EMERGENCY CROP LOANS AVAILABLE TO FARMERS

Emergency crop loans for the production of winter wheat and other small grains are now available to farmers of Coryell county, and applications for these loans are now being received at District Clerk's office by Eric E. Brown, field supervisor, of the emergency crop and feed loan section of the Farm Credit Administration.

These loans will be made, as in the past, only to farmers whose cash requirements are small and who cannot obtain a loan from any other source, including production credit associations, banks or other private concerns or individuals.

As in former years, the money loaned will be limited to the applicant's necessary cash needs in preparing his land and seeding his 1942 grain crops.

FREE GROCERIES GIVEN TO FOOD STAMP CLIENTS

How the commodity distribution program helps Coryell county farmers as well as underprivileged families was pointed out in a report released today by Granville G. Weaver, Waco, area supervisor for the Agricultural Marketing Administration.

Over \$10,710.88 was of commodities were distributed in Coryell county from July 1, 1941 to June 30, 1942, represent additional farm markets created by the program, the report showed.

"Farm products often come to market during season in such heavy supply, prices would be ruinous to the farmers if the agricultural marketing administration did not step in and buy part of the crop," Mr. Weaver explained.

"The department of agriculture feels that commodities thus obtained could not be put to better use than in helping build health and morale among our underprivileged and undernourished families.

"Food issued to needy families in the county are purchased by AMA and turned over to the state department of public welfare for distribution."

Roy Hofheinz Principal Speaker at State School Saturday; Judges Meet

At a meeting of County and District Judges of Texas, at the Gatesville State School for Boys, Roy Hofheinz, vitrolic County Judge of Harris County "vindicated" Scoutmaster R. N. Winship, Jr., in the opening address of the meeting.

Judge Hofheinz was as generous in his praise of the work being done here by Winship as he has been bitter in his criticism of the school.

In part, he said, "the primary object of both judges and school was to do everything to rehabilitate the boys. I don't think the legislature, judges, the press, or public have done right by this institution. The school as an objective to perform that has not been offered before, but is being done now. The much ridiculed "merit system" is working in spite of the many slurs thrown, and it has a place in the sun.

He congratulated the superintendent on the work he has accomplished in one year. "The best crop that can be turned out here is the boy crop, and it will take the cooperation of judges, the school, industry and business to complete the job. I hope the time has come when the school will be free of all Texas and politics, of any variety will be removed. \$60 and keep is too little money for employees, who should be scoutmasters, boy workers and football coaches instead of guards. Talking to the boys and the superintendent he found there was one supervisor to 60 boys and should be more supervisors to fewer boys."

In closing, Judge Hofheinz said the press services should form public opinion so strong that the legislature would make the present program continuance a fact with "Scoutmaster" Winship as the school guiding genius.

CHINESE STORM JAP BASE

Chungking, China, Aug. 30 (AP).—Hard driving Chinese soldiers are storming the suburbs of Nanchang, Jap major base in Kiagsi-Province for twenty-nine months, and have recaptured the rail-river city of Lungyu in their eastward pursuit of the fleeing Japs in Chekiang Province, the Chinese reported Sunday.

REDS STORM NAZIS

Moscow, Aug. 31 (AP).—The Russian defenders of Stalingrad have hurled back German attacks and struck counterblows in some sectors, a communique said Monday, while the Red army made new gains on the Moscow front

and in a new offensive pushed back the German spearhead aimed at the Grozny oil fields in the Caucasus.

RED AIRMEN BOMB BERLIN

Moscow, Aug. 30 (AP).—Soviet airmen pounded Berlin and other cities of central and eastern Germany Saturday night starting seventeen big fires in the capital and at least 31 lesser ones, the government announced Sunday night. Other cities bombed were Danzig, Stettin and Koenigsberg.

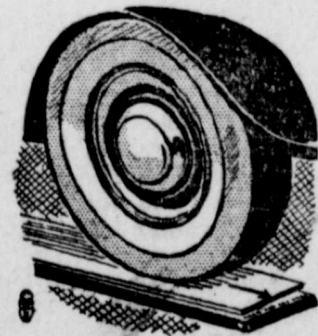

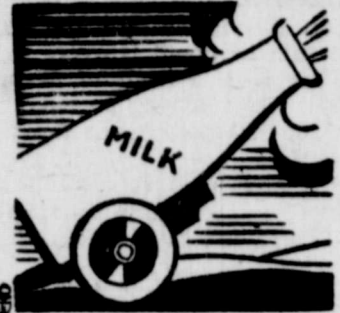


