**COUNTY'S WASTE PAPER SHOULD BE INTO "SUITS OF ARMOR"**

Residents of Coryell county can supply enough waste paper for 101,130 "suits of armor" for 105 mm. shells, if they will buckle down and save an average of 10 pounds of newspapers, wrapping paper and boxes a month. The 105's are the big ones that have been helping American forces in their advance toward Berlin and Tokyo.

Last year Americans saved 106½ pounds of paper per capita, or enough for about 35 containers each for the 105 mm. shells.

For each ammunition container or "paper suit of armor" used to protect the shells from salt water, dents, nicks and corrosive dirt, approximately three pounds of waste paper are required, according to W. J. Wardell, vice president of the American Can Company, which is manufacturing millions of the containers. Am-

munition container board, one of the principal materials used in making the "suits of armor," is made from mixed paper and old corrugated boxes Mr. Wardell said. Another material used is called "tube and can stock," which is made from all types of waste paper.

**500 Superforts Hit Nakoya Today**

GUAM, May 14, (AP).—An unprecedented flight of 500 super forts poured more than 3500 tons of new type incendiary bombs (fired) on Nakoya today.

**Marines Drive Into Haha, Okinawa**

GUAM, May 14, (AP).—And, led by flame-throwing tanks, the American Marines drove into the northern outskirts of Naha, capital and primary port of Okinawa. They were slowed by the heavily mined Treety, a river running thru the city and also intensified artillery, as the Japanese threw in fresh reserves.

Other Tenth Army units, edging toward the China coast occupied Tori Shima, on the Chinese coast and the Chinese entered the port of Foochow, the second time since the Japanese occupation in 1939.

**Eisenhower Don't Like Frateenizing**

PARIS, May 14, (AP).—General Dwight D. Eisenhower said today he regrets instances in which senior officers treated captured Nazi and high German officials on a "friendly enemy" basis in direct violations of his orders.

**Russians Overrun Czech Nazi Resistance**

LONDON, May 14, (AP).—The last small pockets of German resistance in Czechoslovakia, and Austria are being overrun by the Russians today as the Moscow radio announced the rounding up of 36,000 Nazi troops the last 24 hours.

Saturday afternoon, state boy got out, and is still that way (yesterday a. m.)

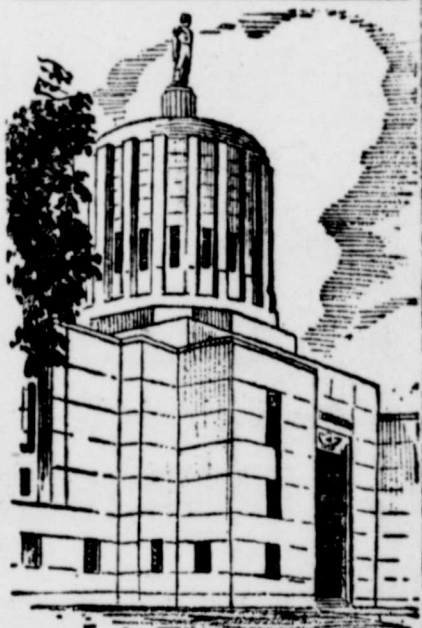
The City picked up a couple of ladies and turned them over to county authorities.

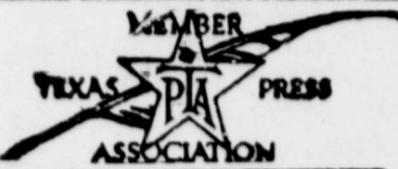

## WITH THE COLORS



Capt. Wayland G. Holt, 29, husband of Mrs. Margaret Holt, Gatesville has returned from service overseas in Europe and is being processed thru the Miami, Fla., redistribution station. He is holder of the Purple Heart for wounds received in combat against the enemy, European-African-Middle-East campaign ribbon with three battle stars and the Combat Infan-

tryman badge. He became a member of the Armed Forces, November 18, 1940.

S/Sgt William T. Lack, 28, has just been promoted to Staff Sergeant. He holds campaign ribbons for Normandy, Northern France and Germany. He is a mess sergeant and his wife is Mrs. Juanita Lack. He is with the 83rd (Thunderbolt) Division.

826th Convalescent Center, England. Now fully recovered from wounds received on 19th of December, during action in France, Pvt. Clinton Wallace, 36 Turnersville, has been released from this convalescent center in England, and will return to active duty. He entered the Army, in April '43.

8th Army Group, Germany—Among the veteran doughboys of the 142nd Infantry Regiment experiencing some of their hardest combat in more than 350 days of battle are Cpl. Burrell B. Roitch, of Copperas Cove and Pfc. Rinalda C. Williams and Allen S. Griffith of Rt. 3 and 2, Gatesville. They recently broke thru the Moder Line at Oberhofen, captured Wissembourg, and alashed their way thru the strong Siegfried Line defense. They celebrated their ard anniversary by boosting their total of Germans captured to 10,000.

They started at Salerno, took Mount Maggiore and Mt. Castellone, stopped 1,000 Germans with 400 men, and played a key part in the Velletri battle, opening the gates to Rome. Continuing on the beaches of Southern France they sped north and smashed back remnants of the German 19th Army trying to break out at Montelimar, then, passed thru Lyons and captured Remiremonts, historic Koenigsburg Castle, St., Marie Pass and Scostat.

S/Sgt Knox B. Trammel of the Infantry, is returning from 6 months in the European Theatre. He was scheduled to arrive at Ft. Sam Houston about May 2, and will his relatives here on Pidcoke Star Route.

A 9th AAF Engineer Bn., France—T/5 Earl W. (Fish) Wilkinson of Pidcoke has been with his buddies, awarded the Presidential Distinguished Unit Citation for constructing an emergency landing strip while under fire on D-Day.

An advanced landing field in the Normandy beachhead. Landing at Plus 3 hours on D. Day, advanced elements found the area of the site was still partially occupied, but they proceeded in spite of obstacles and dangers, working under enemy fire.

At one part, the equipment was within 200 yards of active enemy artiller emplacements. The strip was finished by sundown on D-Day.

T/S Wilkinson's parents are Mr. and Mrs. G. D. Wilkinson of Copperas Cove.

Here's a part of a letter from Sgt. Z. I. Fore, that's (Red)

... Things are moving fast here and I'm staying awfully busy. I'm working with one of our Infantry Divisions now, on a liaison and reconnaissance job. Hit a hot spot yesterday and had a good battle for about two hours—all my own. The liaison captain and myself was going on a reconnaissance with the doughboys so we took off in a sidewood by ourselves. The Jerries were trying to bust thru right where the Captain and I were, so we hid in a ditch and behind a hay stack and got the drop on them as they came by. They came by in one, twos and threes. They didn't want to give up my tommy gun convinced them a little. One guy pulled a pistol on us and that was stupid of him and me with a tommy gun ready. A civilian Diago tole me that there were three Germans in a house so I raked the roof with my tommy gun and they took off to fast to catch. A bunch of them located us and they sent tanks o the house. They ran around it, finishing it and throwing grenades in doors and windows and set the place afire. We took off with what we had without a scratch.

We ended up with 11 prisoners, a supply wagon and motorcycle, several military bicycles, 3 machine guns, pistols, rifles, hand grenades and ammo. That's the tightest spot I've been in in days. I got myself a German compass, camera and field glasses. A snip-

er gave me his Iron Cross he earned in '39. So he Captain and myself had a big day. We went to Bologna with the Infantry and the town wasn't hurt too bad. I've been going night and day, so I'll write whenever I can. Mat might like to read this. Tell everyone "hello" for me.

Yes, we were certainly glad to read this, just so Zack came out. O. K. Zack always takes care of himself and we know he'll take care of any Jerries that come his way. Glad it's over for Zack, and he'll probably have enough points to be a "civvie" again—that is if he wants to, and it's pretty certain mos of the boys will.

Here's one from our Aleutian Correspondent, in civilian life, "The Rt. Honorable Glenn Hendrickson," who we went to the Beaumont State Democratic Convention with, and he's now Sgt. Andrew G. Hendrickson. Glenn says:

"Dear Mat: Received your V-Mailer today. It was real newsy. It gave all the information from Brown's crossing to Jonesboro, telling all about fishing and that reminds me, I am enclosing a picture of me and my

catch. You know pictures don't lie. I was 28 minutes catching these fish. For bait, I used Spam (they will bite anything that you cannot eat) there is easy 200 pounds of them. Had to bring them in a Jeep and it was in 2nd gear. I didn't know but I guess my old friend Oliver Tatum has had better luck than me, but he has been fishing more years than I have. I use 6 hooks on a line, used 2 lines and 4 boys were taking them off. Could have caught more, but the boys began to complaining about me using all the Spam, and they wouldn't have enough for supper. That large fish, the one on top on the left hand side, he gave me a lot of trouble but I won't go into that. It would take too long. Some day, when I have time and if you want to hear it, I will tell you the complete story, remind me, will you.

I see Horace Jackson is Mayor, John Gilmer is president of the Chamber of Commerce, and my old friend, Reid Powell is on the school board. All good friends of mine. 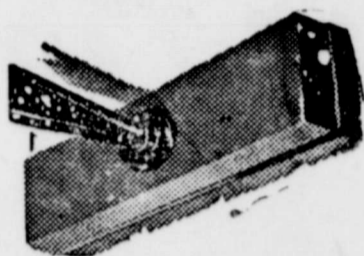

No wonder the army originated (or did they) that ETO business. Maybe the Jap front will be the ATO, (Asistic Theatre of Operations, and maybe that would help unravel that mess they've got the east-west fronts in. Kipling said something along this line (you literati correct me) "East, and West is West, and never shall the twain meet." And if that straightens us out, then, all well and good.

We're getting all set for the big 7th War Loan Drive, and you can put it in your duty bag that it'll be over before the drive time is here.

Our quota this time, is \$910,000.00, and the "E"'s will take up only \$335,000 of this amount—that's for us little guys—of course, the big shots will take care of the others.

Now, Coryell's always put over these bond drives, and we've urged, urged and urged, them, with this much buying power to get something named for Coryell County. Ain't had any luck! We don't even have a rowboat named for us.

Bosque county does, McLennan county does, Killeen does, but Coryell—NO! We've done just about all we can do about it, but raise old billy, and we are continuing until, if ever, something along this line happens. We don't mind the bond buying, not one whit, but we would like a little recognition.

Here's the "point system" as announced by The Associated Press thru the News, Tuesday. Hope YOU'VE got enough, and don't get hung in the red tap. Or, we might say, be too necessary.

1. SERVICE CREDIT—One point for each month of army service since September 16, 1940 (more than 15 days be counted as full month.)

2. OVERSEAS CREDIT—One point each month overseas since September 16, 1940.

3. COMBAT CREDIT—5 points for each award of combat decorations since September 16, 1940.

4. PARENTHOOD CREDIT—12 points for each child under 18 up to the limit of three children.

Separate cric scores for each of services will be established in about 6 weeks.

Yes, there was even mud, dust, and stinking pens. All the American circus, which all of you have liked to see so well.
