Army Officials To Assist Centex Health Unit in County

In cooperation with the Cenrial Texas Health Unit, Army Officials are conducting a series of inspections of eating establishments in order that military personnel patronize only those meeting the highest sanitary standards. Hereto fore the Army has contented itself with publishing to its personnel the names of those restaurants which have been certified by the Central Texas Health Unit, and directing that no military personnel patronize places unless they show a certificate.

A very high percentage of the restaurants and drinking places in cities and towns adjacent to Camp Hood has been examined and failed to meet the standards set by the Texas State Health Board. Hereafter the Military Police will take positive steps to see that military personnel do not enter restaurants or cafes which fail to display approved signs of the Board.

Assistance of civic authorities has been requested to the end that all establishments clean up felt that this is a protection not only to the military personnel but to the civilian population as well. While many of the owners are encountering difficulties in securing new equipment and the parts needed to maintain their existing equipment, this does not prevent the operation of a restuarant in a sanitary manner.

The medical inspectors of the Army are cooperating with the civic health authorities in an inspection of the kitchens in an effort to improve conditions. It is felt that the cooperation of the all

While our eating places are overtaxed at present, it is felt that positive action on the part of patrons to use only approved restaurants and drinking places will do much toward helping the general average of cleanliness. It is the desire of the Army to reward those who comply.

In a bulletin, "Recommended Standards of Retail Practice" and another "Recommended Wartime-Management Policies" which are designed to assist retailers in operating under the OPA order to cut services are now available.

ARMY SANTA CLAUS ADOPTS THE JEEP-While hundreds of thousands of American soldiers will be many miles from home on Christmas Day, they will receive a full quota of Christmas presents. Already Army post offices both in the United States and all overseas areas where American forces are stationed are receiving daily huge mail shipments in the form of holiday gift packages. The soldiers' mail comes in jeeps that make the welcome round of the camps.

An indication of how the American soldier will fare this Christmas may be had by a glance at figures released by the Army Postal Service relative to the quantity of Christmas mail dispatched to American soldiers overseas. These reveal that more than 2,500,000 individual Christmas packages weighing some 13,500,000 pounds were dispatched to points outside the United States during the Christmas mailing period. In addition to this record volume of parcel post mail going overseas, there were more than 51,500,000 first class letters and Christmas cards and 15,500,000 air mail letters dispatched overseas during this year's Christmas period making a grand total of approximately 15,-000,000 pounds of holiday mail of all classes.

This is approximately three times the volume of Christmas mail dispatched to American torces overseas during the Christmas periods of 1917 and 1918 in the World War.
