

2. OVERSEAS CREDIT-One point each month overseas since September 16, 1940:

3. COMBAT CREDIT—5 points for each award of combat decorations since September 16, 1940.

4. PARENTHOOD CREDIT 12 points for each child under 18 up to the limit of three children.

Their absence has left a gap in our ranks that has been impossible to fill because there simply aren't enough men with the necessary experience and electrical know-how available. Those who remain behind, however, are do-

ing their best to maintain service at a high standard, in spite of the fact that in many cases one man must now handle the work formerly done by two.

Until we can welcome our fighting men back, our manpower shortage will probably remain acute. So, if occasionally, it takes a little more time than in the past to answer service calls, build new lines or repair storm damage, we know you will understand and make allowances. It's because the men we need to help speed the work are away helping to speed final victory.



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
