Jap Counterattacks Driven Back On Iwo

UNDATED, PACIFIC. (AP).—Japaneses counterattacks were driven back by the U. S. Marines on Iwo Jima, according to an announcement by Admiral Chester Nimitz, today.

The Third Marine Division was thrown into the conflict, when American forces began their offensive in the fog for the last airstrip.

Limited gains were reported at a cost of 6,000 American casualties.

Troops Trying To Oust Japs From Hotel

American troops fought room for room for the Manila Hotel, according to General Douglas MacArthur, and reports that there were 1700 enemy dead on Corregidor, and untold numbers entombed.

Bataan has been combed, and no live Japs found.

Allies Hit Western Naziland 3rd Duisburg

LONDON, February 22 (AP).—Allied Bombers hit Western Germany today in the air offensive, London announced.

Duisburg in the path of the American Third Army was also hit, and is now only 60 miles away.

Third Army Crosses Saar

PARIS, February 22 (AP).—The American Third Army also crossed the Saar river and cleared part of Saarburg, within five miles of Trier, a key German defense town.

The Seventh Army captured half of Forback and following a two mile advance the Canadian army pounded 2,000 yards into Calcar.

Russians Gained Near Berlin Danzig

LONDON, February 22, (AP).—The Russians today gained in the Guben Sector and another Red army neared the Spree defenses of Berlin.

Near the Polish Corridor, Russian forces advanced to within 33 miles of Danzig but gave ground around Koenigsberg.

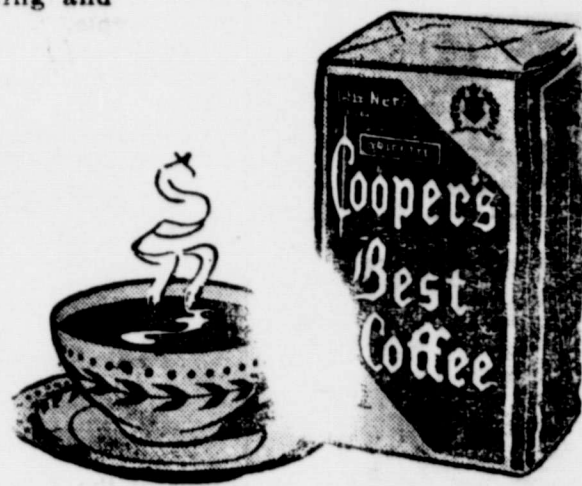

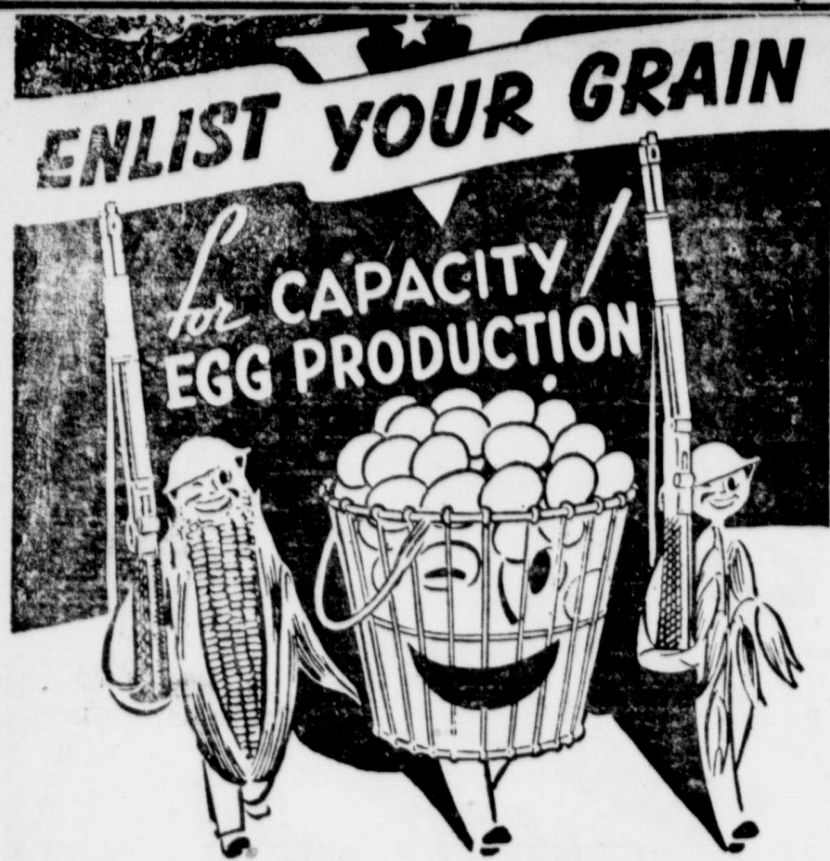

The award was for meritorious achievement during bombing attacks on Nazi war industries and military targets in cooperation with Allied ground forces

He is the son of Mr and Mrs C R Byrom of 808 Waco St., and had been attending the University of Texas before entering the AAF in November 1942.

S-Sgt Jesse H Lockwood of Leon Junction is returning home on furlough from the Fifth Army front in Italy.

Lockwood, a motor sergeant now in his 31st month overseas is a member of the 53rd Signal Battalion under II Army Corps. He served before Cassino, in the drive from the Garigliano River to Rome and participated in the breakthrough of the German Gothic Line

He has five campaign stars on his European Theatre Ribbon, and

wears five overseas stripes. His wife, Mrs Katherine V Lockwood, lives at Leon Junction.

Cpl Paul D Burt, carpenter, is with the 56th Evacuation Hospital Fifth Army on the Italian Front, and stationed at times within range of German guns, they have served in support of the Italian Campaign since September, 1943, when the continent of Europe was invaded. for the first time until the current fencing for approaches into the Po Valley.

They were at Casablanca, French Morocco, Bizerte, Tunis, Paestum, Cassino, Anzio. HOW TO CLEAN LAMP SHADES

Parchment paper shades should be dusted with a clean cloth. Silk shades with fancy trimming such as applique ornaments, and shades of shrinkable material should be dry cleaned. Plain silk or rayon shades can often (but not always) be washed successfully provided they are stitched to frame and not glued. To wash, first remove all surface

dirt with soft brush; then hold by wire frame at top and dip up and down repeatedly in lukewarm suds made from mild soap flakes. Rinse through three or four lukewarm rinses using the up and down dipping motion. Dry very fast, hanging in shade outdoors in warm, breezy weather, or suspending over radiator or stove, using fan to accelerate drying, in inclement weather.

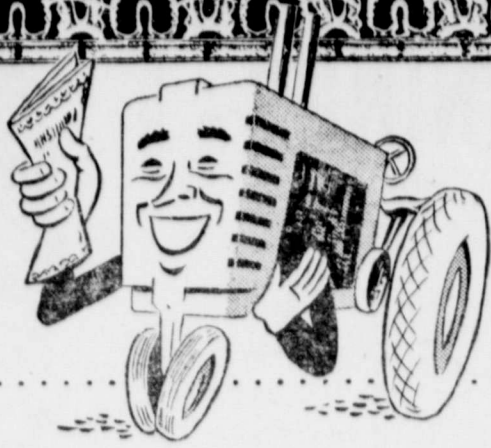
