SAM TAKES ALL OVER 5
Washington, Oct. 14 (UP).—The federal government tomorrow will begin purchasing every rubber tire in the nation in excess of 5 per automobile, P. A. Henderson announced tonight.

JAPS LAND, GUADALCANAL
Washington, Oct. 14 (UP).—A sudden turn for the worse in the Solomon islands was revealed tonight by the navy department which said Jap warships bombed the American-held airfield and shore installations on Guadalcanal and landed more reinforcements on that key island.

WILKIE-FDR PARLEY
Washington, Oct. 14 (UP).—Wendell L. Wilkie reported to President Roosevelt tonight on his round-the-world tour of war theatres and afterward reiterated his belief that a second front should be opened as soon as possible.

200 RAFERS BOMB KIEL
London, Oct. 14 (UP).—More

than 200 RAF bombers made the heaviest raid of the war on the German U-boat nest of Kiel last night, battering it for an hour until its searchlights wavered and its anti-aircraft guns all but stopped firing, the air ministry announced tonight.

7,500,000 ARMY IN '43
Washington, Oct. 14 (AP).—Army plans to build a hard-striking force of at least 7,500,000 men in 1943 were disclosed today by Secretary of War Stimson and General George C. Marshall as the "imperative" reason for lowering the draft age from 20 to 18 years immediately.

"COMMERCIAL" RENTS CONTROLLED
Washington, Oct. 14 (UP).—All rentals, whether residential or commercial, and including hotel and rooming houses, would come under government control under legislation recommended by Stabilization Director James F. Byrnes, and unanimously approved by the house banking and currency committee.

SUB BAGS JAP CRUISER
Washington, Oct. 14 (AP).—American subs operating in Jap-dominated waters of the western Pacific have sunk an enemy heavy cruiser and four other vessels and damaged 3 more, one of which probably sank, the Navy reported Wednesday.

1ST AIR BATTLE IN EGYPT
Cairo, Oct. 14 (AP).—Fighter pilots of the U. S. Army Air Forces were disclosed Wednesday to have fought and won their first major battle over the Egyptian desert as the surge of heavy aerial warfare spread from Malta in the mid-Mediterranean to the mainland battle areas of Africa.

CHILI CURBS NAZIS
Santiago, Chili, Oct. 14 (AP).—Dr. Hans Borchers, former German Consul General in New York who turned up in Chili without diplomatic or consular credentials, was reported Wednesday under police guard at the seaside resort of Aypallar, where U. S. Ambassador Claude G. Bowers usually spends his Chilean summer vacations.

Dear Friends:

On yesterday (Oct. 8th), the House passed and sent to the Senate another of those staggering appropriation bills that have become so frequent since the outbreak of the war. Approximately two-thirds of the \$6,236,956,621.00 carried in this bill is to be used to build 14,611 new and additional airplanes for the Navy. The Navy received funds for other construction including more than 2,000,000 tons of aircraft carriers, cruisers, destroyers, etc., but nothing for new battleships. I think that this is the first Naval appropriation of this magnitude that was passed by any nation in which the great bulk of the money was allocated for the air arms, and none to battleships.

While the House was appropriating money, the Senate has been considering and debating the tax program necessary to provide the money to meet these appropriations. The tax bill was passed by the House about three months ago. The Senate has materially amended the bill and will doubtless still further amend it before returning it to the House. It is impossible to know when it will be sent back to the House, but I am hopeful that it will be in time for the House Committee to study the Senate version, for the Conference Committee to agree on the compromise version which must be written, and for both Houses to adopt the Conference Report so the bill can reach the President before November 3rd. I realize that this is almost an impossibility because the bill is as large as a good sized book, and the mere physical work of printing it in its various revised forms will take weeks. On the other hand, I feel that it would be most helpful to public morale if this bill could become law before the general election. As I see it, this has become especially important because of the misinformation that has been given out by many of the Washington reporters that Congress was afraid to act on the Tax bill until after the election. I do not think any such disposition exists. It simply takes a long time to work out a tax bill of this magnitude. It always has, and it always will. I think that most Members of Congress recognize that the people want action and that they realize that taxes must be far heavier than we have ever known. I believe that it is the commentators, and not the Members of Congress this time, who are over-emphasizing the importance of the election. I realize that some of the Democratic leaders who come from doubtful states may be guilty of this attitude, but I am sure it is not the attitude of most of the Texas Delegation.

Personally, I think that heavy taxation is necessary not only to raise money, but also to prevent inflation. Heavy and intelligent

taxation will go a long way toward wiping out the exorbitant profits of industry, and at the same time it will effectively check the accumulation of a vast reservoir of new money in the hands of people who would seek to spend it for consumers' goods of which there is a shortage. If collected monthly or weekly, taxes can be a more effective break on spending power and therefore on inflation than any price control bill. If the rates are made steep enough, there will be no danger of excessive industrial profits, no matter what rate of profit is allowed. In short, I think we should use the taxing power more freely. By doing so, we could avoid the uncertainty of renegotiation of contracts and could remove one of the most powerful inflationary influences.

The question of man power for the war efforts is, however, an even more difficult problem than the problem of finances. We must all recognize that we are faced with a serious shortage of man power. This shortage is most serious on our farms. It must be reckoned with, but little definite action can be taken until the military and naval authorities determine just what size Army they want. Of course, if we are to have 13,000,000 men in the Army, we would of necessity proceed along different lines than those that would be followed if our armed forces are to be limited to 6 or 8 million. In the final analysis, the size of our Army will be determined by our ability to transport and supply it on distant fronts. There is no need to take men out of production to put them in an Army that we can place on the fighting fronts or that we can not supply if placed there.



Special services for members of denominations which have no church organization in Gatesville are still in prospect, following an invitation issued recently by the First Presbyterian Church.

Invited to use the facilities of the Presbyterian Church for their services, several churches have responded; some reporting that no church official authorized to conduct services is available at present; others, that they would conduct such services "if and when the need justifies it."

As a matter of record and help to the churches involved, members of Catholic, Jewish, and other faiths whose services or ritual is essentially different from that of the local churches who desire to have services of their church conducted locally are asked to communicate with the office of the Presbyterian Church.

Further impetus was given the City-wide Church Loyalty Crusade Sunday afternoon when officially appointed representatives of the four participating churches resolved themselves into a General Promotion Committee, and gave final endorsement to more than a dozen propositions suggested as means of achieving the objectives of the movement.

Under the direction of Rev. Lawrence Hayes, acting as temporary chairman by the request of the group, the Promotion Committee set as general plans four community-wide religious enterprises: a religious sing-song for service men, a city-wide census, a union Thanksgiving service, and a large-scale observance of Universal Bible Sunday.

More detailed plans will be worked thru the various churches, each group setting emphasis where it desires. Further announcements of a general nature will be made later.

Holding up the slogan, "All-out for God, the Church, and the Bible," the City-Wide Church Loyalty Crusade is set for November 15-December 20.

Each thinking his home town was doing the most for defense work, etc. I often told him that Geneva, New York had nothing that Gatesville, Texas didn't have.
