"Victory Corps" Being Organized At Gatesville Hi

In an "all-out" for war program, styled as the "Victory Corps", Gatesville High School, according to suggestions from the department is offering some new courses.

There are six separate courses, depending on what the student intends to follow if Uncle Sam calls, or, if he doesn't call, what he will do if he stays at home.

General Membership Course includes a physical fitness program, b. courses useful to the Nation's War Effort, c. Participation in Wartime Activity. Under this heading is 1 Civilian Defense—as Air Warden, Fire-watcher, etc., 2. USO Volunteer Service, 3. Red Cross Service, 4. Scale Model Airplane Building, 5. Health Service, 6 Farm Aid & School home community.

Production Service. Required. 1 Physical Fitness Program, 2. Preparatory Courses leading to—a, Agriculture, b, Trades & Industry. Optional courses (one) 1 Part-time Work in Production, 2, Military Drill.

Community Service. Required. Physical Fitness Program. Optional, (two)—1 College Preparatory Courses (For Service Occupational Professional Level, Pharmacy, etc.) 2. Courses in Commercial, Distributive, Homemaking, Education, etc. 3. Part-time Employment—Paid or Voluntary. 4. Military Drill.

Land Service. Required. One Physical Fitness Program. 2 One year Math or Shop Math. Optional. (one) 1. One year Lab. Science or Shop Science. 2. Preinduction Course—Shop, etc. 3. Military Drill.

Sea Service. Required. Physical Fitness Program. 2. High School Math—Thru Plane Trig. Optional. (One) 1 year Physics or Chemistry, Lab. Science, etc. 2. Shop—Auto Mechanics, etc. 3. Elementary. 4. Military Drill.

Air Service Cadets. Required. Physical Fitness Program. 2. 1 Year High School Physics, and 3 years high school mathematics. 3. Courses in Preflight Aeronautics.

Air Service Crew. 1 Physical Fitness Program. 2. Shop Courses in Radio, Electricity, Auto Mechanics, Maintenance of Aircraft. 3. Preflight Aeronautics.

A "GLANCE" AT THE SHOE RATIONING: A "BRIEF OF 4 PAGES

You know it, but shoes were froze Feb. 7. Sales started the 9th, if you had Stamp No. 17. Stamp good for this till June 15, so don't hurry. If you "order", enclose No. 17.

"17's" transferable among members of a family in the same house and related by blood, marriage, or adoption. If you haven't War Ration Book No. 1, you can get it at the WP&RB.

Still, if you don't have "17" you can get a shoe certificate.

This, for the retailer. Save stamps and certificates, and don't give them to the wholesaler. You will be told what to do with them.

You can buy from wholesalers, but you'll owe him stamps and certificates for every pair received. You may receive any shipments that were in transit of 3 p.m. Feb. 7. Keep records of shoes received and sold after the order became effective. At any time before Feb. 12 members of any trade may deliver or ship to consumers shoes that had been ordered by them and had been wrapped, marked, or set aside for delivery before Feb. 7. Shoe retailers will be required soon to open a ration banking account and to deposit all stamps 17 and certificates collected.

Rationed. Unused shoes, boots, rubber soled shoes, work shoes, hard soled moccasins, casual, play shoes, if all or part of leather.

Unrationed. Soft and hard soled house slippers, boudior slippers, infants soft soled shoes, ballet slippers, ordinary waterproof rubber footwear, including artics, ginters, work, dress, clog and toe rubbers, and lumberman's overs. Shoe repairs are not rationed.

There are other special provisions for employers and institutions who furnish shoes. They can apply to District OPA office. Military forces may buy other than issue shoes.

JAP DESTROYER SUNK

S. Pacific, Feb. 5 (Delayed)—U. S. Planes have sunk at least two Jap destroyers and possibly five more in landing the first blows of a sparring match possibly foreshadowing one of the biggest air-sea battles yet fought in this area.

MARSHALL TELLS WHY ARMY HIKE

Washington, Feb. 10 (AP).—Chairman May, of the house military affairs committee, declared that Gen. George C. Marshall, army chief of staff, in a discussion with legislators "unquestionably" had justified the army's need for increased manpower.

REDS 22 MI. FROM KHARKOV

London, Feb. 10 (AP).—Mobil Red army forces and ski troops, eating up the miles in swift assaults on Kharkov from two directions, have stormed into Chuguyev, only 22 miles southeast of the big Ukrainian city, a special Russian Communique announced Wednesday.

DIES COM. DON'T DIE

Washington, Feb. 10 (UP).—The House Wednesday gave the Dies committee on Un-American activities a new lease on life, continuing it for two more years after a crimonious floor debate. The vote was 302 to 94.

FOOD INQUIRY ORDERED

Washington, Feb. 10 (AP).—The Senate agriculture committee ordered Wednesday an investigation into the production, transportation and distribution of food, saying in a resolution that a threatened food shortage has been aggravated by the executive department policies "directly contrary to the will of the people". DUCE DROPS VICTORY CRY

Bern, Feb. 10 (AP). Sweeping Russian victories over the axis, loss of the Italian Empire in Africa and bombing of Italy's cities are bringing increasingly into the open in the Fascist press long harbored doubts of the people

about the eventual outcome of the war.

OVERTIME PAY, NOT TO ALL.—Washington, Feb. 10 (AP).—Many of those effected by President Roosevelt's 48 hour week order will not necessarily get time and a half for the extra work it was indicated Wednesday.

GHANDI WON'T EAT

Bombay, Feb. 10 (AP).—With India apprehensively alert, Mohandas K. Ghandi started a 21 day hunger strike today—to subsist on citrus fruit juice mixed with water but not to "fast unto death" as he threatened on previous abstentions—in protest against his confinement behind barbed wire in the palace of the Aga Khan at Poona. That bird certainly has missed many squares but not "triangles".

Washington, Feb. 10 (AP).—Attorney General Biddle announced today the indictment of nine persons charging bribery, false claims and fraud conspiracy involving an estimated \$1,418,817 in alleged overpayments on army and navy munitions contracts with Triumph Explosives, Inc., at Elkton, Md. 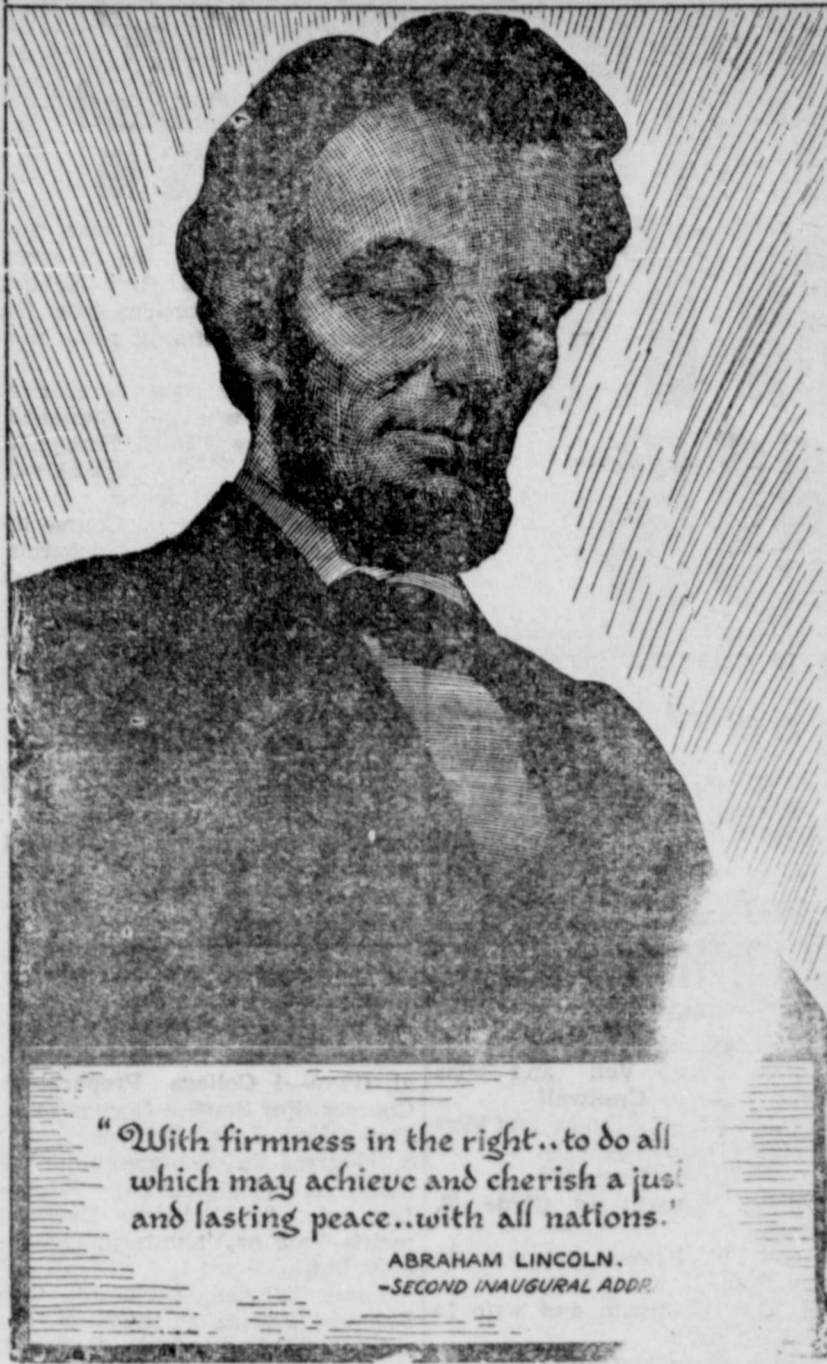

A single sheet, form CWN-3 may be obtained from the owner's nearest District Office of Defense Transportation. All vehicles idle the last 14 days of Jan. must be reported within 5 days after the last day of the month. Operators with no idle vehicles need not report.
