### COAL DIGGERS STILL OUT

Washington, Nov. 16 (AP)—Union and mangement conferees on the captive coal mine dispute broke off negotiations Sunday, still deadlocked on the union ship issue, and John L. Lewis, standing firmly on his order for a work stoppage by 53,000 miners, checked the next action up to President Roosevelt—and maybe Congress. "It's your move, boys".

### OTHER CIO'S BACK MINERS

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 16 (AP)—The executive board of the CIO pledged unqualified support Sunday to the United Mine Workers of America "in its logical effort to stabilize the mining industry on the basis of a union shop" covering captive mines.

Tokyo, Nov. 17 (AP)—Foreign Minister Shigenori Togo said Monday that the time for negotiations with the United States was drawing toward a close and warned

## Dallas News Has Editorial On Lovelady's Bill

Senator Karl Lovelady, who has introduced a bill in the Texas Legislature designed to put an end to overspending in Texas elections.

Senator Lovelady has already gotten the Attorney General, Gerald C. Mann to look the bill over to insure its validity and constitutionality.

The Dallas Morning News, in commenting on the bill, says in part: "The Lovelady bill makes a game effort to cover all phases of the bought election evil. It prohibits expenditure on behalf of a candidate by any person other than the officially certified agents. It sets up a central reception agency thru which money that is contributed must filter and by which such money must be disbursed. It makes a felony of violation. So far as verbiage is concerned, it looks like an airtight bill."

The monkey in the woodpile, according to the News, is: "There are already similar bills, and the breakdown has come in enforcement. If the body politic demanded enforcement of the law in righteous wrath it would get results . . . Unfortunately, our present national trend is not one that encourages a belief we will cure the situation. Political honesty originates in the iron in the national soul. It cannot prosper in a period when he who promises most at the expense of the nation obtains the highest vote."

## MRS. LILLIE ANN SHELDON PASSES AWAY TWO WEEKS BEFORE 104TH BIRTHDAY

At the advanced age of almost 104 years, Mrs. Lillie Ann Sheldon passed to her reward Monday afternoon, November 3, at the home of her son, Frank Sheldon, at Star. She died thirteen days before her birthday, leaving five generations of descendants living.

Lillie Ann Stenbride was born at Van Buren, Arkansas November 16, 1837. At the age of 12 she moved to Texas with her family and settled in Hill county. In 1873 she was united in marriage to L. W. Sheldon also of Hill county. The couple moved to Hamilton county in 1886, where the deceased had resided for 55 years. Mr. Sheldon died in 1922.

To this union seven children were born, three of whom are still living. They are a daughter, Mrs. Bettie Gray, who lives in New Mexico and two sons, Frank and

Walter Shave, of Star.

When Mrs. Sheldon came to Texas as the trip was made in an ox wagon and the Indian population was still thick. After she and her husband moved to Hamilton county, supplies were brought to this section in freight wagons from Waco, which then was only a village of log huts and store houses. Mr. Sheldon operated a saw mill and made furniture. His mill was such a curiosity that people drove a great distance to see it in operation.

Funeral services for this good woman, who, until the last two years, had been both mentally and physically alert were conducted by the Church of Christ minister, Clem C. Hoover, of Lometa, at the new Hurst Ranch cemetery, where burial was made.

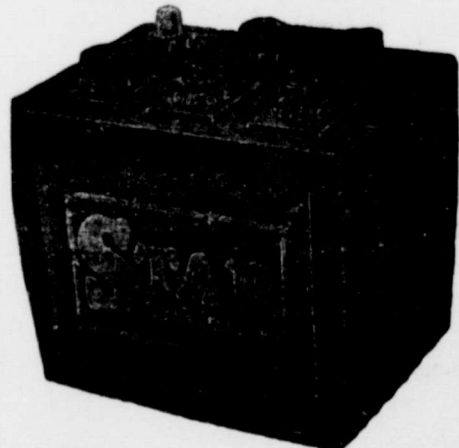

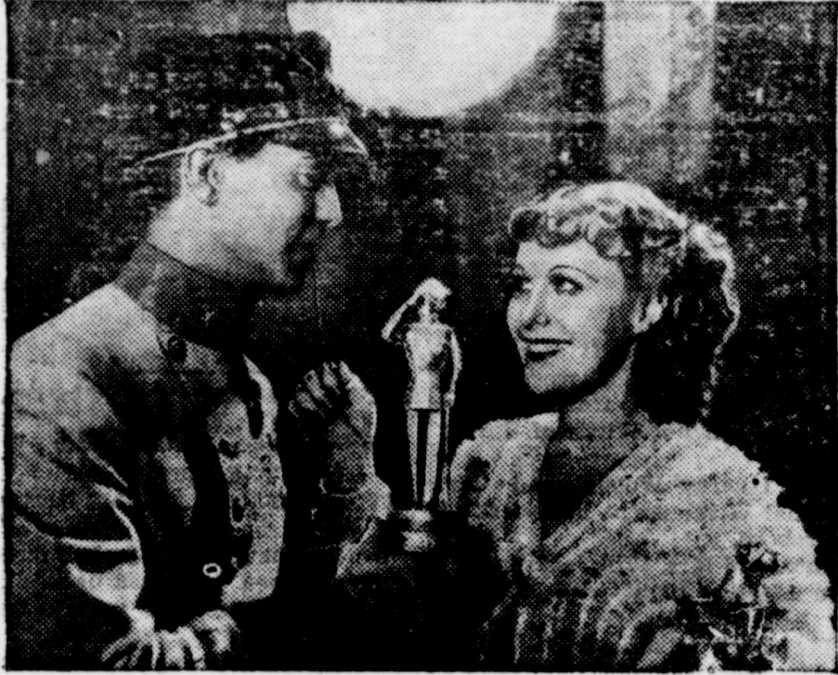
