Also, from the Navy Relief Society for Mrs. Whitlock will receive \$25.00. This is the Society mentioned frequently by Walter Winchell, and for which he has at several times donated the money he received, or would receive for his Sunday night broadcasts.

This, we believe, brings the death toll to Coryell county for World War II to three men, and one at Adamsville near the county line.

DERNA FALLS IN LIBYA

Cairo, Egypt, Feb. 4 (AP)—Derna and all but 150 miles of the Libyan coast has been lost by the British in the swift two-week offensive of Field Marshal Erwin Rommel's Axis forces, it was disclosed Wednesday.

They're going to wear Libya out fighting back and forward over it.

DUTCH LOSSES, SOERABAJA

Batavia, NEI, Feb. 4 (AP)—The defenders of Java, acutely aware of a possible Japanese invasion, Wednesday night grimly counted 174 casualties and very considerable fighter aircraft losses after Tuesday's two-hour assault by more than 70 bombers on Soerabaja, the Allied naval bastion which has replaced Singapore as an offensive base.

AID TO SINGAPORE

Singapore, Feb. 4 (AP)—The supreme allied command, charging the defenders of Singapore to hold on at all costs, assured this besieged island Wednesday that great reinforcements of British and American forces were being sent to the southwestern Pacific, and

strong new hope swept thru the imperial line.

DITTO, REDS CHASE NAZIS

Moscow, Feb. 5 (AP)—The Russians declared officially Thursday that 2,800 more Germans had fallen on the snowy battlefields far west of here on the road to Smolensk and that the Red army still was rolling ahead in its mighty winter offensive despite fierce resistance by fresh Nazi troops.

GIRL SPY TELLS OF TRIP

New York, Feb. 4 (AP)—An automobile trip to defense centers in the southern coastal states was described Wednesday by Lucy Boehmler, 18-year-old German born blonde, who testified she made the journey with a man charged by the Federal Government as a German espionage leader.

The banks have heretofore been doing these services for the customers free.

Due to loss of employees for war service, and due to restrictions imposed by the Wages and Hours Law:

It will be impossible for the banks to make out income tax returns for our customers as we have been doing.

It will be necessary for us to make a charge of 25 cents for each affidavit on birth certificates, gasoline refund claims, etc., and for taking acknowledgements to Deeds and other legal documents we will charge the usual fees.

Any information that we have concerning your business with the bank, or any data that we have with reference to bank transactions will be gladly given as heretofore without any charge.

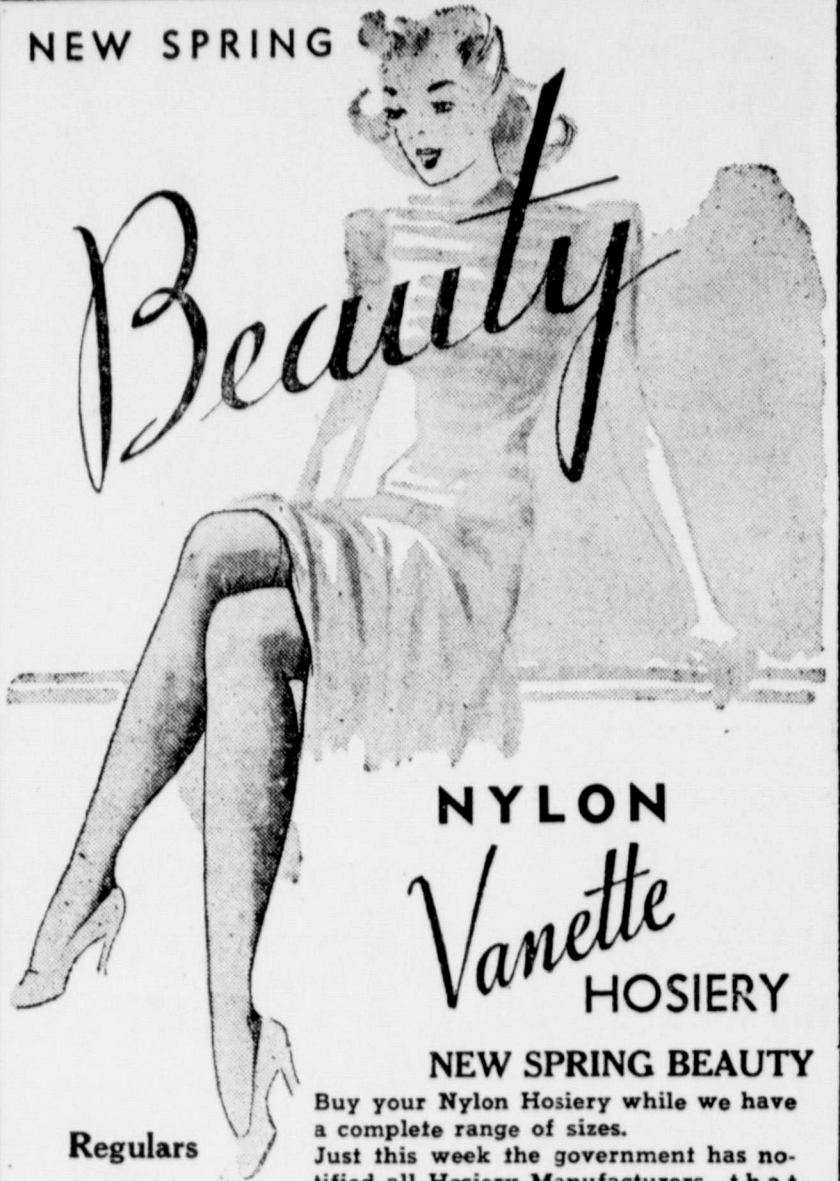
The Treasury Department will have in Gatesville a representative on March 3, for the purpose of rendering free assistance and giving necessary information in making out income tax reports.
