists" who have charged the President and all of us who want to protect America, with aggressive designs show their true colors and admit their own desire to strike down our weaker neighbors just as Hitler has struck down his little neighbors—Thank God that F. D. Roosevelt and not D. Worth Clark still shapes the foreign policy of America.
