William Raby Oldham, 18, died in a Waco hospital early Thursday morning as a result of complications following an appendix operation. Funeral services will be held at Scotts Funeral Home Friday morning at 10:30 o'clock and will be conducted by Rev. Lawrence Hayes.

"Red", as he was known to everyone, is a 1941 graduate of Gatesville high school and for the past several months has been employed by the local War Dept. U. S. Engineers office. He was one of the most popular and best liked students as well as young business man in Gatesville. Last August he and Miss Ola Margaret Franks were married.

Survivors include his wife, his parents, one brother, Robert T. of Ft. Worth and one sister, Elizabeth Lee.

## Scrap Finals Were Estimated At The Total 264,965 lbs.

Totals for the scrap metal and rubber collection campaign by schools of Coryell county were estimated at 264,965 pounds of scrap iron. Also, there were 44,375 pounds of tin, 5,025 of rubber, 25 of copper, 1,280 aluminum and 16 of bones.

Evant school lead the county with 109,924, Gatesville 2nd, with 65,000 pounds, Copperas Cove, 3rd 18,000, Mountain and Jonesboro, tied, 4th, 12,000 each, and Oglesby, 9,500.

Estimate of the iron, means 6 medium tanks, 2 light tanks, 100-2,000 lb. aerial bombs, 5-3 inch aircraft guns, and 134-47 MM tank guns could be made of this scrap.

Rubber collected would make 30 self-sealing tanks for pursuit planes, and enough aluminum for 320 4-pound incendiary bombs.

Aluminum totals are: Coryell City 26 lbs.; New Olive 30, Levita 5, Evant 319, Gatesville, 500, Copperas Cove 300, Flat 100, New Olive collected 25 lbs. of copper and Coryell City 16 lbs of bone.

### V. R. LEE REPORTS ON COTTON GINNING TO OCTOBER 18

Cotton ginnings for this year, as compared with last year up to October 18, are 9,563 bales of cotton, to 7,867 at the same period last year.

Farmers have been notified where to go to vote and are urged to participate in these elections as the wartime agricultural conditions make it important that farmers elect committeemen who will know what to do when help is needed. The AAA districts have been increased from 7 to 13 and 3 community committeemen will be elected in each of the 13 districts.

The need for this club has existed for a long time and present plans call for the existing management committee to control and direct this new club. A staff of colored workers will be employed to direct the program and handle the details. Efforts are being made to secure a temporary building, and it is hoped appropriation may be obtained to put up a small building located in the colored section of Gatesville.

Activities of the new club will duplicate as far as possible that of the now established club. A local committee of colored people will be appointed soon as an advisory committee.

### ROMMEL FORCES FLEE

Cairo, Nov. 4 (AP).—Marshal Erwin Rommel's Axis desert forces were officially declared in full and disordered retreat Wednesday night across the sands of Western Egypt, pursued relentlessly by British Imperial ground forces and under constant attack from above by American and Allied Airmen.

### REDS HOLD ON ALL FRONTS

Moscow, Nov. 5 (AP).—The Red Army held its ground in Stalingrad and the Central Caucasus Wednesday and scored successes on the Black Sea front and northwest of Stalingrad, the Soviet midnight communique said yesterday.

### DEMS NEARLY LOSE HOUSE

(By The Associated Press)

Tuesday's Republican election landslide cut Democratic control of the House to an insecure fingerhold at best, and Wednesday night threatened many practical voting difficulties for the party of Franklin D. Roosevelt in the Senate as well.

### RURAL UNREST REVEALED

Washington, Nov. 4 (AP).—Republican triumphs in the midwestern Farm Belt, attributed in part to farmer dissatisfaction with administration measures in war food production and price control policies.

### GAINS ON GUADALCANAL

Washington, Nov. 4 (UP).—Bomber-supported American troops on Guadalcanal have made some small gains and captured about 20 Jap machine guns and 2 small artillery pieces in a continuing offensive to the west of Henderson Air Field, the Navy announced Wednesday night.

New York, Nov. 4 (UP).—Harry Hopkins special assistant to President Roosevelt, forecasting a selective service for workers—men, women and children—on the home front, today predicted the shifting of millions to war work and the employment of 6,600,000 persons now idle.

Dear Friends:

All activity in Congress is at a practical standstill until the 9th of November. The House has been in session each day, but the leaders have repeatedly stated that no controversial issues will be taken up. The reason for this is the fact that after the House passed the New Selective Service Bill making men of 18 and 19 subject to service it was expected that the Senate would act without delay. The Senate did, however, delay nearly two weeks. During that time many members of the House got tired of waiting and went home (all of the members, except those of us from the "Solid South" have campaigns in the general election). Therefore, unless the Senate finally sent the bill back with a series of amendments, which the military authorities say make it unworkable, it was impossible to get a great many of the members of the House together. The leaders did not want to attempt to pass on such far reaching amendments without having all or nearly all of the Representatives present. They, therefore, announced that no further action would be taken on this bill until November 9th, when it is expected most of the membership will be in Washington.

I think that it is unfortunate that this delay has occurred as I fear that if the new bill is not put in effect soon that there will be thousands of fathers called who should be left with their families. This was, after all, one of the most serious questions involved in the lowering of the draft age. We had the choice of drafting young men, 18 and 19, or taking older men who had children of their own. No one enjoys the duty of drafting either group, but I

felt and still feel that it is better to take the younger men who do not have so many others depending on them, then it is to call the men with children. It now seems that if we should accept all of the Senate Amendments, and, in effect make it impossible for the Army to use these younger men that we would probably wind up with the necessity of drafting both the young men and the fathers. I believe that we must give the control of the training, movement and use of our armies to our military authorities. The experience of the past has always been that political control (that is control by non-military men) reduces the effectiveness of any army and, naturally, results in greater losses to the very men who are supposed to be protected. We must all realize that we are engaged in an all-out war. We can't win it by half way measures. We can't win it without sacrifice. On the other hand the sooner we are willing to make real sacrifice the sooner we can win this war and make sure that we won't be forced to undergo the sacrifices of the conquered countries.

Wednesday (Oct. 28) I was privileged to sit in a small group and discuss the problem of inflation with the Chairman of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve Banks. I wish every citizen of the 11th District could have been present. Mr. Echols pointed out that all of our recent price controls and even our present high taxes could not prevent still higher living costs, unless we went much further and established a system of forced savings to take up the surplus spending power that many (not all) of our people have. He pointed out that there would be less civilian goods for people to buy this coming year, but there

would, even after the payment of taxes, be more money with which to buy them. Naturally, this will force prices up even though it may be bootleg markets. The remedy, he suggests, is to require people to invest this surplus buying power in government bonds, because, as he points out, the actual money cannot buy any more goods. The total supply of civilian goods is fixed. It cannot be increased. Therefore, if we have more money as a Nation, than is necessary to buy all of these goods, we should save the surplus money, rather than forcing prices up.

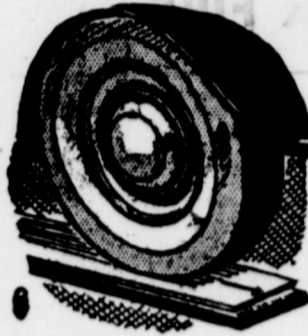
