Lt. Tyler's car was a 2-door Pontiac, with a Michigan license, maroon color, with a tan top.

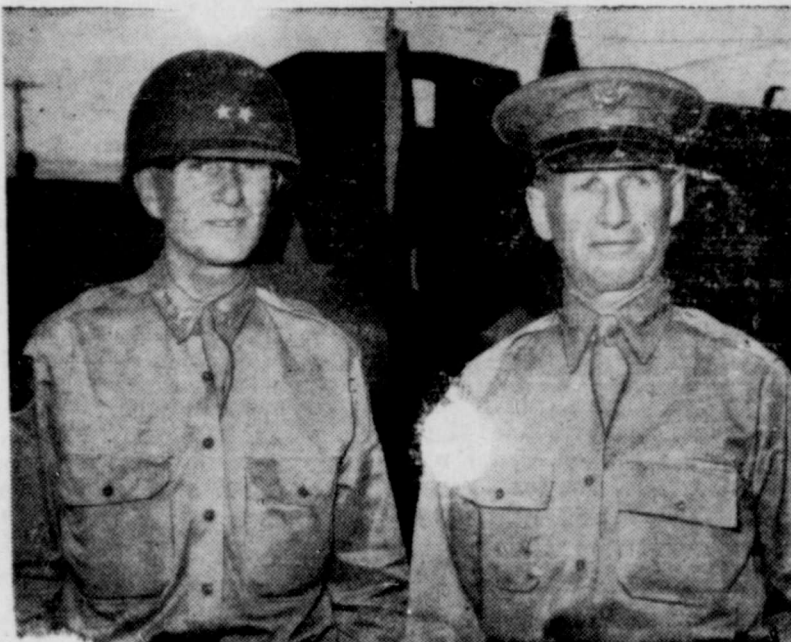

A SUMMARY OF WORLD, NATIONAL AND STATE NEWS

## 16 SHIPS KO'D, SOLOMONS

Washington, June 6 (AP).—Raiding Jap shipping off enemy held Bougainville Island in the Solomons, American fliers beat off heavy fighter plane opposition, sank destroyer and left a cargo ship and corvette blazing in the sea.

## SHIPS COLLIDE, 83 LOST

Norfolk, Va. June 6 (AP).—Two American cargo ships, a tanker and ammunition-laden freighter, collided off the U. S. East Coast before dawn on June 1, it was announced Sunday, causing terrific explosions and blazing oil slicks that took the lives of 83 of the 150 men aboard.

## BRITISH SUBS SINK SIX

London, June 6 (AP).—British subs prowling in the shadows of Monte Carlo and in or near Italian ports on the mainland, Corsica and Sardinia, have sunk 6 enemy ships, severely damaged another and probably torpedoed an eighth the Admiralty announced Sunday night.

## FLYING FORTRESSES BLAST FLEET, BASES

N. Africa, June 6 (AP).—Spearheaded by the largest formations of Flying Fortresses ever sent from Africa, Allied air and naval forces struck new and damaging blows Saturday at Pantelleria, Sardinia and Sicily and loosed a cascade of battleship-busting

bombs on Benito Mussolini's anti-invasion fleet in its hideaway harbor at La Spezia, headquarters announced Sunday.

## 666 IN ATLANTIC

(By The Associated Press)  
The sinking of 2 merchant vessels by Axis subs in the Caribbean area, disclosed last week, raised to 666 the Associated Press total of announced western Atlantic Allied and neutral merchant losses since Pearl Harbor. Both ships were torpedoed and sunk early in May.

## TRINITY ON BOOM

(By The Associated Press)  
Torrential rains brought flood and crop damage to parts of east Texas Saturday night and Sunday, which south central Texas reported heavy rain on a less destructive scale. A flood warning for Trinity river's ramvaging East Fork as far south as Trinidad indicated flood conditions south of Dallas would be severe.

## ANTI-COMMUNISTS RULE IN ARGENTINE

Buenos Aires, June 6 (AP).—The new Argentine government of Gen. Arturo Rawson, under close scrutiny of Pan-American diplomats for clues as to its policies, showed an anti-communist character today by issuing a special order to police to suppress any communist statement, and by closing the communist newspaper

La Hora.

## REDS GET 752 NAZI PLANES

London, June 7 (AP).—Soviet pilots and gunners smashed 752 German planes from May 30 thru June 5, a week of violent and massive air raids, Moscow reported early today, to make a 5 week toll of 2821 nazi aircraft destroyed in the air and on the ground in Russia.

## OPERATORS DIVIDED ON DEMANDS

Washington, June 6 (AP).—With the nation's 500,000 striking coal miners returning to work tomorrow, qualified observers reported today that sharply divided views among he soft coal operators may send the miner's pay demands back to the war labor board this week.

## CHINKS CUT JAP RETREAT

Chungking, June 6 (AP).—Counterattacking Chinese troops have cut off the retreat of several Jap units in the Yangtze river front of central China and are intensifying their mopping-up operations, the Chinese high command announced tonight.

## AIRMEN GET OVER

London, June 7 (AP).—Another large contingent of American airmen arrived recently at a British port, trained and ready to join the great allied air offensive to soften up Europe for an invasion, it was announced today.

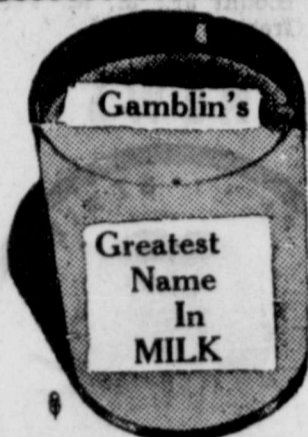

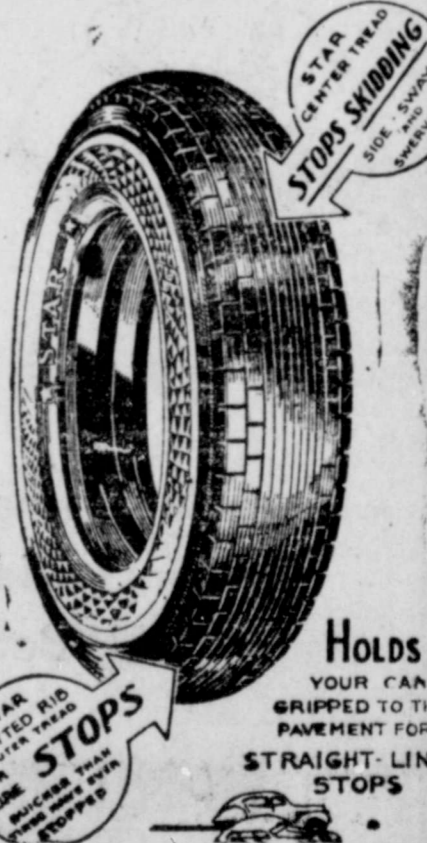
