GHS HORNETS WIN CAGE TITLE

COP CHAMPIONSHIP BY BEATING VALLEY MILLS EAGLES, 64 TO 12

A hot and ready Gatesville Hornet cage crew, stung by the loss of two regulars through ineligibility, clicked in amazing form Friday night to annihilate an awkward, hapless Valley Mills squad 64-12 and capture the championship of this part of the district. Laying down a tremendous barrage of field goals, bucketing twenty-nine of them from every point on the floor, the locals humiliated the Eagle five and encouraged local fandom to believe that, despite the absence of Frye and Wittie, the Hornets still have a great ball club.

THORNTON HIGH SCORER

Big Thornton, husky center who is in good scholastic standing for the first time in his high school career, was thrown into the gaping slot left open by the departed Ken Frye, and he responded nobly. Using his height to great advantage under the backboard, he tapped in eight follow-up shots and sank two gratis throws to lead the night's scorers with eighteen points he was followed closely by Captain Cotton Blanchard, who sank his wheeling one-hand shot with uncanny accuracy to tally fourteen markers.

Bill Manning, hustling forward, scored ten points and played a sensational floor game. He intercepted numerous Eagle passes, while his passing and ball-handling were speedy and flawless. Wilkinson played his usual steady game and was a bulwark on the defensive. Giebler, an inexperienced youngster who has been ill most of the season, filled Wittie's guard berth in grand style.

Nutt, big Valley Mills guard, led the Eagle scoring with six points. Vannatta, the big forward

who sank twelve points when the Eagles upset McGregor, fouled out early in the second period and failed to score a point the short time he was in there.

HORNETS LEAD AT HALF 39-8

The Eagles started fast as Nutt and Hubby roped field goals to earn themselves a four-point lead before the locals scratched. But that was the sum total of the first quarter offensive efforts. Wilkinson pushed in a net follow-up to start the Golden Boys' scoring avalanche and from there on the Eagles were never in the ball game. The Hornets pitched 'em in from all angles while holding their opponents scoreless to build up a 19-4 margin by the end of the initial quarter. They kept up this sizzling scoring spree during the second period and were ahead 29-8 at halftime.

Coach Pruitt mercifully used his reserves throughout the last half to hold the scoring down, but the scrubs did all right for themselves, with little Wayne Blanchard and Lengefeld looking especially good.

HORNETTES COME THRU FOR THIRD TOURNAMENT TITLE

The Hornets smashed through all competition to cop their third championship of the current season at Avalon, bringing home a beautiful 24-inch trophy emblematic of their victories.

In the tournament finals, the local sextette banged their way to a 21-6 win over the Ennis Club before a crowd of seven hundred cage fans.

There were fifteen of the top teams of that section entered in the tournament, which was divided into four brackets. The Hornets were placed in the toughest bracket, but took a close 25-18 decision over the capable Mertens club after drawing a bye in the first round. In their semi-final contest they won easily from a weak Bardwell team, 26-4, while Ennis was beating Avalon to gain a place in the finals with the Hornets.

Two members of Gatesville's great defensive unit placed on the tourney's official all-district team. Camille Lester and Ara Mae Black received gold basketballs, while

Pruitt's proteges barged into the tourney finals by taking an easy 49-26 decision from a meek quintet of Clifton Cubs. The Hornets stepped into the lead with the opening whistle and were never headed.

MANNING STAR IN CUB GAME

Fiery Bill Manning led the Gatesville quint to victory in this one. He roped sixteen points, and handled the ball seventy-five per cent of the time. Blanchard meshed 12 points, while Thornton scored 9.

The Eagles won the right to play in the finals by scoring an upset win over a dispirited five from McGregor, 27-19. Vanatta, Eagle forward was high scorer with 12 points, and Poss led the McGregor attack with six.

Evant, long a hotbed of basketball enthusiasm, is having an invitational tournament this week end. They have invited several good teams from this part of the state, and will have some great games slated.

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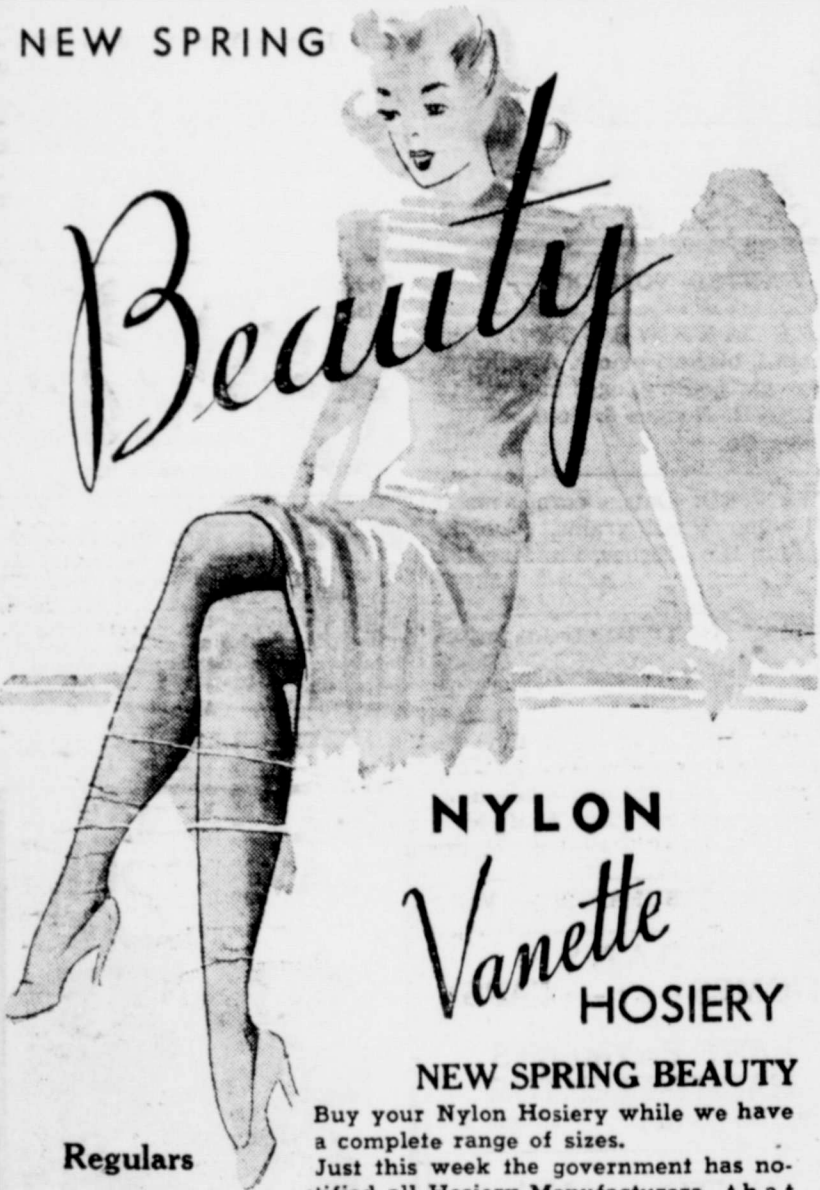
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
