The Supply Room

One of the most important functions of the company is the supply room. The men in charge are weighed down with responsibility. They must be on their toes all the time as the slightest error may cost a battle.

The supply staff is responsible for the clothing and maintenance of all company property. They keep innumerable records of the equipment on hand. These records are kept up to date and are regularly inspected by the officers of the corps area headquarters. These transactions include the replacement of all worn and lost clothing and shoes, requisitions for cleaning and preservation of all materials for the kitchen and the company as a whole, not to mention the care and mainetnance of all ordnance property. The men also arrange for the cleaning of the clothing of the company, each week, if possible, twice weekly.

The supply sergeant is held responsible for all weapons on hand and the recurement of materials to keep these weapons in their proper condition. He is held accountable if any equipment is lost and no account is mentioned about it.

Above all the supply sergeant must be somewhat of a diplomat. He must endeavor to placate the varied sundry desires of the men and explain, patiently why they cannot obtain the materials they are, in reality not entitled to. -V-
