GEN. DOUG M'ARTHUR COOPERATING IN USO CAMPAIGN SOLDIERS

With Gen. Douglas MacArthur's name as a supporter and cooperator in the United Service Organizations campaign to provide for the comfort and entertainment of men in the service here and abroad, USO ought to go!

Harry C. Weiss of Houston is state chairman of USO, and the 1942 campaign opens May 11 for funds, which for Texas will be \$1,100,000 and \$32,000,000 for the nation.

Recreational activities for men in service is provided for by this organization which is a combination of The Salvation Army, YMCA, YWCA, National Catholic Community Service, Jewish Welfare Board and the National Travelers' Aid Association, all formed into this non-denominations group.

Their services are in 43 states and 10 bases across the oceans.

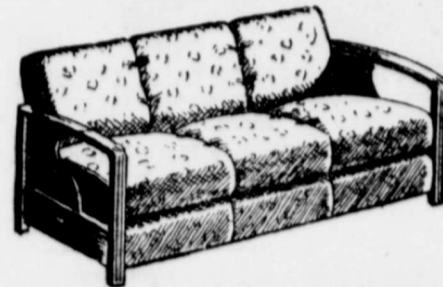

Within the last few months I have had a large number of good citizens of Coryell County, including men and women, come to me with complaints saying that many inmates of the State Training School were committing acts of violence against the peace and dignity of our county and state.

After listening to said complaints and without any intention of injuring any person or persons I have come to the conclusion that in the interest of what is right and best or all concerned that the management should at once put into practise a strict system of discipline in dealing with the inmates there. To be frank in the face of things which have recently happened I think that inmates should be given to understand two things must be done. First, they must go to work and second that they must obey orders. I think it time to discard the merit system on those who refuse to do these two things and substitute the lash. I refer to those boys who curse good men who are over them and kidnap persons and carry them off to distant parts; others who insult women who come in contact with them and others who go out and harrass good citizens.

Since I have been your representative I have never failed to take a stand on any issue which was vital to our district and state. I have asked that this be done in a friendly but firm spirit. After all, this institution belongs to all of us so I hope we will all work to the end of bettering conditions in a friendly way and see the same accomplished.

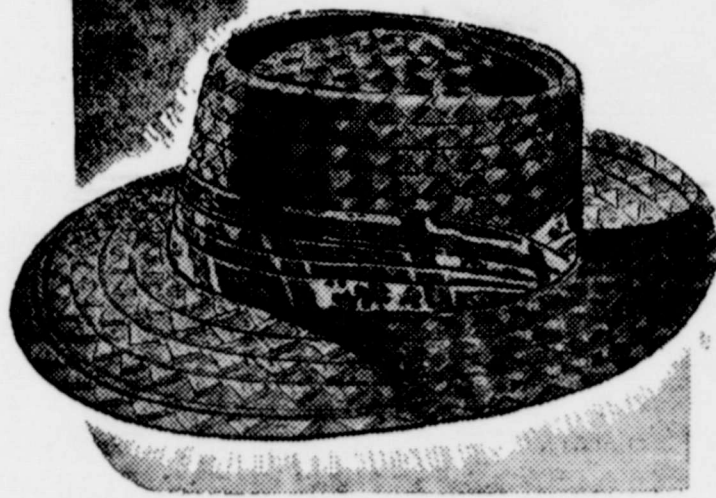

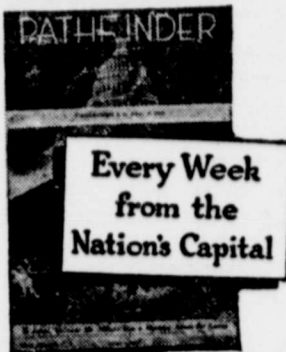

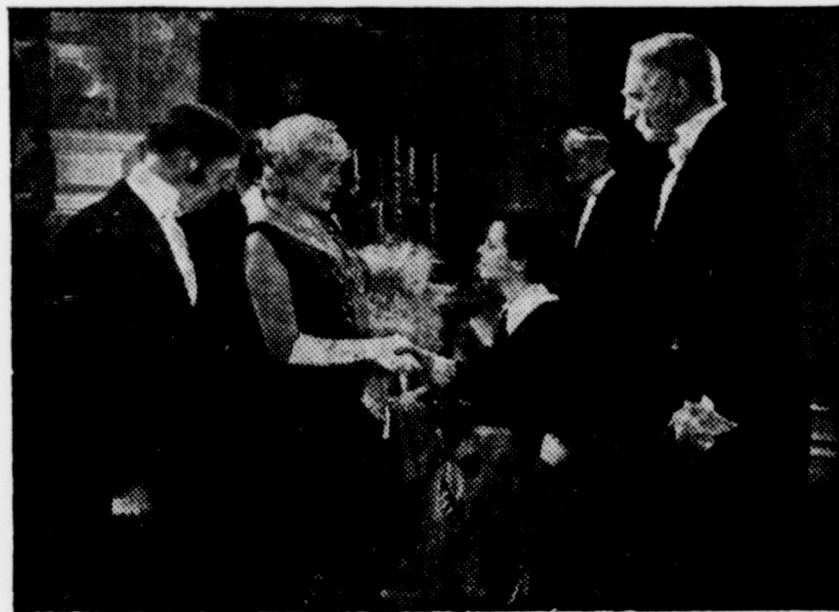

"I have 48 Rhode Island chicks and I am making a brooder house in their poultry wire pen", reported Sybil Snyder, the Purnela 4-H Club poultry demonstrator. She added, "I feed them starter mash, maize, and milk and keep clean water before them." The pen they are in protects them from predatory animals and it keeps them near their feed hoppers so that they have constant access to the chick starter. Later, in about eight weeks, she hopes to have some milk-fed fryers for choice eating.

Progress in the yard demonstration being conducted by Earlene Summerford, the Yard Demonstrator for the Purnela 4-H Club, can be easily detected now that spring is making her crepe myrtle put out its leaves. 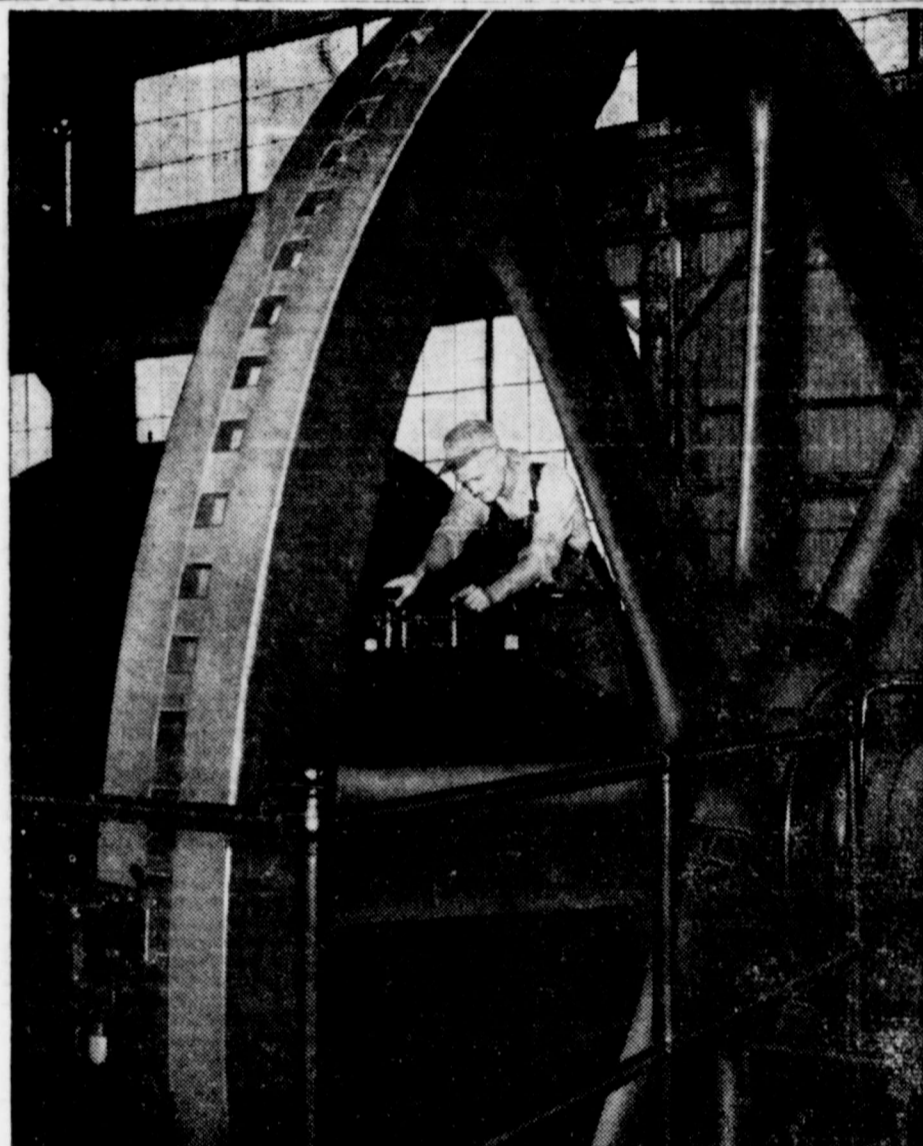

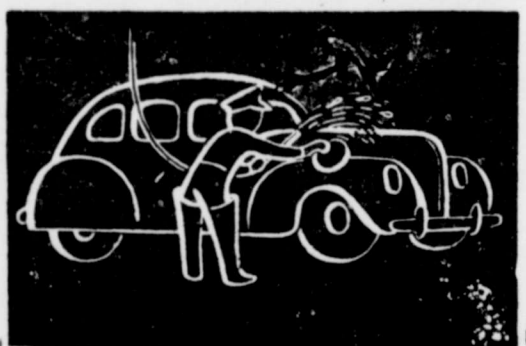

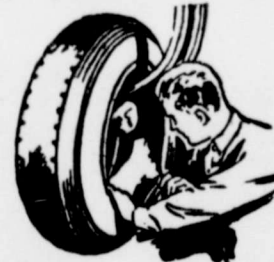
