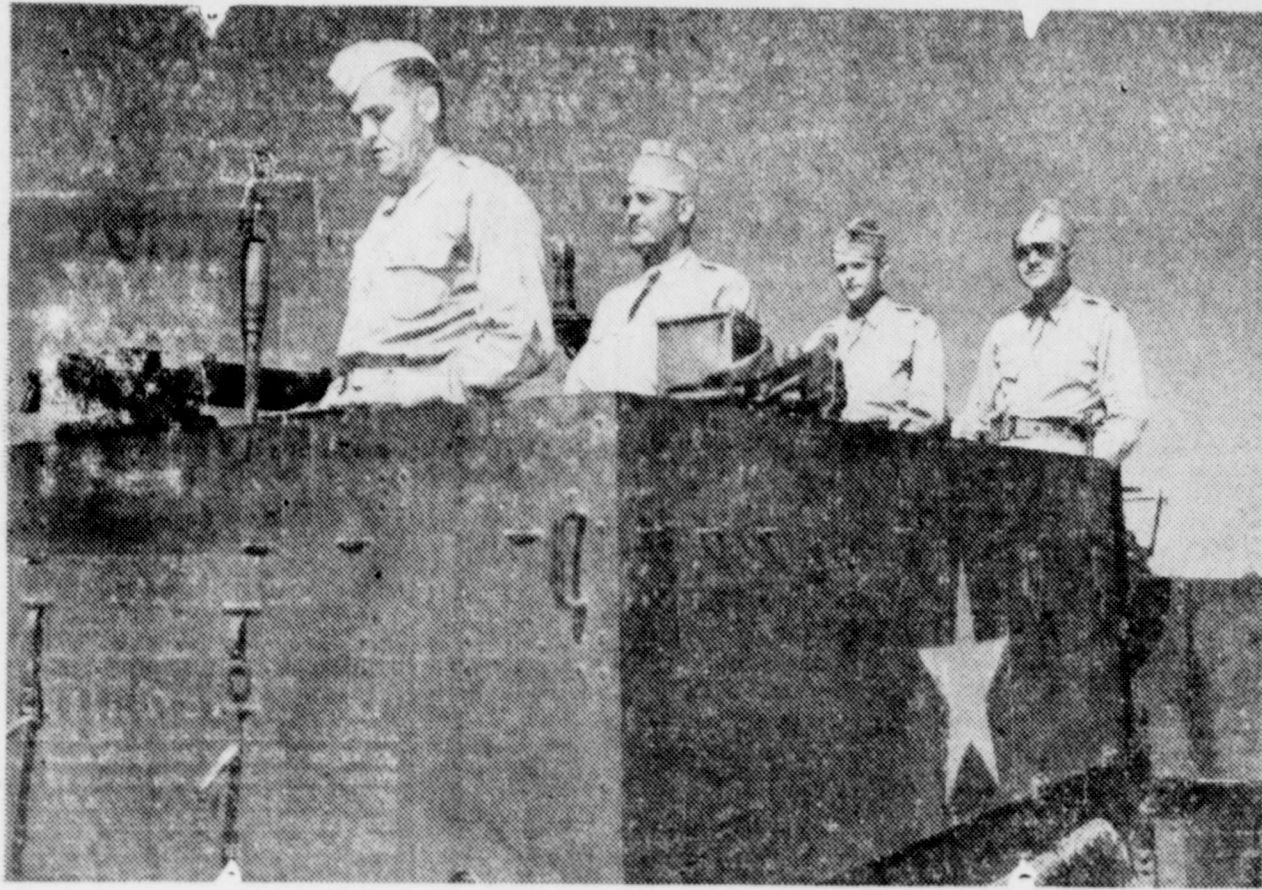

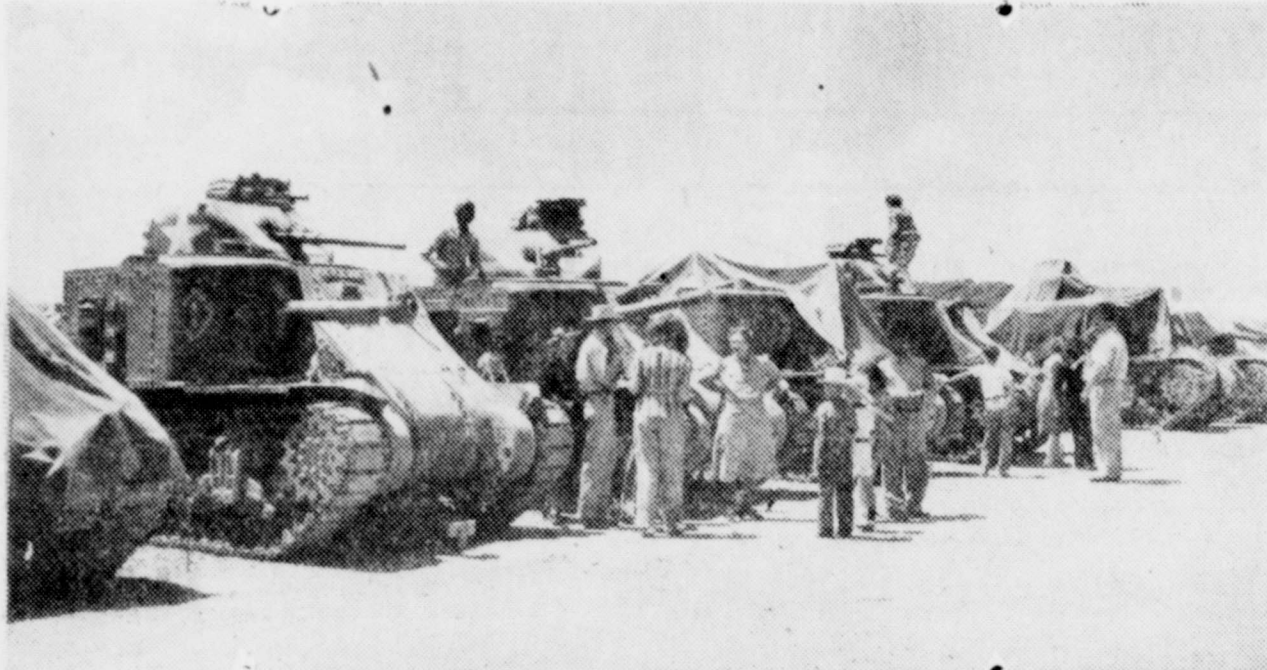

"YOU'RE GOOD NOW, YOU MUST BE SUPERB TO WIN," SAYS GEN. BRUCE



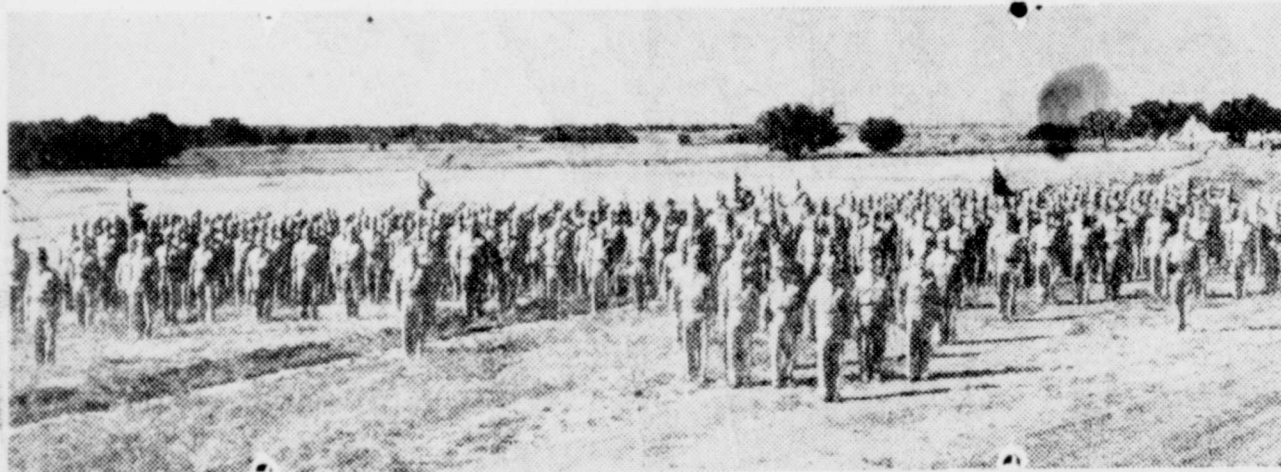

SEVASTOPOL, TOO

OPA FRUIT LIFTED

Washington, July 1 (AP)—Price Administrator Leon Henderson compelled to raise by as much as 15 percent retail prices of the 1942 pack of canned and dried fruits—the first puncture of the universal price ceiling.

20 DIE IN ARMY CRASHES

March Field, Calif. July 1. (AP)—A four-motored army bomber crashed and exploded on the top of a knoll here on Wednesday killing 9.

Welch, W. Va., July 1.—(AP)—

A southbound army transport plane lost a wing at 500 feet Wednesday, dived into a hillside garden and burned, killing at least 11.

WINNIE IN HOT SPOT

London, July 1. (AP)—The British Government told Parliament Wednesday in the first phase of a bitter parliamentary inquest on the African desert that American dive bombers, more heavy tanks and British anti-tank guns were reaching the hands of the empire's hard-pressed fighters.

It is thought Winnie will weather the storm and receive a vote of confidence, which we think he deserves.

WHEAT POOL FOR WAR VICTIMS

Washington, July 1 (AP)—The United States and four other nations have decided to create a wheat pool of the less than 100,000,000 bushels for the relief of famine in war-stricken areas, the State Department announced Wednesday night.

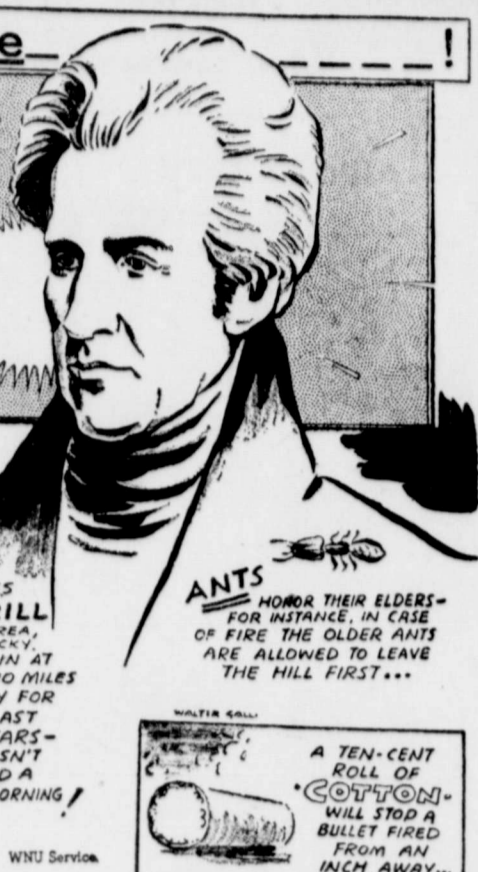

100 Years Ago in Texas

"From Florida—By the steamer Cincinnati. Captain Smith arrived on Saturday from Palatka, we learn that the expedition of Lt. G. W. Patton, to the head of the St. John, after an absence of ten days, returned to Fort Mellon on the 8th inst. The country south of Lake Harney was inundated, and it was next to impossible to ascertain the true channel. The consequence was that the canoes were frequently entangled amid intricacies which it was difficult to liberate.

Lt. Patton examined several places, on two of which he discovered fields containing sweet potatoes, lima beans, peppers, etc. which the Indians had planted during the summer. The Indians, however, had left the islands probably to join the forces of San Jones, or Halleck Tustenuggee.

"We further learn that Lt. Col. Riley arrived at Fort Pierce, and was daily expected by the land route to Ft. Mellon." (From the Weekly Texian, Jan. 26, 1842.)
