### New C. Of C. Secretary Is Named Here

Frank C. Higginbotham of Temple has been named manager and director of the Gatesville Chamber of Commerce on a part time basis, according to President John Gilmer of the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Higginbotham has been manager of the Temple Chamber of Commerce for more than three years and during this time, Temple has undergone the greatest expansion program of any period of its history.

Mr. Higginbotham will devote several days each week to the planning of the post war economy for Gatesville and will assume his duties June 15.

Prior to his work at Temple, he was Executive Director of the Oklahoma League of Municipalities for ten years with offices at the University of Oklahoma at Norman, and Oklahoma City. During this time he received an appointment from the President of the United States to membership on the Advisory Board of the Public Works Administration of Oklahoma under the National Recovery Act.

He also received an appointment as a representative of the Municipal Governments of the U. S., to the World's Conference of Municipal Officials at Lyon, France in 1934, at which time he made a special study of community problems in three countries in Europe.

He has served seven years as a City Manager and is now an affiliate member of the International City Managers Association of the U. S. and Canada.

Mr. Higginbotham is also trained in the agricultural field and served several years with the Extension Services of the A & M colleges of Texas and Oklahoma.

He has a wide acquaintance in Central Texas, having been reared in Lampasas and Bell counties and has property interests in this section. He is a member of the American Legion, and is a 32nd degree Mason.

### VARGA GIRLS GIVEN CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS OKEH

Washington, June 4. (AP)—Esquire magazine and its lightly-attired Varga girls won a thumping victory over the post office department today when the United States circuit court of appeals told the department to stop trying "to determine what is good for the public."

Postmaster General Frank C. Walker's suspension of Esquire's second class mailing privilege was ruled illegal and unconstitutional. The opinion written by Justice Thurman Arnold, former Justice department trust-buster, suggested that the post office stick to carrying the mails.

It expressed the "hope that this is the last time that a government agency will attempt to compel the acceptance of its literary or moral standards relating to material admittedly not obscene."

Walker did not find the magazine obscene but took the position that to enjoy low-cost second class mail rights a magazine "is bound to do more than refrain from disseminating material which is obscene or bordering on the obscene. It is under a positive duty to contribute to the public good and the public welfare."

#### 450 Auperforts Blast Osaka

GUAM, June 7. (AP).—450 Superforts today blasted war industries, and arsenals in Osaka, the Orient's leading industrial city with high explosives, incendiaries in the tenth large scale raid on Japan within a month.

#### No Secret Agreements At Yalta

LONDON, June 7. (AP).—Prime Minister Winston Churchill told the House of Commons today the Big Three made no secret agreement at Yalta not already made public.

He said: "There were no secret engagements entered into at all," except agreement to give Russia three votes at San Francisco.

#### 38th Battles Desperate Enemy

MANILA, June 7. (AP).—The 38th Division dough-boys battled a desperate enemy throughout Marikima Hill Mass, east of Manila, Wednesday.

#### Jap Army Says, National Hari Kari

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7. (AP).—The Army has called on Japanese to commit National Hari Kari in defense of the Empire against the Americans, Radio Tokyo reported today.

In a 20 page "People's Handbook for Resistance Combat," "100 million people" of the home islands are exhorted to "because special (suicide) attackers," in event of American landings, the broadcast said.

#### GRAND JURY "COMES IN" WITH 10 FELONIES

Crime was hard to find, according to the June term of the grand jury.

Only 10 felonies were returned on, and the surprising thing, only 23 witnesses were examined, which didn't make it very profitable for the riding bailiffs, and easy on the door bailiff.

The grand jury, foremaned by J. L. Gault, and secretaried by W. T. Caruth, reported that precinct and county officers had done a good job, and the decrease in population had helped, somewhat, the situation. They closed by thanking officials and others who assisted them in their three days of labor.

**GETS BRONZE STAR, ETC.**

"S/Sgt. Carl W. Schoenewolf, Co., C. 774th Tank Battalion, for distinguishing himself by meritorious service in connection with military operations against an enemy from 4 Dec. '44 to 28 Dec. '44 in Western Germany. He displayed exceptional courage under fire as a tank commander during this period which materially contributed to the success of the operations.

"On one occasion, when his company was cut off from their own lines by heavy enemy artillery and antitank weapons, and was undergoing a strong counter-attack, S/Sgt. Schoenewolf was credited with repulsing the Germans on his flank and inflicting heavy casualties. An other time when his tank sustained a direct hit, knocking it out of action, he made his way under fire to another tank and continued to engage the enemy. His disregard for his own personal safety, outstanding courage in the face of enemy fire and deep devotion to duty deserves the highest praise and is in keeping with the finest traditions of the armed forces."

"He entered service from Coryell county in 1941 and has been overseas since July, '44. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Martin Schoenewolf of Pearl Star Rt., and his wife is the former Miss Elfrieda Apel. She and son are living with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Apel. He also has the Purple Heart and an Oak Leaf Cluster.

**GETS MERITORIOUS INSIGNIA**  
For outstanding service and devotion to duty when a tornado struck Antlers, Okla., April 12, 1945, S/Sgt. Cleburne P. McCarver, 1882nd Service Unit, Regional Hospital is entitled to wear the Meritorious Service Unit Insignia.

This unit, of the Regional Hospital, Camp Maxey, has been awarded the Meritorious Service Unit Plaque for "superior performance of arduous duties" resulting from a tornado at Antlers, Okla., according to an announcement made by Colonel Albert Bowen, Commanding Officer, Regional Hospital.

Text of the citation is: "The 1882nd SI, Regional Hospital, Camp Maxey Texas, is cited for superior performance of arduous duties in the care of injured persons resulting from a tornado at Antlers, Okla., 12 April 1945. The devotion to duty displayed by the hospital personnel and the numerous patients who volunteered their services, while coping with a serious situation created by this disaster adds another achievement to the long list already attained by the Medical Department in war and peace."

Medics from Regional Hospital were among the first to arrive at Antlers. The tornado occurred at 6:00 p. m., killing more than 83 persons, injuring hundreds more and destroying more than 300 homes and buildings while damaging 200 more and by 8 p. m., scores of doctors and first aid men from Regional Hospital and other camp personnel had arrived there. Two first aid stations were established and more than a dozen ambulances were kept sutling between Antlers and Maxey. All during the night the first aid men and service unit members brought persons from the wreckage of buildings, homes and open areas to the first aid stations. First aid was administered, and the more seriously injured were taken to the hospital.

Members of the medical detachment are now entitled to wear the Meritorious Service Insignia which is a sleeve device constructed of a two inch square of olive-drab cloth on which appears a golden yellow laurel wreath one and 5-8 inches in diameter. It will be worn centered on the outside sleeve of the service coat and shirt.

Pfc. John E. Floyd of Brooke General Hospital, Ft. Sam Houston, spent the week-end with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. M. P. Floyd, Sr., at Jonesboro.

Cpl. Clayde B. Kays of Gatesville, now serving with the 345th Engineer General Service Regiment, which has headquarters at Leghorn, Italy, has as his duties minefield clearing and power line rehabilitation.

The organization was activated at Camp Crowder, Mo., July 15, 1942, and nearly every field of constructional skill is ably represented from bull-dozer operators to bridge carpenters. They went overseas in February, '43, and spent 6 months in French Morocco, and constructed 200 miles of portable fuel pipe-lines over the hot desert country around Casablanca and Marrakech and built a 30,000 man prisoner-of-war camp in 130 degree heat of Berriched. Other work they have done is to clear the railway for the "Mark Calrk Special Train," and rehabilitated the utilities system which had been thoroughly destroyed by the enemy, which included 35 miles

of 60,000 volt power lines, and also built 31 hospitals.

Cpl. Kays is a son of Mr. and Mrs. B. R. Kays of Gatesville and has been in the Army for 27 months and overseas 23 months.

**GETS GOOD CONDUCT MEDAL**

An AAF Depot in The Marianas —Cpl. Ralph Stephens, of Evant, a surgical technician in an AAF depot in the Marianas, has been awarded the Good Conduct Medal. At this hugh depot, B-29 Superforts are overhauled and repaired for assaults against Japan. Thru its warehouses move tons of equipment for combat aircraft in the Western Pacific.

Cpl. Stephen's father lives in Evant. Prior to his entry into the Army in October, '42, he was engaged in farming and was employed by Angles Jones of Ireland. He went overseas in November, '44.

With the 5th Army, Italy—Raymond L. Magans, son of Mrs. Pearl Magans, who lives in Gatesville has been promoted from private to corporal with the Fifth Army in Italy. He is an artillery mechanic with the 85th "Cluster" Division.

With the 321st Bomb Group in Italy.—At a V-E Day ceremony, the 321st B-25 Mitchell Bomb Group of the 12th Air Force was presented its second War Department citation, highest honor attainable by a combat unit.

Included in the 311st is S/Sgt. Elvin T. Raley, who has served as a crew chief with the group. He lived at Turnersville, and his mother, Mrs. C. W. Matthews lives at North Village, Camp Hood.

The citation is for an attack on Toulon harbor three days following the invasion of Southern France. The battleship "Strasbourg," the cruiser "La Galissonneire" and a submarine had been moved into position to use their heavy guns against the Allied invading forces. In one attack bombers of the 321st sent all three to the bottom. The unit, in 897 missions they have sent out more than 18,000 bombers to attack in Salsia, the Mediterranean Islands, Italy, the Balkans, France and Austria.

FROM OUR CONGRESSMAN  
**W. R. POAGE**

Dear Friends:

On several occasions in the past I have expressed my views on consumer subsidies. I believe that it is highly inflationary for the government to use tax money to pay a part of the citizen's grocery bill when that citizen is able to pay his own bills. It saves no money in the long run for the government to pay five cents on the cost of each pound of butter you buy, for the government must take not only that five cents, but also the interest and expenses from you in the way of taxes. This means that before the five cents is ultimately paid off that you as a taxpayer will have paid several times the five cents you thought you saved as a consumer. I realize that the producer of the butter must have all he is receiving or he will quit producing. I have, however, always believed that it was much better for the producer to get his compensation in the price of his product rather than through a government subsidy. Certainly he will be in better shape when the war is over if he is receiving a fair price than if his price is far below the cost of production, and he has been relying on a government subsidy which he will suddenly lose.

Last year, the overwhelming majority of Congress agreed that consumer subsidies were unsound,

but the President vetoed the bill prohibiting their use. They have been in general use some time, and just as many of us predicted they would, they have fastened themselves, on our economy so that many of their former opponents now say "they are unsound but we can't change now." I think we could change easier now than later; therefore, I voted against the bill which the House passed, extending these consumer subsidies another year. This bill included \$100,000,000 butter subsidy, nearly \$600,000,000 meat subsidy, and over a billion dollars all told. It seems to me that the meat situation alone would show how ineffective this subsidy program is.

Last Saturday the House passed the bill to extend the President's power to enter into Reciprocal Trade Agreements. As I explained last week, I believe this will help to make world trade a little more practicable after the war. I, therefore, voted for the bill. Next week we expect to vote on the Bretton Woods monetary agreement which is another program intended to aid international trade. Many of us think of foreign trade as something that does not affect us as citizens. Others think only of imports and ask why we should buy anything from foreign nations. As I see it, the answer is clear: Foreign trade affects every one of

us. Particularly is the South dependent on foreign trade for a market for our great crops, and we simply cannot hope to sell if we will not buy.

The House has also passed a

number of other bills including legislation to prevent the Navy from selling naval bases, munition plants, and similar property without Congressional approval; a bill enlarging the powers of the Federal Reserve Banks to issue currency; and a bill increasing the postal rates on fourth class matter to help pay the increased costs of the Post Office Department.

The Agriculture Committee this morning favorably reported a school lunch bill. This action came after nearly a month of hearing on the proposal. The bill tries to keep control of the program in the hands of the states but provides that the Federal Government will aid the States both in providing food and equipment and personnel for this program. Provision is also made for instruction in nutrition. It is believed that such instruction will not only help our children but that it will in the long run prove of benefit to our farmers in developing a larger demand for a wide variety of farm products. I believe that the school lunch program is very helpful; I have, therefore, supported this program and hope that it can continue with the States gradually assuming a larger and larger share of the burden.

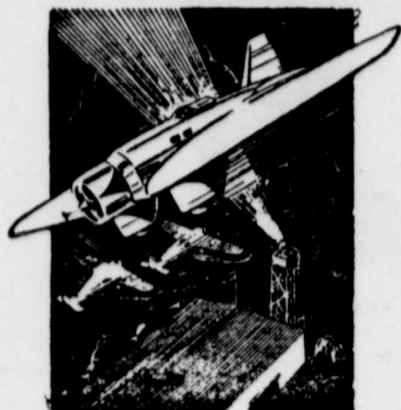

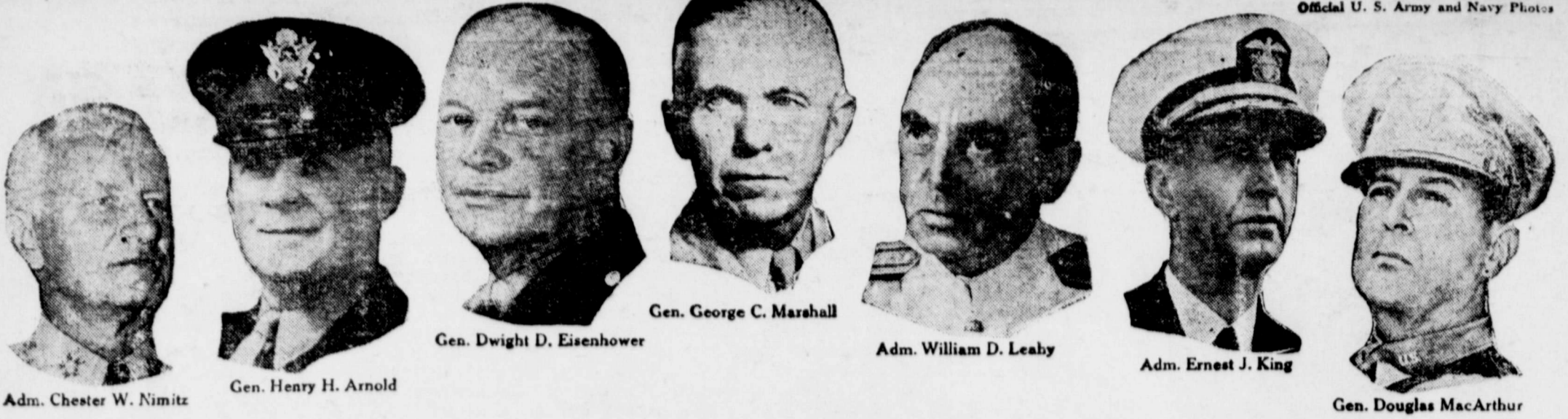

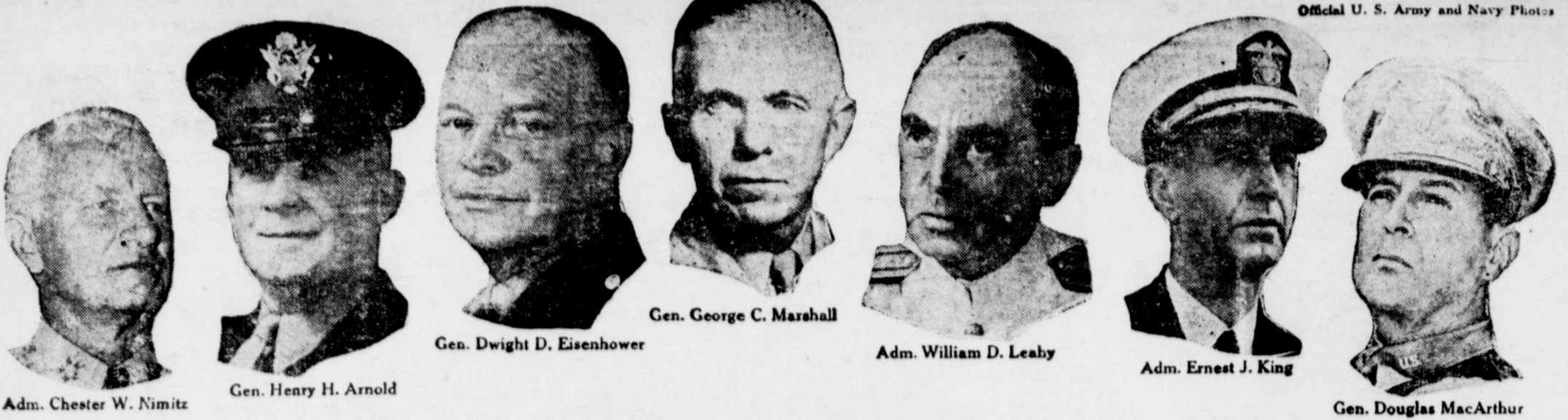
