## Rent Information From Your Local Administrator

Registration of residential rental property by landlords will begin Monday, Nov. 16 in the Killen-Temple defense-rental area, which means Gatesville, too.

This will be only for dwelling unit landlords and not hotels, or rooming houses, which will register later.

The forms, known as registration statement, will be available at the area rent office, at the City Hall, 2nd floor over the library, and not in the Chamber of Commerce office.

Each house, apartment or similar rental accommodation must be registered if it is either rented or offered for rent. Each landlord receiving one or two roomers must register such accommodations at this time. If rent is received from more than two, the person receiving such rent will register later as a rooming house operator. A person may rent a house and in turn rent rooms; if so, he registers his rental units since he is also a landlord.

Registration forms are in triplicate—one for the rent director's office, one for the landlord and one for the tenant.

When the statement is received at the rent office, it will be inspected, and if in order as to rent and charges, with respect to March 1, the carbon copies will be sent to the landlord and tenant and the original will be retained in the office.

Instruction to the tenant are in the reverse side of his copy and he is notified that unless otherwise instructed by the area rent director, he is to pay no more rent than the maximum legal rent stated in the section marked by the heavy green arrow.

In event the tenant disagrees with any of the statements in the form, he is to list his objections and return his copy of the statement to the rent office in 15 days. If the tenant does not disagree, he keeps his copy of the statement. The instructions also tell the tenant he cannot be evicted for refusing to pay more than the maximum legal rent.

The landlord is told by instructions that when the present tenant vacates, and the premises are rented to another, he must show the new tenant the registration form and have him sign it. Then in 5 days of this change in tenancy, the landlord must report the change on a form which the area rent office provides.

Besides that, there's nothing to it!

## MAJOR JOHN R. KANE EX-CORYELL CO. BOY GIVING ROMMEL 'ELL

Major John R. (Killer) Kane, as he is known in the U. S. Air Force was given a terrific blow in The Shreveport Times, recently following an American raid over the Mediterranean released by the Associated Press.



Major Kane is a nephew of Boe Wright and was born near Neff Park in Coryell county, is a cousin of John D. Wright of Moody. He was a student at Baylor University in 1926, when he was graduated, and he is a son of Rev. and Mrs. J. F. Kane, of Shreveport, pastor of the South Side Baptist Church there.

Here's the story in brief: "Major Kane, who led the planes and routed the flight, according to Edward Kennedy, veteran chief of A. P., who wrote the story in one of the four-motored heavy "Liberator" bombers which made this daylight raid, one of the biggest and most spectacular to Navarino bay, one of the enemy's main bases for supplying Rommel's army in Africa.

"It started this morning when we went to the operations room which looks like a country school-house. In place of the blackboard is a big map and before it stands Mjr. John R. "Killer" Kane who will lead our planes."

After spotting the big supply ships, "we go out again, swerve around in a big circle and in again. This time it is just what he wants. The kill is on."

"Get the hell off the air!"

"In broken English embroidered with considerable cursing a Nazi flight leader attacking the American bombers over Greece shouted that undignified command to the commander of the American Squadron, Major John Kane of Coryell County.

"The American bomber's radio was interfering with the Nazi flight leader's control of the Ger-

### AXIS TROOPS IN FRANCE

Axis troops occupied all of France, invaded Corsica off the south shore, and sped by air across the Mediterranean to land in Tunisia Wednesday and challenge U. S. and British troops lunging eastward toward that key African province.

U. S. Troops reinforced by the crack British First Army had just reached Bougie, 280 miles west of Bizerte, the Tunisian naval-air base where axis aerial reinforcements were landing.

### TWO-FRONT OFFENSE ISLAND

Washington, Nov. 11 (UP). — American forces on Guadalcanal are pushing a 2-front offensive east and west of Henderson airfield, the navy said today in a communique which also disclosed the Japs have returned to Attu Island in the Aleutians.

### JAPS ROUTED AT OIVI

Australia, Nov. 12 (AP).—Jap forces have been routed at Oivi and face entrapment while another

enemy group at Gorari has been enveloped and destroyed in battles for control of northeastern New Guinea, the high command announced today.

### FRENCH CAPITULATE

French N. Africa, Nov. 11 (AP). —Admiral Jean Darlan, former French Chief of All Defense Forces who has been negotiating secretly for days with U. S. Major Gen. Mark W. Clark, Wednesday ordered the cessation of hostilities in all North Africa.

### FRANCE, ALLIED SIDE?

Washington, Nov. 11 (AP). — Secretary of state Cordell Hull Wednesday characterized Adolf Hitler's Armistice Day invasion of unoccupied France as a move in complete harmony with Germany's fixed policy of lawlessness and utter disregard of the most solemn obligations. He hesitated to predict that it would bring France back to the Allied side.

## MASTER SERGT. ABEL BECOMES CAPTAIN ARMISTICE DAY

Twenty-seven years after he entered the service on the 24th anniversary of the Armistice of the first World War, Master Sgt. Thomas Abel of the 45th Field Artillery at Ft. Jackson will become a captain in the Corps of Military Police.

Sgt. Abel, a native of Jonesboro has already been sworn in as Captain, but before going on active duty with that status, must be discharged as an enlisted man. That day was to be November 11. Next day, he will be Captain.

Sgt. Abel, only 45, enlisted with the 6th Field Artillery when he was 17, and has served with the 7th, 8th, 16th, 28th, 76th and 45th regiments. He saw active service during the first World War with the 19th, 5th division on the St. Mihiel offensive.

On May 29, 1926 he married Miss Lenora Crouch of Waco and they have four children.

## CPL. PAUL D. BURT IS IN 56TH EVACUATION HOSPITAL JASPER, TEX

Cpl. Paul D. Burt of Gatesville, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Burt is stationed at Jasper, Texas, in the 56th Evacuation Hospital.

This hospital is a part of the famous Louisiana Maneuver area and the Medical Corps, of which Cpl. Burt is a member get actual experience in handling anything from an appendectomy to filling a tooth.

The hospital is set up exactly as it would be behind the firing line and was established to care for the maneuvering armies in the Texas-Louisiana area

Perfect to the last degree in efficiency, this Baylor unit, so called because its medical personnel was chosen from Baylor university medical school, is merely biding its time here, because its personnel of officers, doctors, nurses and enlisted men are ready for foreign duty, and is keenly alert for the time when its tents mushroom within sound ranges of the rumble of the guns against the enemy.

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## SECRETARY TO W. R. POAGE, W. ROY UPSHAW WRITES LETTER ON ILL-FEELING OF CONGRESS

On the 1st of June, 1942, I arrived in Washington to take up my duties here in the office of Mr. Poage. Prior to that time my interest in things political had only been passive. I had noted with no great concern the growing ill feeling toward Congress,—as Congress—that came through the press—that came through the press, certain radio commentators, as well as other individuals, an ill feeling that grew as we became more and more enmeshed in this war with the Totalitarian powers. The picture of Congress presented in cartoons, editorials, and magazine articles as being composed of a group of over-stuffed, confused, and weak-kneed rubes, not overly honest, blating their heads off over nothing at all and getting in the way of the progress and safety of the nation in general, had grown in my mind, as it undoubtedly has in the minds of so many other Americans. Now on the 6th of November, almost six months after my arrival in Washington, I wish to express to my home District a renewed belief in the dignity and honor of the Congress of the United States.

How indeed shall I justify such belief? Has not Congress itself given ample opportunity for the sharp rebukes and criticisms of various agencies and individuals? It is certainly not to be doubted that Congress has made mistakes and plenty of them. I have no intention of underwriting the intelligence of all Congressmen, but I tell you that as a whole Congress is composed of an able, diligent, and conscientious group of

men who in mental and moral stature are the peers of any legislature body on the earth.

However, let us not simply take my word for the above fact. Let us examine some of the chief criticisms. First, there is the charge that Congress is a "rubber stamp". It has been surprisingly overlooked that Congress was as eager as the Administration to put an end to the despair that had entered the Nation after 1929 and that its swift passage of the measures of the New Deal was not a sign of slavishness but a thorough-going cooperation for recovery. Moreover, there has been plenty of evidence of the self-assertion of Congress. Why else the attempts to "purge" the contrary members?

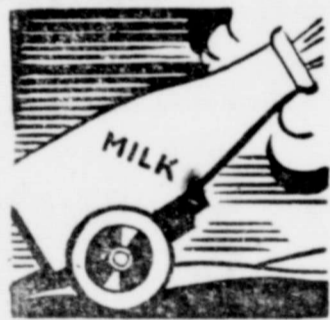
Second, there is the charge that Congress has muddled the war effort and has been lax in its passage of legislation designed to speed up the successful termination of the war. Nothing could be further from the truth. An examination of the record, measure by measure, will prove to show that Congress has passed a far greater majority of necessary war measures with a speed and despatch never before known in this country. In certain actual problems of armament it has shown deeper insight and understanding of the needs of this war than has the War or Navy Department. We can lay our thanks for a strong and growing Air Force to the Congress and not to the "Brass Hats".

Another criticism that Congress follows the will of the Nation and does not lead it is surprisingly frequent. It is not Congress' duty to follow the will of the Nation and embody this will in legislation? Congress is the steward of this nation, not its ruler.

The above mentioned criticisms can only be lightly dealt with here in this brief space. But do not misunderstand me. I do not say that Congress should not be criticized. It should be. It is our duty as citizens to express our judgment on the conduct of our public servants. But I would warn you.

Ever since this war began there has been a definite trend in this country to undermine Congress—as Congress—the machinery by which we govern ourselves. Systematic lies and distortions of headway over the Nation. And it is not true that every Nation that has lost its right to self-government has lost it in the same iden-

tical way—by the poisoning of the minds of the people into believing that the machinery by which they govern themselves is corrupt and ineffective and that the Nation must be run by self-styled experts? Can we not see that this is exactly the process by which Democracy died in every nation in which it has died. I can not say that there is a deliberate campaign of this nature in this country, because I can not prove that. But I say that the smearing and ridiculing is going on just the same and as a result the general regard that the public has for its machinery of self-government is undermined.

In closing, I wish to state again that I believe the dignity, responsibility, and honor which was vested in the Congress of the United States by the founding fathers of this nation is today upheld and justified. And Brother, when you are told that Congress is made up of a group of grafting and incompetent windbags and that the only possible alternative is to turn the government over to a few officials who know how the job should be done, stop and think! We are not fighting this war for anything like that!

What did you do Wednesday night, boys? Musta thought you were playing "to make the world safe for Democracy" like they told us Armistice 1918? And, now, we have a worse war on, this time, with a new theme song. It better be true, this time!

The stars were on Hamilton's side, and they were Carlton and Yates. If there was one on Gatesville's, it was Davis, because it did look like he was trying, and alone!

Read this write-up, play by

play, and see if you can see anything different. No one we talked to, could.

Hornets kick, ball to Slade on 25, returns to 25. Gartman drops Thompson for no gain at Lt. He stops Arbuckle after 4 yard gain on other side. Thompson kicks, blocked and he recovers, losing 3. Yates kicks to Lengfeld on 25, returns to 36 after reversing field. Whittenburg in, Copeland out. Henderson passes to Boynton for 1st D. Hornets fumble and Hamilton recovered on 50. Didn't rain either, and wasn't muddy.

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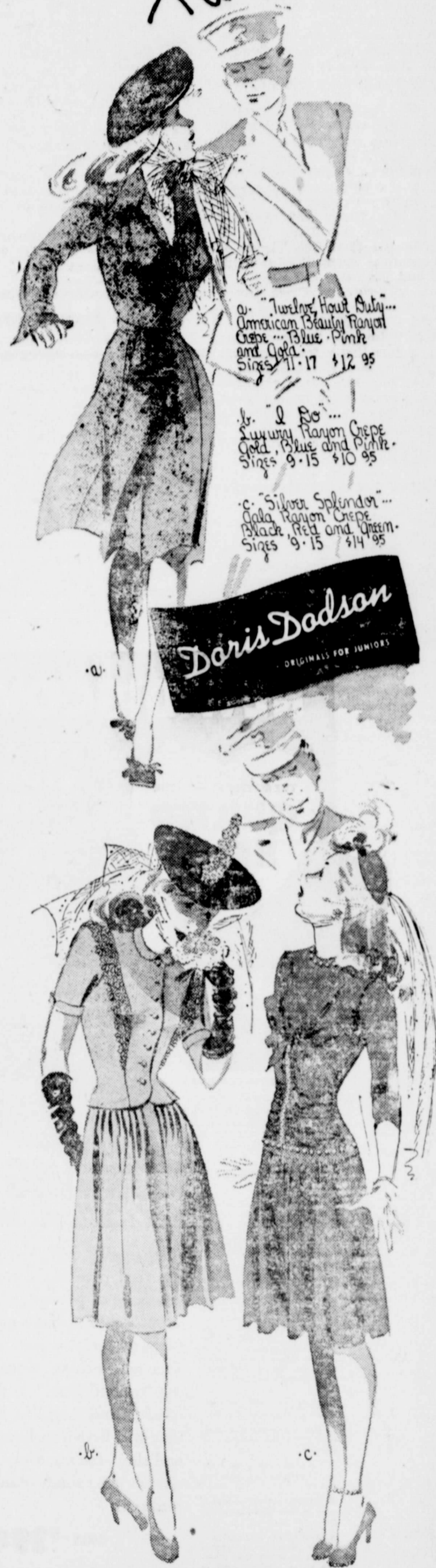

man fighters sent up to drive off the bombers and the Hun was plenty sore about the whole affair.

Henry T. Gorrell, UP correspondent who flew with the Middle East to the southwest coast of Greece, told the story of that raid.

"I rode 'the witch' over Greece today with Americans from 9 states as they blasted two axis ships and shot down two German Messerschmitts before our bullet riddled bomber sped home with three wounded crewmen aboard.

"We were to bomb Navarino in two waves in a daylight attack. It was a nice day for the long trip across the Mediterranean and the only disappointment was that a little dog named Duchess, Mascot of the Jersey Jerks, couldn't make the flight because there are no oxygen masks for dogs.

"As we approached Navarino we began to climb to the level where oxygen masks were necessary and then we put on life jackets and parachutes. I thought how simple everything was but remembered that was because these fellows were so business like and efficient. The top gunner whirled the turret and fired a practice burst. A red hot shell case clipped my ear and made me jump.

"We now were almost to the target and Jorgensen banked so he could see the ships in the harbor. They appeared like pencils thousands of feet below. The Ack-Ack began to burst around us in black puffs and the first bombers were dropping their eggs.

"A moment later we were over the target and the bombardier turned loose the bombs right on the mark. I looked down and saw one of the ships heave apart in a tremendous explosion followed by fire.

**Fighters on Their Tail**

Then the fighters started, and within a matter of seconds three fighters were diving at our tail.

That brought action from Jorgensen. Looking out a window I saw earth, sky, planes above, planes below, all mixed with Ack-Ack puffs as our pilot twisted, turned, side-slipped and performed various acrobatics to get away.

"But it was hard to shake the fighters. We were the last bomber in formation and the Jerries had glued their sights on us. Someone shouted: "There he is, for God's sake open fire." A machine gun started clicking and shell cases flew all over the place. I looked at Jorgensen and thought he was hit but it was only muscular contraction as the bullets whizzed past.

"One of the gunners shouted that he had knocked down a Messerschmitt and another got a second one. But that wasn't the end. The German pilot, attempting a suicidal collision, came straight on toward the plane. He got another burst and the Messerschmitt crumbled apart in the air.

"That got him for sure, Sir," the gunner named Frost said. Then he added: "I've been shot, sir."

The ship's sides looked like sieves. Byrne radioed to base to have medical aid ready. It was sunset but several hours of flying remained ahead. Jorgensen tried to get more speed, but the superchargers were shot away, the automatic steering devices was ruined, hydraulics damaged and an aileron knocked off and the self-sealing gas tank had been hit once, and, we had a flat tire.

"The weather turned bad and we rocked along in thunder and lightning and finally the searchlights caught us and we flashed recognition signals. Jorgensen set 'The Witch' down perfectly."
