DIRECTORS OF N.F.L.A. MET AT BROWNWOOD NOVEMBER ELEVENTH

S. J. Barnard of Mound and Virgil Lockhart of Pidoceke, directors of the Coryell NFLA, attended the directors meeting at Brownwood, Armistice Day, with 28 other farm loan associations of central Texas.

Others attending were officers of the Federal Land Bank of Houston who reported farmers and ranchmen are in better financial condition than in years, and there have been less foreclosures and farms acquired in this territory since 1931, and 22 percent less than was taken over in 1940.

At the close of business, September this year, the Federal Land Bank and the Land Bank Commissioner had \$17,676,334.00 in Federal Loans and \$4,517,093.00 in Commissioner loans loaned thru these 29 associations.

Cairo, Egypt, Nov. 19 (AP)—The British Imperial Army in Africa, around 750,000 strong and superbly armed with the new American weapons, struck by surprise into Axis-held Libya at dawn Tuesday on a 140-mile front and swept on more than 50 miles the first day, continuing the offensive.

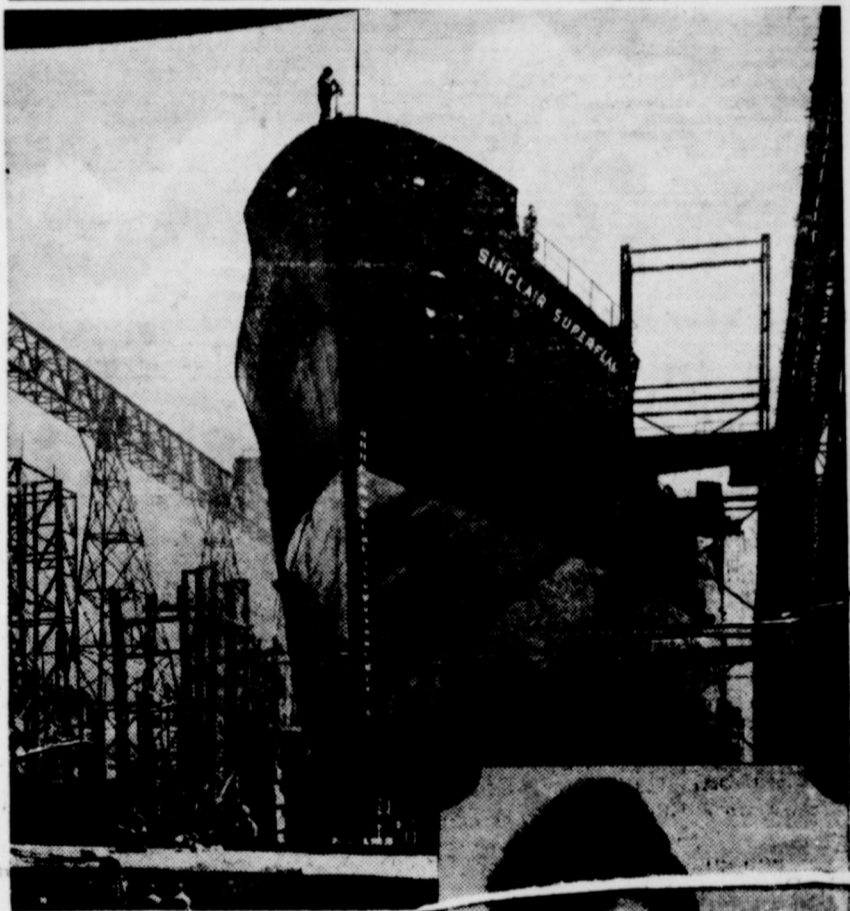

New Sinclair Tanker Launched Ahead Of Schedule

ONE of the ships recently launched, ahead of schedule, according to Mr. Jack Morse, local agent for the Sinclair Refining Company, is the new tanker "SINCLAIR SUPERFLAME" built by the Fore River Yard of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation. "Ships like this one," Mr. Morse pointed out, "are one answer to the eastern oil shortage. The SUPERFLAME has a capacity of 95,000 barrels of petroleum products and in a month's time will haul about 8,000,000 gallons of oil from the Gulf to North Atlantic ports."

The keel of the vessel was laid on May 31st and it is expected that the ship will be in service a month after launching, or three months ahead of the original schedule. Mrs. Harry A. Hassan, wife of the manager of the Marine Sales of the Company, christened the ship. The ship was designed by the Sinclair Refining Company's Marine Department to make over 14 knots per hour and to carry the largest cargo for her weight and size. It is the last word in comfort for the crew, with hot and

cold running water in every room and reading lights over every berth. The vessel is also equipped with the latest type of fathometer which automatically gives the depths of waters over which the ship is approaching, a gyroscopic compass which steers the vessel automatically; ship-to-shore telephone; radio directional finder, together with the very latest radio equipment.

The SUPERFLAME, Mr. Morse says, is the third Sinclair tanker to be launched at the Fore River Yard this year and three others are on the ways there at this time. She is one of ten tankers ordered by the Company in May 1940. The other four are being built by the Federal Shipbuilding Corporation at Kearny, N. J.

This is the fourth in a series of six outstanding diagram plays by leading college coaches from Grantland Rice's new Cities Service Football Guide.

DECEPTION is an important item in our style of attack. Our idea of deception is to set up blocks rather than to deceive or fool the opponents.

The following play is one that we used very successfully on many occasions.

An A right formation with a balanced line. The ball is passed to our No. 3 or tailback who spins, faking the ball to the No. 4, or fullback. The fullback fakes as though he had the ball, drawing the attention of the defensive weak side end

and tackle; he then either blocks or checks the defensive end. The No. 2 or Q. B. and the strong side tackle double team and take the defensive weak side tackle out. The fake by the fullback sets up this block. The line blocks as designated, with our left end having the most difficult block; he either takes the defensive center in or out, depending on how he reacts on the play, and the ball carrier runs accordingly.

We found this style of attack most successful the past year.
